NEW YORK CITY LAW DEPARTMENT PREVAILS IN SEXUAL HARASSMENT CASE AGAINST POLICE DEPARTMENT

JURY REJECTS PLAINTIFFS' CLAIMS OF A HOSTILE WORK ENVIRONMENT AND INTERNAL RETALIATION.

New York, February 14, 2003-- A jury in the U.S. District Court in Brooklyn rejected the claims by Police Lieutenant Michele Jarman-Brown and her husband, retired Capt. Robert Brown, that she was subjected to a hostile work environment during 19 months as an undercover officer. Jarman-Brown had charged that nine police officers and supervisors had been involved in creating the hostile work environment and retaliating against her and her husband after she complained about the alleged abuse.

The nine officers and supervisors maintained that Jarman-Brown had concocted the story when she realized she was going to be transferred out of her assignment. During the two-and-a-half-week trial, it appeared that Jarman-Brown may have even planted a copy of Hustler magazine in her own desk in order to support her claims.

The plaintiffs ultimately withdrew their claims against four of the police officers and the judge, Honorable Jack B. Weinstein, dismissed the claims against two additional police officials before submitting the case to the jury. The jury rejected the story told by Jarman-Brown and her husband as they returned a verdict in favor of the remaining defendants Lt. Falco, Capt. Alifano and retired Inspector Storch, with the exception of the award of one dollar to retired Capt. Robert Brown.

Patricia Miller, an Assistant Corporation Counsel in the Law Department's Labor and Employment Law Division, who defended the City and the police officers at trial, stated: "The defendants have said all along that plaintiffs' claims of hostile work environment and retaliation were fabricated. The plaintiffs chose to malign the individual defendants in the press. The only vindication for these officers and the Police Department is this jury's verdict." Ruby Brown, a Senior Counsel in Labor and Employment, rounded out the Law Department's legal team.
