## NEW YORK CITY FILES SUIT AGAINST 44 PHARMACEUTICAL COMPANIES AND THEIR SUBSIDIARIES FOR FRAUDULENT SCHEMES THAT ALLEGEDLY INFLATED THE COST OF DRUGS TO ITS MEDICAID PROGRAM

FOLLOWING THE FILING IN MAY OF THREE ADDITIONAL ANTITRUST AND MEDICAID FRAUD SUITS INVOLVING ALLEGED PATENT ABUSES, THESE SUITS CONTINUE THE CITY'S CONCERTED EFFORT TO RECOUP MONEY FOR TAXPAYERS FROM DRUG OVERCHARGES, AND TO PREVENT PHARMACEUTICAL FRAUD

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New York, August 5, 2004 – The City of New York filed a complaint in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York late yesterday against 44 pharmaceutical companies and their subsidiaries. The defendants are listed below. The complaint alleges that the defendants engaged in fraudulent and deceptive conduct resulting in millions of dollars of overcharges to the City's Medicaid budget. The City alleges violations of Federal and State Medicaid law, Medicaid and common law fraud, breach of contract, unfair and deceptive trade practices, and unjust enrichment.

The City seeks to recover its 25 percent share of Medicaid overpayments made on behalf of New York City residents. In 2003 alone, the Federal, State and local share of Medicaid payments for pharmaceuticals (including many of the drugs manufactured by the defendants) exceeded \$2.3 billion. The overcharges alleged in the complaint amount to many millions of dollars, allocated among hundreds of different drugs. As permitted by State Medicaid fraud law, the City also seeks triple damages from each company for its overcharges.

The complaint alleges two fraudulent and deceptive schemes: first, that defendants inflated the Average Wholesale Prices, which are used to calculate Medicaid reimbursements for prescription drugs; and second, that by reporting false, inflated and misleading pricing information, they underpaid the Medicaid rebates that the Federal Medicaid statute requires. Many of the claims alleged in the complaint have been previously substantiated by numerous Federal investigations, including Congressional investigations, and by Federal criminal and civil actions against some of the defendants named in the City's complaint.

"The City has recently brought three other lawsuits concerning overpricing by abuse of patent laws. By this broader lawsuit, the City extends its effort to rein in the widespread fraudulent practices that unlawfully inflate the City's Medicaid costs," said Michael Cardozo, Corporation Counsel of the City of New York. "The City's Medicaid payments, of which drug payments comprise a substantial share, reflect over 13 percent of the entire City budget. The suit we have filed yesterday, along with the other drug suits we filed recently, is an important step in the City's efforts to control Medicaid costs."
