### Acting Commissioner LiMandri Testifies on Construction Safety



On July 15, Acting Buildings Commissioner Robert LiMandri testified before the City Council's Housing and Buildings Committee on several key pieces of legislation designed to advance construction site and building safety. The seven bills addressed at the hearing focus on new regulations for tower and climber cranes, concrete operations, site safety requirements, vacant buildings and retaining walls. This follows the recent June City Hall event where Mayor Bloomberg, Speaker Quinn and the Buildings Department announced an <u>aggressive legislative</u>

agenda to enhance accountability and oversight of construction sites.

## The New NYC Construction Codes Are Now in Effect

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The <u>New NYC Construction Codes</u> are now in effect, and applicants may choose to use the <u>New Codes</u> or the <u>1968 Building Code</u> during a one-year interim period. Although the New Codes will not be mandated for all new construction until July 1, 2009, certain administrative and enforcement provisions and construction safeguards under the New Codes are now required. ## New Legislation Enhances Accountability and Oversight



On June 30, Mayor Bloomberg advanced the Department's aggressive legislative agenda by signing two bills into law, enhancing accountability and oversight. Intro 511-A, now Local Law 27/08, formalizes the Department's reporting disciplinary action against licensed architects and engineers to New York State. Intro 754-A, now Local Law 29/08, strengthens public access to construction site injury and fatality information. To learn more, view the Mayor's remarks

## **New PW3 Requirement Approaching**

Information You Need To Know

To make verifying the cost of any alteration work easier, the Department has revised the <u>PW3</u> form to capture more detailed construction cost information. Beginning August 4, applicants must submit the revised PW3 at Pre-Filing for all amendments affecting costs and sign off. ## License Reinstatement Change

The Buildings Department no longer reinstates licenses that have been expired for more than five years. Individuals with licenses expired more than five years must reapply for the license and meet the license's original requirements, including taking any necessary examinations. ## **Code Compass: Special Inspections Replace Controlled Inspections**

Information You Need To Know



Under the <u>New NYC Construction Codes</u>, Special Inspections replace Controlled Inspections for all construction projects filed on or after July 1, 2008. Special Inspections may only be performed by Special Inspectors working for a Buildings

Department-approved Special Inspection Agency. Special Inspections are defined in <u>Chapter</u> <u>17</u> (329 kb-pdf) of the 2008 Building Code and the Department's <u>Special Inspections Rule</u> (712 kb-pdf).
