New Protocol Changes for Tower Cranes



On Tuesday, March 25, Buildings Commissioner Lancaster announced changes to the Department's protocol regarding the erection and dismantling (including jumping) of tower cranes. A Buildings inspector is now required to be present on a construction site whenever a tower crane is being raised or lowered, until further notice. This interim change and other protocol changes come as the Department continues its inspection sweep of cranes installed throughout New York City. New NYC Construction Codes



One way that the <u>New NYC Construction Codes</u> are more user-friendly than the <u>1968 Building Code</u> is in the assignment of short-hand designation letters for "use and occupancy" classifications. Whereas the 1968 Building Code sequentially assigned letters for each use and occupancy, the New Codes

Registration for General Contractors

Dedicated to Safety

To protect the public and ensure construction work is performed by insured general contractors, all contractors who build one-, two-, and three-family homes will be required to register with the Buildings Department to obtain New Building permits. Registration begins April 1, 2008 and will be mandatory November 1, 2008. In August 2007, Mayor Bloomberg signed legislation requiring contractors building one-, two- and three-family homes to register with the Buildings Department. Excavation Notification Requirement

Dedicated to Safety

To ensure excavation work is performed in a safe and compliant manner, <u>Rule 52</u> (38 kb-pdf) requires all contractors with permits for earthwork to notify the Buildings Department of the date and time of the earthwork 24 to 48 hours before commencing work by calling the Buildings Department Call Center at (212) 393-2550.
