1           CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Thank you for coming  
2           tonight and welcome to the third round of the New  
3           York City Districting Commission's public  
4           hearing. My name is Benito Romano and I'm the  
5           chair of the New York City Districting  
6           Commission. Now on behalf of the Commission, I  
7           want to thank James Molinaro, the borough  
8           president, for hosting us here tonight.

9           We don't have many speakers scheduled, but  
10          we are anxious to hear from you. If any of the  
11          speakers that are preregistered or scheduled to  
12          speak tonight need a translator, please see  
13          someone at the staff registration table and they  
14          will arrange for that.

15          Before we take testimony, let me make a few  
16          preliminary remarks. In December, the Commission  
17          advertised in community and ethnic newspapers  
18          throughout the city announcing the Commission's  
19          public hearing schedule for the third round. An  
20          announcement was circulated to the press. An  
21          e-mail blast was sent to over 5,500 individuals  
22          and organizations.

23          Advocacy groups helped spread the word  
24          through their separate networks. The hearings  
25          were noticed in the City Record and the hearing

1 schedules were publicized on our website as well  
2 as on our Facebook page and Twitter feed. The  
3 hearing tonight is part of the third round of  
4 public hearings that the Commission will conduct  
5 throughout the City. And, in fact, it is our  
6 last public hearing.

7 Over 1,150 people attended the first two  
8 rounds of hearings in late August and October,  
9 and the Commission heard testimony from more than  
10 230 of them. On November 15, 2012, the  
11 Commission adopted by unanimous vote a revised  
12 plan for the 51 councilmanic districts that  
13 reflected the information and testimony we  
14 received during the first two rounds of hearings,  
15 In addition to online submissions of testimony,  
16 alternative maps created through our free  
17 map-making software on our website,  
18 [www.nyc.gov/districting](http://www.nyc.gov/districting).

19 Both prior to that meeting and immediately  
20 thereafter, we heard from the public and numerous  
21 advocacy groups, including Common Cause,  
22 Asian-American Legal Defense and Education Fund,  
23 Latino Justice, the Center for Law and Social  
24 Justice and the City Council's Black, Latino and  
25 Asian caucuses calling for another round of

1 public hearings to enable the public to provide  
2 additional commentary on the revised plan before  
3 the City Council took action.

4 In our transmittal letter that accompanied  
5 the revised plan submitted to the City Council on  
6 November 19th, the Commission noted that it would  
7 welcome additional input from the public, but  
8 that the Commission felt constrained by the  
9 deadlines set forth in the City charter which  
10 directed the Commission to submit the revised  
11 plan to the City Council by early November.

12 That said, given the possibility that the  
13 Council would not return the very advised plan to  
14 the Commission which would allow for further  
15 public comment and that the Council might instead  
16 allow the plan to be adopted simply by taking no  
17 action for the three-week period specified in the  
18 matter, the Commission considered mechanisms that  
19 would allow for another round of public hearings.

20 After consulting with our in-house lawyers  
21 at the New York City Law Department, the  
22 Commission convened on December 4, 2012 to  
23 consider continuing the public hearing process by  
24 withdrawing the revised district plan from the  
25 City Council. The Commission approved such a

1 measure by a vote of 12 to zero with one  
2 abstention.

3 Now that the Commission has withdrawn the  
4 revised plan from the City Council, we are now in  
5 a position to conduct this third round of public  
6 hearings. The Commission is eager to hear  
7 tonight's testimony and comments on the revised  
8 district plan. As a result of tonight's hearing  
9 and the third round of hearings in its entirety,  
10 the Commission will consider all the comments it  
11 will have received during its next scheduled  
12 public meeting on January 23rd.

13 At that meeting, the Commission will direct  
14 the staff to make any amendments to the revised  
15 district plan that the Commission deems  
16 appropriate in light of the comments and  
17 information we received during this round. Then,  
18 at the Commission's public meeting on  
19 January 30th, an amended district plan reflecting  
20 those instructions will be presented to the  
21 Commission and the Commission will decide whether  
22 to adopt the plan.

