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Rolling out .nyc, the web's new top-level domain.

On October 8, at long last, any New Yorker, organization, or business with a physical New York City address will be able to register a virtual address on the web using a .nyc top-level domain (TLD) instead of ".com" or ".org," or any other TLD. I fought to establish .nyc back when I served on the City Council, and now that the domain has come to fruition, it's exciting to watch the first .nyc sites go "live."

The process is fairly simple: visit www.ownit.nyc, enter the URL you'd like to register, and if it's available, buy it using one of the domain registrar services listed. Be sure to comparison shop, because registrars set their own pricing—but it's usually no more than \$50 a year.

The .nyc domain is the topic of my edition of the monthly cable program on MNN, *Represent NYC*, which airs Sunday, October 5, at 7:00 pm, and repeats Wednesday, October 8, at 9:00 pm on MNN1 (Channel 34 of TWC, Ch. 82 on RCN, and FiOS Ch. 33). My guests are Ana Guzman from the company running *ownit.nyc*, Ken Biberaj of the Russian Tea Room, which has already reserved *russiantearoom.nyc*, and Betsy Bober Polivy, whose Manhattan Sideways website, *sideways.nyc*, profiles Manhattan small businesses located on sidestreets.

Open House New York comes to the MBPO Map Room October 11.

We're excited to be opening our offices as part of the Open House New York (OHNY) Weekend, the annual event that allows visitors and locals to go behind the scenes in parts of New York that aren't ordinarily open to the public.

Fresh Food for Seniors expands to Northern Manhattan.

We're excited to expand our senior produce program to Northern Manhattan, which allows seniors to order a mixed bag of fresh, locally grown fruit and vegetables from local farmers for only \$8. The program is pay-as-you-go, cash-only, one week ahead of each Tuesday delivery date. In partnership with Corbin Hill Food Project and The Doe Fund, participating seniors, home health aides, and staff at Central Harlem Senior Citizens' Center (34 W. 134th St.) and the Carver Neighborhood Center (55 E. 102nd St.) will receive their first delivery on Tuesday, October 7. Dept. of Sanitation opens February exams for workers, but you must register this month.
