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1 PROCEEDINGS 2 THE CHAIR: We are going to call this 3 Special Session to order. 4 Members of the board, you have all been previously provided with a draft copy of a 5 6 memorandum of understanding that proposes to 7 expand CCRB's role in the administrative 8 prosecution of substantiated CCRB cases in the 9 NYPD trial room. We are now here to discuss that 10 11 proposal that pursuant to the MOU, CCRB undertake the administrative prosecution of all civilian 12 13 complaints against NYPD uniformed officers which have been substantiated by the CCRB and in which 14 15 the CCRB has recommended charges and specifications. 16 17 Do I hear a motion on that issue? COMMISSIONER DONLON: So moved. 18 19 The CHAIR: Is there a second? 20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I second. 21 THE CHAIR: As moved and seconded that 2.2 pursuant to the MOU, CCRB undertake the administrative prosecution of all civilian 23 complaints against NYPD uniformed officers which 24 25 have been substantiated by the CCRB and in which

1 the CCRB has recommended charges and 2 specifications. 3 Everyone has had an opportunity to 4 review the document on his/her own time, it's been 5 previously provided. 6 I'm now going to open the floor to any 7 kind of debate and discussion on this MOU and 8 this proposal. COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Well, I think 9 that it's --10 11 COMMISSIONER SIMONETTI: (By telephone) 12 Can you just identify yourself, please? 13 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I'm sorry, this 14 is Bishop Taylor, Tony. 15 I think that it is certainly a good thing for us to have this responsibility and to 16 move forward with this, so I'm excited that we 17 have been given this , we've finally gotten to 18 19 this place where we can execute this in the trial 20 room, so I'm optimistic that this is really going 21 to turn out positive for the agency. 2.2 THE CHAIR: Thank you, Commissioner 23 Taylor. 24 Commissioner Khalid? COMMISSIONER KHALID: I think this is a 25

1 historic moment in the history of CCRB as well as 2 in the city government that we as a board have 3 been given additional responsibilities and I 4 think that will help the public, because it will 5 create a great balance between the NYPD and the 6 public, so that issues and complaints relating to 7 the Civilian Complaint Review Board, will have 8 more leverage and given more public the transparency and this way we will be able to 9 function better, so I thank the Mayor, the 10 Speaker and the Police Commissioner and the Chair 11 for looking into this document and after the 12 13 board discussion, then we will be able to see how we 14 move forward, but I think I like the document, as written, 15 this is a great historic occasion for CCRB. Thank you, Commissioner 16 THE CHAIR: Khalid. 17 18 COMMISSIONER DONLON: Yes. This is 19 James Donlon. 20 I would like to also say in support of 21 adopting the MOU that I think the pilot program 22 worked well, I think this program should also work equally well. Obviously, there are major 23 expenses involved, budgetary considerations, but 24 I'm confident that those can be addressed when 25

the time comes and I think it's all in all a 1 2 positive step for CCRB and I think it's a step in 3 the right direction. 4 THE CHAIR: Thank you, Commissioner 5 Donlon. б Anyone else? 7 COMMISSIONER MARTIN: (By video 8 conference) I too concur with my other board members and we did see substantial evidence 9 that showed us that it can work. I think that CCRB 10 as an agency is poised to really take this huge 11 12 giant step and I think this step is absolutely in the right direction, so I thank the Mayor, I 13 14 congratulate the Police Commissioner and I think 15 the beneficiaries will be the citizens of this great city, the City of New York. 16 17 THE CHAIR: Thank you. 18 Anyone else? 19 I'm just going to join in and echo the 20 thoughts of my fellow board members. I believe 21 that this is a journey that was started long 2.2 before my involvement with the board. As most of you know, there was the MOU that came out in 2001 23 under the Giuliani administration when Bernard 24 25 Kerik was the commissioner, and I have taken time

1 to look back and get some historical perspective in terms of how that came about and I believe 2 3 that credit goes certainly to the Mayor in this 4 case, City Council, especially the Speaker's office, in terms of putting this all together 5 6 and moving us in words that my fellow board 7 members have already expressed in terms of taking 8 a giant step in the right direction.

