TJC READINESS AND TIPS: JOINT COMMISSION SURVEY

Harlem Hospital Center began its preparation for the next survey by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (TJC). The survey is unannounced.

TJC is an independent, not-for-profit organization that evaluates and accredits healthcare organizations. The goal is to help an organization improve the quality of care. During a survey, hospitals and other organizations are measured against standards in important functions such as leadership, patient care, performance improvement, and maintaining a safe environment. Here are a few tips which can help you prepare for the survey:

Tips for Talking to Surveyors

- Think carefully before answering questions. Take time to consider what the surveyor wants to know.
 Be sure to ask questions if you don't understand something.
- Be honest. If you don't know an answer, don't guess. Tell the surveyor how you would find an answer. This could include asking your supervisor, or referencing a policy or written document.
- Reply to surveyor's questions directly and concisely.
- If you are asked to participate in a group interview, make sure you attend and arrive on time!

- Be prepared and relax. This is the time to answer with confidence.
- Be friendly and polite.

Things that you would expect from the surveyors on the patient units:

During this time a surveyor may:

- Talk with different staff members, including medical staff, nursing staff, managers, patient care interdisciplinary team members, and support staff.
- Discuss policies and procedures, staffing and /or other patient care issues.
- Observe procedures in action and determine how well the staff delivers care and interacts with the patients and families.
- Review patient charts closely. The surveyor may pick a chart(s) on each unit for in-depth evaluation.
- Ask the caregivers about how they work together on the patient's assessments, care plan and education.
- Inquire about National Patient Safety Goals and what you have done to improve patient safety.
- Meet with the patients that give their permission to be interviewed.

They may ask patients what they know about their medications, treatment, and/or care plan, and who their caregivers are.

Let's work together and have a successful survey.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH FACTS

In honor of Black History Month, Harlem Hospital Center's Employee Recognition Committee invites you join in a time of reflection with Black History Month Facts. Here are some reminders of the triumphs of African Americans:

On **February 18**, **1913**, the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority was incorporated at Howard University.

Shani Davis became the first African American to win an individual gold medal at the Winter Olympics (for long track speed skating) on **February 18**, **2006**.

Vonetta Flowers became the first black gold medalist in the history of the Winter Olympic Games. She and partner Jull Brakken won the inaugural women's twoperson bobsled event on **February 19**, **2002**, at Salt Lake City, Utah.

Violin virtuoso, George Bridgetower, made his London debut on **February 19, 1790**.

Frederick Douglass died on **February 20**, **1895**. Douglass was the leading Black spokesman for almost fifty years. He was a major abolitionist and a lecturer and editor. He was 78 years old.

Charles Wade Barkley, basketball player, was born Leeds, AL, **February 20, 1963**.

On **February 21**, **1987**, African Americans in Tampa, Florida rebelled after an African American man was killed by a white police officer while in custody.

Known by her stage name Nina Simone, the American singer, songwriter, pianist, arranger, and civil rights activist who was widely associated with jazz music, was born Eunice Kathleen Waymon in Tyson, NC on **February 21, 1033**.

Julius Winfield ("Dr.J") Erving, former basketball player, was born Roosevelt, NY, on **Feb 22, 1950**.

On **February 22**, **1989**, DJ Jazzy Jeff and the Fresh Prince won the first rap Grammy for the hit single "Parents Just Don't Understand."

Colonel Frederick Gregory became the first African American to command a space shuttle mission on **February 22**, **1989** on board the Orbiter Challenger.
