CITY'S BRONX TORT DIVISION PREVAILS IN FALSE ARREST CASE WHERE COUPLE HAD KEPT DAUGHTER CHAINED TO A RADIATOR

BRONX JURY REJECTS CLAIM OF PARENTS WHO HAD CHAINED THEIR DAUGHTER TO KEEP HER OFF THE STREETS; VERDICT IS THIRD BRONX TORT WIN IN A WEEK

New York, Nov. 25, 2004 – After a monthlong trial, a Bronx jury late yesterday returned a verdict in favor of New York City in a case brought by two parents who claimed they should not have been arrested for keeping their teenage daughter chained in their apartment. With this verdict, the New York City Law Department's Bronx office has prevailed in three straight cases in the last week.

Maria and Eliezer Marrero were arrested on Sept. 13, 1991, because they chained their 15 year-old daughter to a radiator in their apartment to keep her off of the streets. The arrests were made after a visiting nurse reported the chaining to a child abuse hotline. When child welfare workers and police got to the apartment, they, too, observed the child in chains. The daughter had been using drugs for two years, and the parents justified their action – which they admitted having been doing for two months – as a desperate measure designed to protect her.

The plaintiffs asked the jury to find that their conduct was not criminal and to award them \$900,000. Yet, after deliberating for only two hours, the jury returned with a verdict in favor of the City, resulting in no award.

Assistant Corporation Counsel Lavanya Pisupati, who represented the City, said, "The officers did exactly what they were supposed to do. The child was chained inside her apartment, unable to get out in case of an emergency, for example. The parents' actions – no matter how well-intentioned – resulted in an unreasonable situation that supported police intervention at the time." After the arrests occurred, the Marreros were held in jail for three days before bail was reduced. The daughter was placed in a drug treatment program. The charges against her parents were later dismissed.

In addition to the Marrero jury verdict, the Law Department prevailed in two "trip and fall" cases in the Bronx in the last week. The Law Department's web site includes a press release covering these verdicts as well.
