

Business leaders introduced to CAPITAL at breakfast

The Deputy Mayor for Education and Community Development, Dennis M. Walcott and Department of Youth and Community Development (DYCD) Commissioner Jeanne B. Mullgrav hosted a breakfast at Columbia University's Low Memorial Library to enlist corporate support for DYCD's CAPITAL internship program.

CAPITAL (Corporate Allies Program of Internships, Training and Leadership) is an innovative youth workforce initiative administered by DYCD that pairs New York City youth with corporate sector employers who agree to provide paid summer internships. The Deputy Mayor and Commissioner were joined by founder, chairman and CEO of Operation HOPE, John Hope Bryant; Lloyd A. Williams, president of the Greater Harlem Chamber of Commerce (GHCC); vice president of sales at Coca-Cola Enterprises, Jerry Garavell; and senior philanthropic advisor at Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors, Richard F. McKeon. The breakfast, which also celebrated Operation HOPE's new Harlem Center was co-hosted by DYCD and GHCC, and sponsored by Columbia University, Coca-Cola, and American Legacy Magazine.

"Great careers are built on great first jobs. It is essential that we provide young people with access to high-quality employment opportunities that will foster the skills and habits they need to achieve professional success and to lead our economy," said Deputy Mayor Walcott. "CAPITAL is a business proposition that benefits both parties: employers gain access to a diverse pool of high-potential employees, and interns can gain experience first-hand from the corporate world."

community relations, it is also good for the bottom line," said DYCD Commissioner Jeanne B. Mullgrav. "The interns are hard-working, poised, and thoroughly prepared, and the employers are excited to be working with young people who can help them build a foundation for future success. New Yorkers have good reason to be optimistic about tomorrow's economy."

CAPITAL is a public-private initiative supported by some of the City's leading businesses. In 2006, its inaugural year, CAPITAL provided paid summer internships in corporate settings for 50 young men and women who had previously distinguished themselves in the City's Summer Youth Employ-

ment Program (SYEP), which is administered by DYCD.

CAPITAL employers agree to provide paid summer internships for a minimum of 25 hours per week, for seven weeks; interns earn at least the minimum wage.
