Adoption of the Agenda

PUBLIC SESSION

Julie Hendricks representing A/M Jonathan Bing gave a brief summary on the Legislative Reforms Package in the State Assembly. She reported the Assembly has recently passed a number of rule changes in January. The new reforms are designed to make the Assembly more open and efficient. A/M Bing co-sponsored these reforms and was an original co-sponsor of A/M Stringer's reform resolution based on the Brennan Center's report on the Legislature.

She also reported that the Assembly recently passed a series of bills aimed at protecting Mitchell-Lama tenants and the supply of affordable housing in NYC. The Assembly's legislation would provide incentives for landlords to stay in the Mitchell-Lama program (A.2454), a bill sponsored by A/M/Bing; requires early notification for buy-outs,(A.459); extends from 20 to 50 years the period of time before limited-profit housing companies dissolve(A.460); and extend rent regulations to NYC tenants in buildings owned by limited-profit housing companies that buy-out(A.458). Julie stated A/M Bing a member of the Assembly's Housing Committee built on his commitment to affordable housing last year, by sponsoring a forum to discuss the preservation of Mitchell Lama and affordable housing on the East Side.

Julie additionally reported that A/M Bing's office has been contacted by numerous residents in the CB6 area opposing the opening of a new bar @862 2nd Ave on 46th Street. She stated that their office has been monitoring the situation very closely.

She then announced that she is leaving A/M Bing's office and Barry Klein will be the new CB6 liaison.

Aliya Feldman representing Sen. Thomas Duane gave a brief summary on some of his activities.

She reported that on February 5th @ City Hall Sen. Duane, community leaders and numerous other elected officials demanded that the City drop any appeal of the court ruling supporting civil marriage for same-sex couples.

She then reported that Sen. Duane presented testimony to the Parks, Landmarks & Cultural Affairs committee in support of Peter Cooper Village/Stuyvesant Town being designated as a NYC landmark or historic district. He also wrote a letter to DOT to express his concern about the lack of parking spaces for the disabled in Stuyvesant Town.

John Fout representing C/M Margarita Lopez reported that the C/M is concerned about the MTA's plan to operate computer-operated trains and the use of the Canarsie L line, as it's testing ground. C/M Lopez believes that having the motorman & conductor on the train is a deterrent for potential problems and/or danger in the transit system.

He then reported that C/M Lopez joined with C/M's Rivera & Weprin to urge the Federal Banking industry to halt it's efforts in weakening the nation's successful Community Reinvestment Act by amending the regulations and guidelines governing the banking industry. C/M Lopez indicated that the Community Reinvestment Act is an integral part of revitalizing poor communities.

He also reported that C/M Lopez joined numerous activist and leaders at a press conference to rally in support of Manhattan Supreme Courts courage to stand up for same-sex civil marriages. C/M Lopez remarked that this issue is a matter of equal rights that are protected by our nations constitution.

BUSINESS SESSION

Chair's Report – Carol A. Schachter

Carol asked for a board member volunteer to attend the EMA Board of Directors meeting on Thursday, February 10th @ the Lighthouse, 111 E. 59th Street @ 8:00 a.m.

Carol then announced that the Friends of Gloria Benefield Scholarship a sector of the NAACP are giving Karen Gamble a Lifetime NAACP Membership Plaque.

Carol reported that as of March 31st, board member Andrew Kner would resign from the board.

District Manager's Report – Toni Carlina

Follow-up on the re-opening of 30th Street

Toni reported that the Medical Examiner's office has informed her that the State Dormitory Authority dropped the ball on this project. Toni informed board members that there are trailers on the site housing 40 to 50 HHC employees who are waiting to relocate to the Queens Hosp. Center, which is under construction. The contractor, Imperial Construction hired a sub-contractor to do the sewer connection; the problem is that the sub-contractor never had DEP inspect the completed job; they had to re-file with DEP, secure a video scope, and then arrange for a DEP inspection. At this point six additional weeks are needed. She has spoken with representatives of DEP who have stated that once they receive the paperwork they would expedite the inspection. However, even if they inspected tomorrow, it will take HHC another 2 to 3 weeks to disconnect all services to the trailers housing the HHC people, we will also try to expedite this.

