## **DJJ Holds Employee Recognition Ceremony at Tweed Courthouse**

Hundreds attend as staff is recognized for outstanding performance; awards given for professional excellence

On Thursday, November 18<sup>th</sup>, the NYC Department of Juvenile Justice held its first Employee Recognition Ceremony, commemorating the outstanding commitment and achievements of 18 exceptional agency staff members.

The event was held in the Blue Room at the historic Tweed Courthouse, which serves as headquarters for the City's Department of Education.

More than 200 people gathered to recognize the outstanding accomplishments and extraordinary dedication of employees who distinguished themselves in 2004 through exceptional service to the City of New York.

Each recipient was presented with a custom-engraved crystal award listing his or her name, title and award category. Awards were distributed by a number of notable presenters that included DEA Supervisory Special Agent Mauricio Fernandez, Teamsters Citywide Director Gregory Floyd, Zac Smith - Deputy Chief of Staff to Deputy Mayor Walcott, and Fred Gebauer, Counsel to Criminal Justice Coordinator John Feinblatt.

NYC Council Member and Chair of the Subcommittee on Juvenile Justice Sara M. Gonzalez congratulated the award recipients and provided special remarks during the ceremony.

### Agency Hosts Columbia U. Peacebuilders from Ireland

Continued from page 1 effective strategies and operations that may be used in Ireland to build peace in what has been a troubled land.

Police officials and community leaders from Northern Ireland were selected through a highly competitive process to engage in four weeks of study and work in the United States. Participants were grouped into two-person teams, spending weeks one and four attending classes at Columbia University and weeks two and three in assignments with governmental and other organizations in New York City.

Peter Connolly, Crime Prevention Officer with the Police Service of Northern Ireland, and Roisin Muldoon, Operations Manager with the Probation Board for Northern Ireland, were assigned to DJJ.

During their tenure with the agency, the team met with the Commissioner and management staff, observed operations and court proceedings, and shadowed medical and mental health and case management staff in DJJ's secure and non-secure facilities.

In addition to DJJ, organizations hosting the Peacebuilders included NYPD and the Department of Parks & Recreation.

## Landslide Victory in DJJ Election Day Youth Programs

On Tuesday, November 2<sup>nd</sup>, 93 juveniles at Bridges and nearly 100 residents from SEEDS participated in separate Youth Election Day programs, designed to familiarize them with the voting process and permit them to cast their ballot in a mock election for President and Vice President of the United States, and Senator from the State of New York.

Juveniles were selected to portray Republican and Democratic Party candidates for each of the three offices. Each "candidate" studied the actual candidate's positions on key issues before participating in a presentation for their peers and DJJ staff members.

#### Commissioner's Message

The beginning of the new year is a special time, because we each make resolutions and plan what we want to accomplish over the next 12 months. Mayor Bloomberg recently did this during his State of the City Address.

I listened with Executive Directors Migdalia Cortes and Dennis Anyata as Mayor Bloomberg shared a vision for our 'City of Opportunity.' Under his plan, we will see more crime reduction that preserves our safety, more educational reform that ensures our kids are the best and brightest, and more economic development that invigorates housing and business across all five boroughs.

To support this vision, the Mayor presented a \$48.3 billion budget that will put the City on firmer financial footing, while closing a \$3 billion budget gap. This will guard against tax increases and give homeowners another tax rebate.

Under the Mayor's plan, DJJ will receive more than 200 additional staff to advance the important work that we do. This is in addition to the 41 new staff members who just joined us.

DJJ is also undertaking new initiatives. Through the efforts of Juvenile Justice Subcommittee Chair Sara Gonzalez, four community-based organizations have begun working with youth in detention on issues such as drug prevention, gang violence awareness, anger management, and life skills. They're also working with our discharge planners to help youth who need services after leaving detention.

We're continuing to roll-out ASPIRE, our new behavior management program, in an effort to make these and all our services more beneficial while protecting staff and resident safety.

We're always looking to do more, and I look forward to continuing to work with you and our new staff members to make this year our very best yet.

#### Residents Explore College and Career Possibilities at Passages Academy

Through a strategic partnership with the New York City College of Technology, Passages Academy is making career education and exploration available to juvenile residents.

The innovative program has provided for several departments from the college to visit select Passages sites to gauge response to and interest in the program. Professors from the college have made presentations to residents, covering fields such as hospitality, travel and tourism, dental hygiene, advertising design, and graphic arts.

Initial presentations were well received and plans are underway to expand the program into subsequent semesters.

Passages Academy is a New York City public school that provides credit-bearing classes, educational services and quality programs to young people who are in the care and custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice.

Offering courses for grades 5 through 12, Passages classes follow New York City curriculum

and New York State Standards. More than 4,000 school age students are enrolled through Passages Academy each year.

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ballot casting and voting rights in the U.S. Skits were followed by a briefing on the duties and responsibilities of the President, Vice President, and U.S. Senators, as well as a simulated debate between student candidates.

Votes cast by the juveniles produced interesting results. SEEDS voters selected John Kerry and Charles Schumer by wide margins. Juvenile voters at Bridges also chose John Kerry over George W. Bush by a margin of 77 votes.

The Election Day Program was planned and implemented by Migdalia Cortes at SEEDS and Dennis Anyata at Bridges.
