## Re: Direction Signage for West 19<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> Streets between 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue and Route 9A

Dear Commission Forgione:

Manhattan Community Board 4 hereby requests the following changes and additions to both the intersections of West 19<sup>th</sup> Street and 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue, and West 21<sup>st</sup> Street and 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue i) that clear and visible signage be posted, ii) that traffic signaling indicate that all traffic must proceed northbound when at both the Eastbound (coming from Route 9A) and the westbound crossing of West 19<sup>th</sup> Street and 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue, and iii) that left hand turns are prohibited from 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue onto 19<sup>th</sup> Street.

Currently, both West 19<sup>th</sup> Street and West 21<sup>st</sup> Street from 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue to Route 9A run eastbound, opposite to the direction of these same streets further east. A study done earlier this year by Philip Habib, the consultant for Georgetown West 19<sup>th</sup> Street, the developer of the Interactive Corporation building on Route 9A between 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> Street, found that approximately 41 cars each day (or 2% of the daily volume) go a wrong direction, primarily those illegally going west on West 19<sup>th</sup> Street across 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue to Route 9A. The same configuration at 21<sup>st</sup> Street causes a number of cars to go the wrong direction as well.

The expected increased traffic, automotive and pedestrian, resulting from the opening of the IAC building, the changes due to the Chelsea rezoning and Chelsea Piers' intention to change their exit from West 24<sup>th</sup> Street to West 17<sup>th</sup> Street increase the potential for accidents.

More specifically, we propose the following for both the 19<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> Streets intersections at 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue:

- Large, visible signage both mid-block and at the corner of West 19<sup>th</sup> Street and 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue facing east. The same should be installed on 21<sup>st</sup> street.
- Traffic light signaling right turn at 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue when approaching from the east and one signaling left turn when approaching from the West;
- No Left Turn signs when approaching from the south on 10<sup>th</sup> Avenue
- No Right Turn signs when approaching from the west (eastbound from Route 9A)

We thank the Department of Transportation for considering this proposal. We expect that these changes will reduce the number of illegal car movements at this intersection and decrease the potential for accidents.
