Jan. 3<sup>rd</sup> Lt. John Martinson of Engine 249 dies from critical injuries sustained while battling a fire in the Ebbets Field Houses in Brooklyn.

Feb. 11<sup>th</sup> Fire Commissioner Scoppetta launches the largest fire safety campaign in FDNY history

March 20<sup>th</sup> 97<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Triangle Shirt Fire

May 28<sup>th</sup> The City Council enacted a new Fire Code for New York City which took effect on July 1, 2008.

June 4th FDNY celebrated the first combined Fire and EMS Medal Day ceremony in the Department's history.

June 23<sup>rd</sup> A plaque dedication and street renaming ceremony honoring Firefighter Daniel F. Pujdak of Ladder 146 who made the Supreme Sacrifice while operating at an all-hands fire at Brooklyn Box 0247

# Significant Events Continued

June 26<sup>th</sup> The FDNY High School for Fire and Life Safety celebrated its first graduation ceremony with 35 students receiving their diplomas.

June 30<sup>th</sup> 276 probationary firefighters graduated from the Fire Academy.

July 4th: Two firefighters from the FDNY Marine Unit made a daring rescue in violent waters when a party boat ran aground on a rock jetty in Brooklyn.

Aug. 28th: The FDNY Boxing Team donates \$10,000 to the Wounded Warriors Project.

Sept: FDNY's Incident Management Teams arrives in Baton Rogue La. to assist in recovery efforts following Hurricane Gustav

Oct: Seventh class of the FDNY Officers Management Institute (FOMI) begins.

Nov. 11th Firefighter Jamel M. Sears died at Mt. Sinai Medical Center where he was taken after falling unconscious following completion of a training exercise at the Department's Randall's Island Training Academy.

Nov. 23<sup>rd</sup> Lieutenant Robert J. Ryan Jr. died at Richmond University Medical Center after he sustained injuries operating at a 2nd Alarm fire at 39 Van Buren St. Staten Island.

Nov. 29th Augustus (Gus) Beekman, a 33-year-veteran of the FDNY and the second African-American fire commissioner in the Department's history, passed away.

Dec. 15<sup>th</sup> Graduation ceremony on the USS Intrepid for 286 probationary firefighters, one of the most diverse in the Department's history.