Stuyvesant Cove Park issues

Toni then reported that a meeting has been arranged with EDC, CEC, DEC, DDC, Con Ed, CM Moskowitz, A/M Sanders and Sen. Duane to discuss Stuyvesant Cove Park issues. EDC was supposed to do an assessment 4-months ago of 3 lights that are always out and 3 that intermittently go out; this was never done.

She additionally reported that DEC has found some underground contamination; they now need to do additional monitoring. 10 to 17 wells need to be installed for testing purposes, this will create intrusive construction.

EDC water main construction project on PCV/ST 20th Street

Toni additionally reported that on Jan. 31st, she held an on-site meeting on the EDC water main construction project on PCV/ST 20th St. sidewalk. EDC has agreed to remove all curb cuts and replace them with pedestrian ramps except in front of 511 E. 20th, where the sidewalk and curb will be replaced eliminating any cuts. DOT has agreed to paint all new crosswalks at the pedestrian ramped areas and re-paint all other crosswalks. When the cuts are corrected, the Blue stone cannot be replaced, one reason is PCV management had ramped these areas with asphalt to allow construction and security vehicles access during inner roadway construction, the blue stone was mostly destroyed in these cut areas. She is trying to have matching pedestrian ramps placed on the opposite side on the cement medium on the opposite side of the street.

Treasurer's Report – Bea Disman

Bea gave a report on the money donated to the Sunshine Fund. She reported that 290.00 has been used for the Holiday Party & 200.00 was donated to the building staff for holiday tips. She said that since Toni had given her additional money today, at the next meeting she would tell the members what they have in the Fund, and thanked everyone for their generosity.

Borough President's Report – Brad Sussman

Brad made a few announcements. 1) Asian Lunar New Year Celebration Monday, February 28th, 6:00-7:30 pm @ City Hall Council Chambers. 2) The Borough President still has the photography exhibit, A Celebration of African-American History, titled Homecoming: The Return of the Ancestors, 1 Centre Street, 19th Floor South in the Borough Presidents Office, Monday –Friday, from 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. 3) Living Legends: Those Whose Shoulders We Stand On, Thursday, February 17th, 5:00 – 8:00 p.m.@ City Hall Council Chambers. 4) Celebration of Dominican Independence, Wednesday, March 2nd, 6:00-8:00 p.m.@ 515 Audubon Ave & 190th Street. COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. Housing & Homeless – Claude L. Winfield, Chair

a. Report

Claude reported that the Housing committee would continue to study and discuss Inclusionary zoning.

He also reported that the committee would discuss and adopt where appropriate, resolutions of support, for the NYS Assembly's recently passed legislation "Protecting Mitchell-Lama housing."

Claude than announced that on February 23rd, he would attend CB8's Public Hearing on Inclusionary Zoning. See committee minutes.

2. Parks, Landmarks & Cultural Affairs – Gary Papush, Chair

a. Report

Gary reported that the National Arts Club was once again in flagrant violation of the landmarks law and the board was seeking a violation order. If these frequent violations do not cease, the committee will seek to pass a resolution at the next meeting, and the NAC notified of possible board action. The committee was informed that James Capolino no longer represented the NAC and that Commissioner Tierney had been notified of this.

Gary reported on the public hearing of the possible historic designation of Peter Cooper Village/Stuyvesant Town. He stated community participation was great and the meeting was successful. He thanked everyone that attended the meeting. See committee minutes.

3. Public Safety – Fred Arcaro, Chair

a. Intro 465—Protection of domestic animals

Whereas, an amendment to the City of New York administrative code (Intro. 465) relating to the protection of domestic animals from injuries by dangerous dogs, and;

Whereas, section 121 of the New York State Agricultural and Markets Law protects people and certain animals from dangerous dogs, and recently State legislators passed a law to protect pets, such as dogs and cats, from such dangerous animals, and;

Whereas, there have been several cases sited of domestic dog being injured or killed by dangerous dogs, and;

Whereas, this Intro. 465 is intended insure that peaceful and lawfully kept pets need to be protected from dangerous dogs and owners who harbor such dangerous dogs, and;

Whereas, this Intro. 465 will amend section 17-342 of the administrative code of the city of New York, which is protect people from dangerous dog, by adding a new definition “domestic animal”; now

Therefore, be it

Resolved, that Community Board Six urges the City Council to pass Intro. 465 as soon as possible.

