Family Therapy Intervention Pilot

The Family Therapy Intervention Pilot (FTIP) is a city-funded initiative that helps youth remain in or return to the family home by promoting families' acceptance of their lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or questioning (LGBTQ) children and providing free services to reduce negative outcomes experienced by LGBTQ youth.

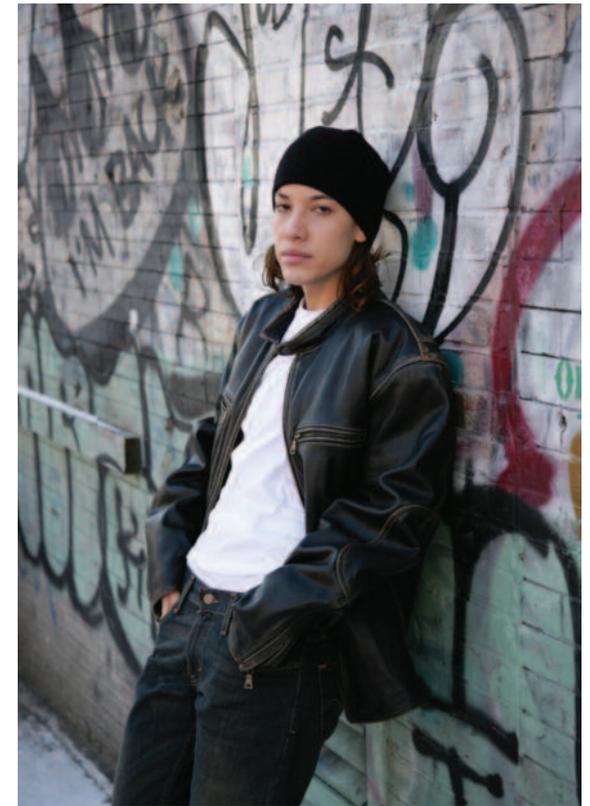
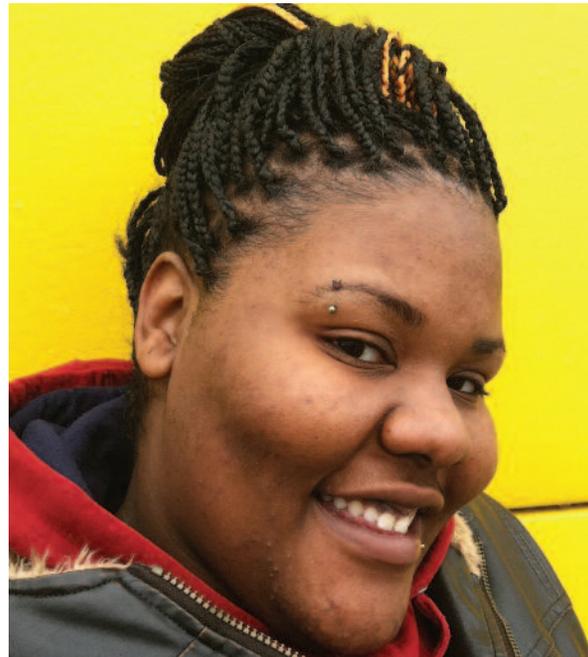


Partnering with Families and Communities

SCO Family of Services and Green Chimneys share the belief that the entire family is the focus of service. Our staff and programs respect and appreciate diversity among the families and communities we serve.

FTIP services are free and offer:

- Home and community-based clinical and wraparound services in all five New York City boroughs
- Solution focused counseling
- Positive non-judgmental therapists
- Appointments scheduled around family availability
- A chance for parents and youth to be heard
- Individual and group counseling
- Connections to positive community supports



Know the Facts

- 42% of NYC homeless teens are LGBTQ-identified
- LGBTQ youth are 62% more likely to attempt suicide than their heterosexual peers
- 58% of homeless LGBTQ youth have been sexually assaulted
- More than a third of LGBTQ youth of color experience violence in school because of their sexual orientation
- LGBTQ youth who experience high levels of family rejection during adolescence are 3.4 times more likely to use illegal drugs