9 I think that we still have a long road ahead of us in terms of the actual implementation, 10 I am confident that we will have the support of 11 12 the political champions that have been long 13 supportive of us and we hope that that's going to 14 continue. We are obviously going to need pretty 15 extensive resources in building this prosecution unit and it certainly comes on the heels of a 16 very successful Administrative Prosecution Unit 17 which in itself came out of a successful second 18 seating program. 19

20 So again, I think this is an 21 illustration of the cooperation that the NYPD 22 under Commissioner Kelly has fostered along with 23 the CCRB. I think it's good for both agencies and 24 as a result I think it's good for the citizens of 25 this city.

1 In terms of whether or not this is the end-all be-all, I will certainly say that I 2 3 believe it is a giant step in the right direction 4 and that hopefully any issues that hinder its implementation or any obstacles that are 5 6 presented, I am confident, will be ironed out not 7 only the rule change process but also other parts 8 of the implementation of this MOU. Having said that, I just ask whether 9 there's any other further debate from any of the 10 commissioners on the board. 11 12 Okay. 13 Without seeing any further debate, the question now on the motion is whether pursuant to 14 15 the MOU, CCRB is to undertake the administrative prosecution of all civilian complaints against 16 NYPD uniformed officers which have been 17 substantiated by the CCRB and which the CCRB has 18 recommended charges and specifications. 19 20 Those in favor of this motion please 21 say aye. 2.2 IN UNISON: Aye. Those in opposition, please 23 THE CHAIR: 24 say no. 25 The ayes have it, the motion is carried.

1	Pursuant to the MOU, CCRB will undertake
2	the administrative prosecution of all civilian
3	complaints against NYPD uniformed officers which
4	have been substantiated by the CCRB and which the
5	CCRB has recommended charges and specifications.
б	COMMISSIONER SIMONETTI: Dan, was it a
7	unanimous vote?
8	THE CHAIR: Let the record reflect that
9	it was a unanimous vote.
10	I'm sorry, I forgot you couldn't see us.
11	COMMISSIONER SIMONETTI: I would just
12	like to congratulate everyone who was able to
13	make the Special Session because had I been there
14	I would have voted the same way and it is a step
15	in the right direction, even though we waited 11
16	years to get it, it finally comes to fruition.
17	I think it should probably be expanded
18	even greater as the years go out, you know, I
19	think that they are going to get more
20	responsibility because you can hear the
21	groundswell and I think there's going to be more
22	responsibility and I think they probably see us
23	as the primary oversight agency to look at things
24	that the department does, so I congratulate you
25	all and I think it's a great day for CCRB.

1 Thank you. 2 Thank you, Commissioner THE CHAIR: 3 Simonetti. 4 If there is no further business of the board -- I see there isn't -- I'm going to open 5 6 it up to public comment. 7 I will note that in terms of public 8 comment I'm going to ask everyone to keep it as brief and germane as possible. There will be a 9 public hearing as the implementation gets 10 11 underway, but to the extent that people have comments at this point, I will invite them to 12 13 speak. 14 The first one up is Deborah Pitts from 15 DC 37. 16 MS. PITTS: I don't need to ask anything. THE CHAIR: You are going to pass? 17 18 Okay. 19 The next one up would be Bruce Sutton 20 from DC 37. 21 MR. SUTTON: On behalf of DC 37 and the 22 investigators of 1113, I just want to say thank you, the Mayor of New York and also the Police 23 24 Commissioner for putting this project together 25 and I think the CCRB will be moving forward in

1	the near future.
2	THE CHAIR: Thank you.
3	Next up is Christopher Dunn.
4	MR. DUNN: Well, this is a pleasant
5	surprise. Good afternoon, everyone.
6	So, as you mentioned, this has been a
7	long voyage and you're right, it started before
8	you came on the board and it may have started
9	before I began coming to these meetings
10	regularly, but there have been many, many years we
11	have been talking about the APU and I want to say
12	that we think it is terrific that the board has
13	been given this responsibility.
14	I must say I have more mixed feelings
15	about the circumstances by which this came to
16	pass and the board's role and I do have some
17	concerns about what the Police Department may
18	think this speaks to as far as reform and police
19	accountability.
20	I wish the board had played a bigger
21	role in this. I have the impression this was
22	presented to you and that you did not play a
23	significant role in negotiating it or conceiving
24	of it, and I think that's unfortunate.
25	More importantly, I am concerned that

