## NEW YORK CITY LAW DEPARTMENT WINS VICTORY IN EMILIO R. ADOPTION CASE

## APPELLATE DIVISION GRANTS JOINT ADOPTION SOUGHT BY TWO COHABITING UNMARRIED PERSONS, NEITHER OF WHOM IS THE CHILD'S BIOLOGICAL PARENT.

New York, May 13, 2002 -- In a case apparently of first impression in appellate courts in this jurisdiction, the Appellate Division, First Department last Thursday granted an unmarried cohabiting couple's joint petition to adopt a child who is not the biological child of either adoptive parent. The Appellate Division reversed a Bronx County Family Court order which had denied the joint adoption by the unmarried couple on the grounds that they lacked standing in the joint adoption under New York's adoption statute, Domestic Relations Law § 110, and that the child's best interests would not be promoted by the petitioners' voluntary, at-will relationship lacking legal status or protection.

In reversing the Family Court's order and granting the adoption petition, the Appellate Division held that under the Court of Appeals' ruling in Matter of Jacob, 86 N.Y.2d 651 (1995), the adoption statute is indeed broad enough to encompass adoption by an unmarried couple, which in this case would certainly be in the child's best interests. The Court said that D.R.L. § 110 does not prohibit a joint adoption by an unmarried couple, neither of whom is the child's biological parent. The Court considered other factors in this case in approving the adoption, noting the blood relationship of one of the adoptive parents to the child, leading to the couple's long-term foster care, and finding that the child's best interests would unquestionably be furthered by the adoptive parents' long-standing nurturing family setting and "good faith and exemplary parental performance."

"This is a significant victory for adoptive parents," said Leonard Koerner, Chief of the New York City Law Department's Appeals Division. "We are pleased with the Court's decision."
