

## **DOT ART PROGRAM BACKGROUND**

The New York City Department of Transportation's ("NYC DOT") Art Program ("DOT Art") oversees the installation of public artworks on NYC DOT property throughout New York City in partnership with a diverse body of professional artists, galleries, business improvement districts and arts, community-based and other nonprofit organizations. City sidewalks, fences, triangles, medians, bridges, jersey barriers, step streets, pedestrian plazas and other unique project sites service as canvases and foundations for temporary murals, sculptures, interventions and cultural programming. In addition, DOT Art coordinates conservation and maintenance of DOT's permanent art collection and collaborates with the NYC Department of Cultural Affairs (DCLA) Percent for Art Program to commission permanent art as part of the Percent for Art law. ## **ARTERVENTIONS BACKGROUND**

As part of the Arterventions initiative, DOT Art invites arts and community-based organizations, nonprofits, galleries and business improvement districts (the "Partner Organizations") to exhibit temporary artwork such as murals, sculptures or interventions on NYC DOT property in collaboration with professional artists (the "Artists"). Partner Organizations may request necessary permits to display temporary artwork that is newly commissioned or relocate existing artwork currently on exhibit in a gallery, alternative art space or in a storage facility to NYC DOT-owned sites. Artwork typically remains on display for three to six months with a maximum period of eleven months. For plaza or other similar sites, the maximum display period may be reduced to one month given other special events and activities organized by local maintenance partners. Partner Organizations and or Artists are responsible for funding Arterventions projects, which may be organized as part of an exhibition, festival, or citywide event.

NYC DOT has provided a list of example site types to guide selection of specific NYC locations for artwork installation (Appendix A: Example Site Types). Interested Partner Organizations are required to identify a NYC DOT location for artwork in response to the list of eligible site types. Applicants are encouraged to review the Site Selection Guide and submit ideas for approval by NYC DOT prior to submitting a full proposal. When selecting a potential site for art, consider the following guidelines: Size + Safety (large enough to accommodate artwork), Visibility + Accessibility (accessible to a diverse audience) and Site Enhancement + Significance (aesthetically pleasing and appropriate for the public realm).

Examples of Partner Organizations include: Business Improvement Districts, artist-in-residence programs, arts councils, museums, cultural institutions, community centers and other nonprofit community-based organizations focused on art, history, urban planning, or architecture. ## **PROGRAM PROCESS AND REQUIREMENTS**

All applications are reviewed by the DOT Art Advisory Committee and internal NYC DOT operational divisions. Following preliminary application approval, the project team meets to finalize a project schedule and review installation plan, project materials and/or engineering assessments. DOT Art Program staff, a representative from the Partner Organization, the Artist and other NYC DOT staff make up the project team.

NYC DOT provides the necessary permits to install on City-owned property. All selected Partner Organizations must sign a legal agreement with NYC DOT and provide a certificate of insurance naming the City as an additional insured. As per the agreement, the Artist receives credit, sole ownership, and copyright of the artwork, but is required to extend the City the right to a royalty-free, perpetual license to use any depiction of the artwork for non-commercial purposes. In addition to signing the legal agreement, the Partner Organization is responsible for:

- Hiring a NYS licensed engineer to prepare a signed and sealed technical report (sculpture) or submit material list (mural);
- Overseeing transportation and installation of the artwork;
- Maintaining the artwork during the display period;
- Removing the artwork upon completion of the display period; and
- Restoring the site to its original condition upon competition of the removal period.

## **SUBMISSION GUIDELINES**

NYC DOT accepts Arterventions proposals on a rolling basis throughout the year. NYC DOT must receive a full application 90 days in advance of the proposed installation date. Interested Partner Organizations and Artists are required to submit a joint application. All applicants must submit project renderings and photographs of the proposed site and artwork, as well as a site plan for consideration. For submission specifications, review the Arterventions Application Cover Sheet. Applicants are typically notified of selection within one month of submission.