1 the Police Department may view this is the end of 2 the line in terms of dealing with some of the 3 concerns that Tony expressed, of which there is a 4 groundswell, I think, disquietude and dissatisfaction and even anger in some 5 6 communities about the lack of police oversight 7 and I think the department's doing this is a 8 clear sign that it recognizes that groundswell and I think it is terrific you are going to take up 9 this responsibility and we have said that from 10 the very beginning and we have pushed on that 11 12 very hard and we will do everything possible to 13 support you to make sure that you are able to do 14 it the way you want to do it, but I caution you 15 that from our perspective -- and Dan, you touched on this -- this is the beginning of what has to 16 happen and not the end and you now have your 17 18 proverbial nose in the tent and you are going to see what happens, I think, more clearly in the 19 20 trial room than you have ever seen before and you 21 are going to see much more clearly what happens 2.2 with the Police Commissioner about how he changes disciplinary decisions, and I am worried that one 23 of the central aspects of this agreement is he 24 retains complete discretion to make decisions 25

1 about ultimately whether many officers are 2 prosecuted and certainly what discipline is 3 imposed upon them, he can do so in 4 confidentiality, namely the documents he produces about his justifications, as I understand this 5 MOU, are completely secret, and I am not sure 6 7 that's appropriate. 8 Finally, he can pull the plug on this at any time. This is one of the concerns we had 9 11 years ago when a similar arrangement was 10 11 attempted by MOU, not by legislation, this gives, 12 in our view, the Police Department too much 13 leverage over you and I just urge you to be as 14 vigorous as possible, to be as open as possible 15 and we look forward to supporting you as you go 16 forward with these prosecutions. 17 THE CHAIR: Thank you, Mr. Dunn. 18 Next up is Alex Camarda of the Citizens Union. 19 20 MR. CAMARDA: Good afternoon, Commissioners, my name is Alex Camarda, I am a 21 22 Director of Public policy and Advocacy for the Citizens Union. We speak out today in favor of 23 this MOU before you and would like to thank the 24 board as well as the Police Commissioner, the 25

1 Council and the Mayor's office for coming 2 together around this important oversight issue. 3 We'd also like to thank many of the 4 advocates that have worked tirelessly on this 5 issue dating back many years. б Our own involvement began in 2008 when 7 we issued an issue brief at that time supporting 8 this authority for the CCRB along with a number of other proposals that we've been working on in 9 the Council. 10 After we issued that issue brief we 11 worked with Council Member Garodnick and with the 12 13 Public Advocate De Blasio on putting forth a bill 14 that could give the CCRB the ability to prosecute 15 substantiated allegations of police misconduct, we worked with the Council to get a majority of 16 co-sponsors on that bill. 17 18 More recently we worked with Council Member Vann to introduce a bill that is also 19 20 encapsulated in the MOU and that requires the 21 Police Commissioner provide information when 2.2 there's deviation between his ruling and the recommendation of the CCRB. 23 24 Last week we issued a report that 25 showed the need for this reform, it showed that

1 in 92 percent of the cases dating back to 2002 2 for over 2,000 officers only 8 percent of the 3 time did the police actually implement the 4 penalty of charges and specifications when it was sought by the CCRB. 5 6 So we hope that this reform today will 7 bring about a greater responsiveness when that 8 penalty is recommended by the police and we think it will result in more accountability in general, 9 so I want to thank again all of the parties who 10 worked on behalf of this MOU. 11 12 Thank you. 13 THE CHAIR: Thank you. 14 Our final speaker is Sunita Patel. 15 MS. PATEL: My name is Sunita Patel, I am an attorney at the Center For Constitutional 16 Rights, and we have been litigating around the 17 issue of "stop and frisk" for over a decade. 18 We are cautiously optimistic that this is going to 19 20 move in the right direction. 21 I would echo many of the concerns that 2.2 Chris raised that what we really need is a culture change within the NYPD for transparency 23 24 and accountability, you know, rather than a retrenchment in the future. 25

We really hope that the board can stay vigilant and stay active in the process and continue to hold the police department accountable and, you know, of course, we hope that this will move towards greater disciplinary action and systemic change within the department. Thank you. THE CHAIR: Thank you. Seeing no additional speakers, this will conclude our special session. I thank all of the board members for shuffling their schedules and making it here for this very important vote. Thank you very much. (Proceedings adjourned at 1:22 p.m.)
