The Psychiatry Department knows it takes a team to provide quality customer service and to save a life. Nurse Ray King, Ms. Robin Scott, Mr. Gary Clemons, and Ms. Yvonne McDowell were caught in the act for working together to get necessary help to an individual in need. Nurse King received a call at the CPEP nursing station from a woman in the community who reported her desire to commit

suicide; Nurse King not only knew what to do, he did it successfully.

Coordinated communication between the staff in CPEP allowed the team to immediately spring into action. Mr. Clemens and Ms. Scott contacted the Mobile Crisis Team as Mr. king continued to counsel, console and listen to the person in need. Ms. McDowell recognized the emergency and contacted 911. The 911 operator remained on the line with Ms. McDowell until police found the location. Nurse King continued talking and listening for signs of EMS and the NYPD arrival. Once they arrived it was Mr. King that convinced the patient to open her door and let help in. The patient was taken to her local Psychiatric Emergency Room safe and Thank you to this team. sound.

INFLUENZA VACCINE UPDATE

All NYC employees are encouraged to protect yourselves from both H1N1 and seasonal influenza by getting vaccinated. Vaccine supplies are limited both nationally and in NYC, so health care providers are reserving the vaccines for individuals in priority groups. If you fall into any of these groups, you may need one or both vaccines and should get vaccinated by your doctor or at a local clinic.

PRIORITY GROUPS FOR
SEASONAL INFLUENZA VACCINE:
Pregnant women, all health care
workers, 6 month to 18 year olds, 19
thru 49 years of age with an
underlying health condition* that
increases the risk of severe illness or

complications from the flu, adults 50 and older, and finally, anyone living with or caring for infants under 6 months.

FOR H1N1 INFLUENZA VACCINE:
In addition to a seasonal flu
vaccination, the following should also
receive the H1N1 vaccine:
Pregnant women, all health care
workers, anyone 6 months through 24
years of age, 25 through 64 years of

workers, anyone 6 months through <u>24</u> years of age, <u>25</u> through <u>64</u> years of age who has an *underlying health* condition,* or anyone who lives with or cares for infants under 6 months.

*Underlying health conditions include asthma, heart disease, diabetes, cancer, blood disorders, kidney disorders, liver disorders, neurological disorders, neuromuscular disorders, and weakened immune systems.

- 1. Test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors frequently to ensure they are working properly.

- 4. Avoid overloading electrical outlets.
