20 Public Session

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Assembly Member Dick Gottfried reported on the Governor's findings about government spending. He commented on how he thought the Governor's budget cuts maybe doing more damage than good. He believes that the spending cuts should come from more wealthy New Yorkers contributing more to the state taxes. He also reported on the Governor's Medicaid Redesign Team. He believes that there will be a struggle when dealing with the budget.

Congressman Jerry Nadler spoke about the Health Care Bill and thinks that we are better off with it then without it. The economy is going great in that the stock market is moving up and that corporate profits are the highest they've ever been, but unemployment remains high. More money needs to be brought into circulation so more people will spend thus creating jobs. Congressman Nadler does not think we should cut spending for fear of a double dip recession. Congressman also spoke of the transportation bill. He mentioned that Governor Christie of NJ cancellation of the ARC Tunnel project stating that the \$2.8 billion that was originally ear marked for the project will go back into the NJ Transit Trust.

- Paul Clements spoke in favor of the Park on 20th Street. Stated that it was not low income housing that it was affordable housing.
- Pamela Wolf speaking in favor of the 20th Street Park Project. Believes that there are no alternatives to create a new public park.
- 6 Ellen Binder speaking in favor of the park. Not opposed to affordable housing but she is opposed to any housing 7 constructed on city property. She believes that the area has every amenity but open space.
- 8 Chris Winslow is in favor of the park; the area ranks last in public open space in Manhattan. Believes the location 9 on 20th Street would be strategically placed in the middle of an area with the need for open space.
- Justin Hoy, co president of Save Chelsea defended the CB and believes that both issues are equally important.
 Matt Weis spoke in favor of the park. He believes the district ranks No. 1 in affordable housing but dead last in
- 12 public parks.
- Sally Greenspan is in support of having both the park on 20th street as well as affordable housing. However she
 believes that the park location should be a park.
- 15 Jeffrey Croft, President of the NYC Park Advocacy Group, stated that District 4 ranks last in public open spaces.
- 16 The last park was built 43 years ago. Believes that this community needs parks and not more affordable housing. 17 He would like to see more elected officials get involved in their cause.
- 18 Miguel Acevedo believes that the discussion should be truthful. Believes that the gentrification of Chelsea is
- 19 pushing out all of the residents who qualify for affordable housing. Supports the park but believes that it is more 20 important to have a roof over your head for a family of four then to have a park for a select few kids to play in.
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 21 Tom Taylor Chair of the Lawn Committee at Clinton Garden. Supports parks but believes there should be mo

- 24 Mike Green, Chelsea resident since 1978 supports the park.
- Gloria Comacho does not want to see Sacred Heart to move into Holy Cross. She believes the character of Holy
 Cross will be damaged.
- Hilda Rivera a former CB 4 board member would like to see the CB reconsider their decision for the Park and is in support of the park.
- 29 A student of Holy Cross spoke in favor of not having Holy Cross and Sacred Heart combined
- 30 Binh Mah a student spoke in favor of not having Holy Cross and Sacred Heart combining.
- Lisa Guerra is very grateful for Holy Cross, and has been accepted to two of the top Catholic Schools in the city.
 Save Holy Cross.
- Bob Sussman living on 20th street and is in favor of the park.
- 34 Jenny Whippets spoke in favor of the park. She believes a park in the neighborhood will be a better building block 35 then affordable housing. Believes the park would be the ultimate good for the community.
- 36 Shakira Moran closing sacred heart would be bad and impossible for her to work.
- 37 Dan O' Sullivan spoke in favor for the park.
- 38 Kim Miller Mother of a Holy Cross student. She is very upset about the merger. Believes the Holy Cross faculty is 39 the best because of Sister Mary. She wants to save Holy Cross
- Eva LeClaire mother of 4 who wants all of her kids to go to Holy Cross. She wants every opportunity for Holy Cross
 that other schools have. She believes that closing one parochial school will greatly affect the community.
- 42 Jehuda Bach representing Hudson Guild announced that there is free tax service at the Guild. Made other various 43 announcements of upcoming events at the Guild.
- 44 Ronnie Tuft moved into Chelsea 30 years ago, and has seen the community blossomed and advocates for the park.
- Angela Perez spoke in favor of saving Holy Cross. She can not send her kid to another school because she would not be able to afford it.
- 47 Sam Glassman resident of 20th Street supports the Park.
- Nancy Holmstrom strongly agrees that gentrification is a problem. She is in support of the park as it is a public
 good.
- 50 Lindsay Gansom who works for transportation alternatives looking for support from CB4 with more speed cameras.
- 51 Antoinette Thorpe is a mother of a Holy Cross student. She was unaware that Holy Cross would be closed and
- 52 believes that it would be a great disservice if the school were to close.
- Karen Smith a Chelsea resident for 49 years. The community has changed and believes that there should be more
 affordable housing. Is against the park but believes there should be more affordable housing.
- 55 Michael Cantegreenie is in favor of the park. Believes there should be more of a balance, as the Park has become 56 an issue of class.
- 57 Angela Castro, class of '93, and is now a Mother of a Holy Cross student and is in favor of saving Holy Cross.
- Jim Friedlich longtime Chelsea resident and although he supports affordable housing he supports the Park on 20th
 Street more.