### **SELECTION PROCESS**

The DOT Art Advisory Committee, a panel of appointed arts professionals from varying disciplines, reviews all proposals based on the following selection criteria:

#### **Public Safety**

• Proposal does not present any public safety hazards.

#### **Artistic Merit**

- Proposed artwork is aesthetically pleasing and appropriate for the public realm.
- Artist's past work and resume demonstrate proficiency in the proposed medium.
- Artist has experience exhibiting in the public realm.

#### **Site Suitability**

- Artwork is suitable for the site based on size, scale and form.
- Proposal considers the variety of audiences at the site and if applicable, addresses Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)
  regulations.

#### **Organizational Capacity**

- Partner Organization agrees to monitor and maintain the artwork.
- Partner Organization has secured funding to meet the overall budget.

#### **Artwork Durability**

- Artwork is made of durable materials to withstand outdoor weather conditions.
- If applicable, Partner Organization is willing to secure a NYS licensed engineer to review and approve the proposed installation method.

Proposals that include commercial advertising, branding, or marketing will not be approved.

  presentation or revision of its submission. Neither NYCDOT nor the City shall be obligated to pay and shall not pay any

- NYCDOT at its sole discretion reserves, without limitation, the right to;
  - Withdraw the RFP at any time;
  - To discuss various approaches with one or more respondents (including parties not responding to the RFP); and

## **APPENDIX A: EXAMPLE SITE TYPES**

NYC DOT infrastructure is categorized and defined into distinct classifications known as site types. Site types that are eligible for temporary public art installation may serve as canvases and foundations for murals, projections, sculptures and interventions. Interested Partner Organizations are invited to propose NYCDOT-owned infrastructure within their communities as potential sites for temporary art. The guide provides supplemental information including: typical elements found at a site, site requirements and recommendations, potential artwork installations associated with each site type and photo examples. #### **Asphalt Pedestrian Space**

Asphalt pedestrian spaces are car-free street segments reclaimed to improve pedestrian safety and increase accessibility (i.e. larger curb extensions and slip lane closures).

#### **Bridge (Concrete Wall)**

A bridge allows pedestrians, bicycles and vehicles to cross over or under water, railway tracks, greenways or highways. Concrete walls enclosing the bridge may be utilized for art.

#### **Bridge Anchorage & Archway**

A bridge anchorage is composed of the two outer sides of a bridge that are grounded on land, providing support for the structure as it spans across a body of water, a roadway, a railroad, etc.

#### **Fence**

A fence is a barrier that encloses an area and restricts movement in and out of a DOT-owned space. Corrugated metal or chain-link fences enclose these spaces.

#### Plaza

DOT plazas are vibrant, social public spaces created by reclaiming and redesigning underutilized street segments as places for pedestrian and cyclist use. DOT partners with community groups to operate, maintain and manage these spaces. Applicants must obtain support from plaza maintenance partners to display artwork at a plaza. #### **Sidewalk**

Sidewalks are paved paths designed primarily for pedestrian use, which are located between the roadside curb and adjacent property lines.

#### **Step Street**

A step street is a large concrete pedestrian staircase that rests on a hill connecting two streets.

#### **Streetlight Pole**

Streetlights provide light for pedestrians and vehicles on bridges, walkways, bikeways, plazas and parks. The poles are located adjacent to the curb.

- If submitting an existing artwork for review, no more than 4 photographs of proposed artwork in jpeg format (resolution of 72 to 150 dpi) and associated image list that includes: title, date of completion, medium, dimensions, location, sale price or commission budget, description of artwork, and list of partners;
- No more than 4 photographs of past artwork examples in jpeg format (resolution 72 to 150 dpi) and associated image list that includes: title, date of completion, medium, dimensions, location, sale price or commission budget, description of artwork, and list of partners;
- Artist curriculum vitae;
- Organization support letter; and
- Funding commitment letter (include list of secured and anticipated funders).
