Community Board 12, Manhattan Minutes for the Public Safety Committee Meeting January 16th, 2019 – Conference Room 530 West 166th Street – 6th Floor New York, NY 10032

Welcome, Opening Remarks and Agenda

Mary O'Shaughnessy, Interim Public Safety Committee Chair, called the meeting to order at 7:05 pm. The meeting was recorded to a digital audio file on an OLYMPUS© handheld device. Board members introduced themselves as did members of city agencies and the public. A quorum was established for the meeting.

Transit/MTA Elevator Construction

A discussion ensued about the effect of construction materials on traffic at Broadway and 168th Street. Ms. Parker of NYC Transit acknowledged the removal of the bus stop at 168th and Broadway, and that signage is in place directing riders to 165th or 170th Street stops. A question arose as to the status of the newspaper stand, which was closed. Jerry Culligan, a local resident, noted that the southwest gate to the station is exit only, and the lighting is inadequate. Board chair Richard Lewis noted that the ADA access is not in place for the entire station, and Ms. Parker responded that compliance would be unreasonably expensive.

It was stated that the Health and Human Services committee has raised the issue of needles in the stairwells at 181st Street, with the NCO officers. The Transit NCO officers stated that the 24/7 team has been relocated from 168th Street to 181st street, and that they have inspected the station 194 times since the relocation. Laurence Magnello is the station manager there. 4 arrests have been made, and summonses issued. They are working in cooperation with the BRC to intervene with persons in need of, and desiring, a place away from the streets. Liz Evans, who runs the Washington Heights Corner Project, is also involved.

Board Chair Lewis informed the attendees that a resolution would be presented at the general meeting on the 26th.

NYPD Transit (PO Batz)

PO Batz presented on current topics related to transit safety. Recent incidents of robbery have been targeted at people who are asleep on the subway. If you are feeling sleepy, stand up. Pocket cutters work slowly and quietly on sleeping victims. Police will wake riders up, and they are not being rude in doing so. The video circulating of the arrest at 168th street does show 2 men who are regularly arrested, resisting the officers. The NYPD does deal with quality of life violations, and they focus on activity in warmer stations.

NYPD 33 Precinct (Lt Concepción)

Record low numbers of major crimes. Felony assaults are primarily domestic violence incidents, and the precinct engages in awareness outreaches to neighbors. Robbery is up due to cellphone theft. There has been a spate of burglaries, traced to a person who goes in through windows.

A male was shot in the right leg in front of 454 West 155 Street, apparently self-inflicting, in the morning of 1/16. The firearm was recovered.

NYPD 34 Precinct (Lt Contreras):

Crime was down in 2018 from 2017, overall, but there were increases in rapes (5 vs 0), robberies (21 vs 18), and felonies (25 vs 17). A rash in burglaries committed via the window and fire escape is occurring; if you see someone on your fire escape, call 911 right away. There is increasing identity theft, and credit card thefts are automatically grand larceny felonies.

Success Academy Traffic Conversation:

The conversation touched on drop-offs on Cabrini Boulevard and Fort Washington Avenue. Elementary schools have no standing for drop-offs, according to city policy. Signs for this no standing policy have been added. High schools have different rules. Member Katherine Diaz noted that Cabrini is a one-way street. Board Chair Lewis noted that the limited timeframe for the drop-offs came from the school.

Washington Heights Office of Manhattan District Attorney (Joseline Minaya, Director)

The DA domestic violence units are working with survivors of abuse who are in need of U Visas, VAWA (Violence Against Women Act) immigration processes, and helps track arraignments, papers for criminal orders of protection, and connects survivors with social workers and other resources.

Board Chair Lewis showed an informative short film explaining harm reduction as it works for users of illegal drugs.