23 If the Commission adopts the plan, it will  
24 then be submitted to the City Council which will  
25 have three weeks to either adopt or reject the

1 plan. If the Council takes neither action, it  
2 will be deemed adopted. If the Council objects  
3 to the plan, the Commission will then have  
4 another opportunity to revise the plan. This  
5 will then trigger a new set of public hearings to  
6 receive comments and feedback on such a plan.

7 It is again worth reminding ourselves that  
8 there are certain factors that the law obligates  
9 the Commission to consider during the districting  
10 process. These include that the difference in  
11 population between the least populous and the  
12 most populous districts shall not exceed 10  
13 percent of the average population for all  
14 districts.

15 The plan should ensure the fair and  
16 effective representation of racial and language  
17 minority groups in New York City. The district  
18 plans should keep neighborhoods and communities  
19 with established ties of common interest and  
20 association intact. Districts should be compact  
21 and contiguous.

22 Districts should, if at all possible, be  
23 kept within a single borough and the plan should  
24 avoid diminishing the effective political  
25 representation of voters.

1           Finally, I would like to bring to your  
2           attention our website at [www.nyc.gov/districting](http://www.nyc.gov/districting).  
3           The site is the central repository of all  
4           documents and videos relating to the Districting  
5           Commission.

6           It also contains a complete schedule of our  
7           public hearings, all documents and plans created  
8           by and submitted to the Commission, our online  
9           mapping tool and a portal which will preregister  
10          you for all hearings and be added to our mailing  
11          list. I hope you all visit the site and let us  
12          know how it can be made more informative and  
13          interactive.

14          That concludes my preliminary remarks. I,  
15          at this point would, following our custom, like  
16          to have the commissioners introduce themselves,  
17          beginning with my commissioners on my far right.

18                 MR. HART: Rob Hart from Staten Island.

19                 MR. CERULLO: Scott Cerullo from Staten  
20                 Island.

21                 MS. HANKS: Kamillah Hanks, Staten Island.

22                 MR. ROBERT: John Robert, the Bronx.

23                 MS. BRAGG: Jamilla Ponton Bragg, Manhattan.

24                 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Benito Romano, Manhattan.

25                 MR. HUM: Carl Hum, executive director of

1 the Commission.

2 MS. WOLFE: Gloria Carvajal Wolfe,  
3 Manhattan.

4 MS. LIN: Linda Lin, Queens.

5 MS. PERSAUD: Roxanne Persaud, Brooklyn.

6 MR. ODOM: Oscar Odom, III, Brooklyn.

7 MR. HACKWORTH: Thaddeus Hackworth, general  
8 counsel to the Commission.

9 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Thaddeus, general counsel,  
10 will start by calling our first speaker.

11 MR. HACKWORTH: So, each speaker will have  
12 three minutes to speak. There is a timer right  
13 over there (indicating). So, keep an eye on it.  
14 When your three minutes are up, you will hear a  
15 chime. That is when you know it is time to  
16 conclude your testimony.

17 So, when I call your name, please step up to  
18 the podium and speak into the microphone. Our  
19 first speaker will be William Stanford, Jr.  
20 William Stanford, Jr., first speaker.

21 MR. STANFORD: The name is Mr. X. Just two  
22 things since we are in the smallest borough, the  
23 forgotten borough. There should be two  
24 boundaries, one at Arden Avenue, the other at the  
25 Staten Island Expressway. That's how you should

1 redraw the only three Staten Island districts,  
2 City Council of Staten Island.

3 I'm sorry you couldn't get more registered  
4 speakers here today. Maybe it's due to  
5 Hurricane Sandy; I don't know. But when we were  
6 here in August, this place was packed and now  
7 it's empty. So hopefully in the next ten years,  
8 you can do better.

