**Images of the Afterlife: Depicting Ancient Egypt in the Nineteenth Century**

Drawing upon early nineteenth-century lithographs and engravings, and early photographs, available on the NYPL Digital Gallery website, this presentation will focus on ancient Egyptian ideas of the afterlife. The digital images, from the holdings of the Asian and Middle Eastern Division and other New York Public Library collections, will include images produced by the early European explorers and archaeologists who rediscovered ancient Egyptian culture, beginning with the Napoleonic invasion of Egypt in 1798. The presentation will include an overview of the process of rediscovery, then focus on burial preparations and ritual, and the mythical journey of the deceased through the underworld, and conclude with vivid nineteenth-century images, many in brilliant color, of a number of important ancient Egyptian tombs that were among the first to be rediscovered.