9 As I said, the boundaries should be the  
10 Staten Island Expressway and Arden Avenue.  
11 Anything west of Arden Avenue should be  
12 considered as District 51. Anything east of  
13 Arden Avenue should be considered District 50.  
14 Anything above the Staten Island Expressway  
15 should be considered as District 49. Anything  
16 below it should be considered District 50.

17 As I said before, we should go by the bus  
18 corridors. You should go by the bus corridors.  
19 So far, you ignored and so have your State  
20 politicians on the LATFOR task force. I don't  
21 see why you can't do it that way. It's very  
22 easy. This borough, that's the easiest way to do  
23 it here in Staten Island.

24 Hopefully, you will take my suggestion into  
25 consideration, not for granted. Sorry you

1           couldn't get more speakers here in Staten Island  
2           Borough Hall like you did in August. But sorry,  
3           this is unacceptable attendance, unacceptable.  
4           Hopefully, you will do better in ten years, that  
5           is, if you are still working for the Districting  
6           Commission.

7                     Now, one more thing. You need to do better  
8           with these public hearings, okay? I am  
9           constantly hearing the chair who shouldn't be the  
10          chair. Oh, he sent e-mail blast. Well, I never  
11          received an e-mail from him. Forget e-mail  
12          blast. So, I don't know where he is getting his  
13          figures from. He is not an accountant as far as  
14          I know, at least the last time I checked, but he  
15          is behaving like a certified public account  
16          couldn't.

17                    Whether he has accounting experience remains  
18          a mystery, but I received no e-mail or e-mail  
19          blast from any Districting Commission employees  
20          or members regarding public hearings, public  
21          meetings. Don't do it to me. Don't do it to  
22          yourself. You say you sent everyone an e-mail  
23          blast or e-mail letter, and someone says, "I  
24          didn't get an e-mail letter," where does that  
25          leave you? Now you are just exploiting yourself.

1           But if you want to consider telling  
2           yourself, that's fine. You want to continue  
3           spoiling yourself, that's fine. You want to  
4           continue embarrassing yourself, that's fine.  
5           Because that's what you did -- (timer  
6           dings) -- during rounds one through three. You  
7           embarrassed yourself. You continue to embarrass  
8           yourself.

9           MR. HACKWORTH: Thank you. Our next speaker  
10          will be James Maleady.

11          MR. MALEADY: Good evening. My name is Jim  
12          Maleady. I am member of the New Kings Democratic  
13          Club and a member of the County Committee in  
14          Kings County. I have lived in Greenpoint. I  
15          work in Staten Island which is why I am here  
16          tonight. I have lived in Greenpoint for  
17          approximately 15 years and I am here to address  
18          District 33.

19          District 33 contains portions of ten  
20          neighborhoods, Greenpoint, the North Side,  
21          Williamsburg, DUMBO, Vinegar Hill, Downtown  
22          Metrotech, Brooklyn Heights, Carroll Gardens,  
23          Fort Greene, Cobble Hill and Boerum Hill. Those  
24          are ten or eleven distinct neighborhoods in  
25          Brooklyn.

1           The district looks almost like a snake. It  
2 starts up at the north end at Newtown Creek,  
3 follows all the way down to the Gowanus Canal in  
4 parts, and it takes approximately 45 minutes if  
5 you try to get in the from the north end of the  
6 district to the south end of the district by  
7 public transportation.

8           It contains the most heterogenous grouping  
9 of people I have ever seen. In fact, my  
10 councilman, who is doing a very stable job at  
11 representing us right now, Stephen Levin, has  
12 been stated in his literature and his public  
13 events that he represents the most diverse  
14 communities in the City of New York.

15           The issues that we have are this. There is  
16 a failure by this Commission to use natural  
17 boundaries. The BQE is a natural boundary. In  
18 the north end, if you look, you will see that  
19 there are Vs cut out at Frost Street. You will  
20 also see that there is a portion of District 34,  
21 which is now incorporated into the north side of  
22 33, which is on the west side of the BQE.

23           As you go down further, you will see that  
24 there are portions of Williamsburg that have now  
25 fallen from 34 to 33 and those portions of

1 Williamsburg are cut off by the expressway. Now,  
2 one of the things, and as you go down further,  
3 you will see that there are even more places that  
4 are cut off by the expressway.

5 As you get down past the Manhattan Bridge, I  
6 would suggest that it would be best to use  
7 Tillary Street and Flatbush Avenue Extension as  
8 the natural boundaries for this district, instead  
9 of having it weave in and out randomly through  
10 the streets.

11 Now, the issues are this. One is that there  
12 are no statistics that I have seen that indicate  
13 the portions that are to be added and subtracted  
14 from this district. There are large portions of  
15 this district that are being put into other  
16 districts and there are organizations of 34 going  
17 into 33.

18 There are no statistics that I have seen for  
19 those demographics area which  
20 demonstrate -- (timer dings) -- what is being  
21 done. I would ask you to take that under  
22 advisement. Thank you.

23 MR. HACKWORTH: Thank you. Our final  
24 registered speaker is Patrick Donegan.

25 MR. DONEGAN: Hi, guys. Well, first I was

1 talking with you guys in October with some maps I  
2 made that got 156,192 people in every single  
3 district in Staten Island. For me, I thought  
4 they were decent maps. But I guess you guys  
5 thought otherwise. But it's all right.

6 While I was looking at these maps, I would  
7 say for the most part, they are good. They are  
8 okay, I guess. There is one thing with the 50th  
9 District and the 49th District that I do kind of  
10 want to draw your attention to, which is  
11 basically at like the peninsula part of it. I  
12 guess you could call it a peninsula.

13 There is a Roman Catholic parish that I was  
14 baptized in. That's in a narrow part of the 49th  
15 District. This parish, if you stand outside the  
16 church and you look across the street, it's the  
17 50th District. But the church itself, it's in  
18 49th. How do I put this?

19 MS. HANKS: Can you give us the name of the  
20 parish?

21 MS. BRAGG: The street?

22 MR. DONEGAN: It's -- I am stuttering --  
23 Saint Teresa.

24 MS. BRAGG: Okay. What street is it on?

25 MR. DONEGAN: It's -on, I don't know why I

1 am doing this -- Victory. Yeah, I get nerves  
2 when I speak.

3 MS. HANKS: No, no, no, that's okay.

4 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: You are doing fine.

5 MR. DONEGAN: Yeah. With what I know,  
6 like -- I had actually submitted some written  
7 testimony about it, and I am definitely a much  
8 better writer than I am a speaker. So, I mean,  
9 if you guys want to read it, I can probably show  
10 you guys on the break.

11 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Do you have more than one  
12 copy? Do you have one copy, at least?

13 MR. DONEGAN: I have two. So, I will just  
14 hand this to you guys and I will stop stuttering  
15 and let everybody else get a chance. Thank you.

16 MS. BRAGG: Thank you for bringing it to our  
17 attention.

18 MR. HACKWORTH: That is our final registered  
19 speaker.

20 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Is anyone here tonight who  
21 would like to address the Commission on any  
22 subject relating to our map, Staten Island or any  
23 other borough? We are going to stand adjourned  
24 for ten minutes to see if other Staten Island  
25 residents arrive or anyone else wants to appear

1 and speak to the Commission.

2 (Whereupon, a brief recess was taken.)

3 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: We are now reconvened. I  
4 am informed by staff that there are no other  
5 speakers who expressed an interest in addressing  
6 the Commission or have signed up. So, without  
7 any further testimony, we stand adjourned until  
8 January 23rd at our public meeting in City  
9 Council's Chambers?

10 MR. HUM: No, we will be at John Jay College  
11 of Criminal Justice. And staff will stick around  
12 for a few moments in case any other testimony  
13 arrives.

14 CHAIRMAN ROMANO: Thank you all. Good  
15 evening.

16 (Whereupon, at 6:48 P.M., the above matter  
17 was concluded.)