VOTE: 35 in Favor 0 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

b. The New York City Transit Authority (NYCTA) proposed closing of token booths.

Whereas, the New York City Transit Authority (NYCTA) has indicated that it will close 164 token booths, about nine in Community Board Six area, and;

Whereas, the phasing out of tokens and token booths has been made possible by the use of MetroCard vending machines in subway stations where patrons may purchase MetroCard without the aid of a clerk, and;

Whereas, these booths serves densely populated residential areas and, generally speaking, the lack of a staffed token drastically restricts disabled persons’ access to the system, makes life more difficult for the caring for children in strollers, and reduces the overall safety of the system for everyone, and;

Whereas, in the year 2000 alone, token booth attendants activated the emergency button located in their booth 60,186 times, for an average of 85 times per booths, per year and the mere presence of MTA employees in token booths also deters countless crimes from occurring, and;

Whereas, subway token both clerks perform vital safety functions such as calling for emergency services, providing riders with directions and alerting incoming trains of persons on the tracks, which would be lost if their current ranks are not maintained; now

Therefore, be it

1. **Resolved**, that Community Board Six opposes the closing of any token booths clerks since they perform vital safety functions, and the elimination of token booth clerks will leave many sections of stations, or entire stations, completely unstaffed, resulting in increase safety concerns for riders.

VOTE: 32 in Favor 1 Opposed 2 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

c. **Communication Based Train Control System on L Line**

Whereas, the New York City Transit Authority is presently installing and testing a Communications Based Train Control (“CBTC”) system on the Canarsie Line, and;

Whereas, revenue service of the new system is scheduled to begin until determined that the CBTC is ready for service by the System Safety Certification Board which is comprised of NYC Transit personnel, and;

Whereas, the CBTC system will cause trains on the Canarsie Line, more commonly known as the “L” train, to become computerized and communicate their position, speed and direction to wayside computers, and;

Whereas, it is the intention of the New York City Transit Authority to expand the CBTC system to all trains in the City of New York if the system is successful on the Canarsie Line, and;

Whereas, although present plans call for trains operated by the CBTC system to continue to be manned by trained conductors, there is no certainty that the New York City Transit Authority will not seek to remove trained conductors in the future, and;

Whereas, the CBTC system program would put undue burden on the one or two conductors, as it relates to the safety of transit riders, and;

Whereas, there are no plans for a safety evacuation of transit riders in the event of CBTC failure, and;

Whereas, there are no plans to establish redundant communication system for transit personnel and riders should CBTC system fails; now

Therefore, be it

Resolved, that Community Board Six opposes the implementation of a Communications Based Train Control system in its present form. However, if the system is implemented, City Council should demand from the New York City Transit Authority the following:

1. An evacuation plan in the event of system failure.
2. Plans to establish a redundant communication system for transit personnel and riders should CBTC system were to fail.
3. Place adequately trained conductors to provide enough help to transit riders in the event of an emergency.

VOTE: 20 in Favor 10 Opposed 5 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

Lou requested that this issue and the token booth issue be tabled and referred to the Transportation committee. Carol informed him that she had attended last months Borough Board meeting and the Borough President requested that the board come back as a body with these resolutions. She explained that this was an issue of time and it needed to be done now, therefore she had a decision to make and decided to place them in the Public Safety committee so that we could vote on them in time for the February Borough Board meeting.

Fred stated that he looked over the paperwork and found there were numerous public safety issues that needed to be addressed on these issues.

Lou appealed the Chair's decision and an open floor discussion ensued. A vote was taken on the appeal. The appeal was defeated.

A discussion on the resolution for the Communication based train control system on the L line ensued. Many board members expressed their disapproval of the computer-operated train.

Fred stated that the resolution does not specifically state we are against computer-controlled trains, just that there should be some human presence on them in case of an emergency.

Lou stated that computer operated trains are not a new idea. He said that they have been in use in several different countries, (Paris, Japan, London) for years without incidence and without personnel. The L line will have a staff operator who will have independent radio contact with the dispatcher at all times, independent of the radio control system of the train. He stated that this resolution has included in its resolve certain data, which is radically inaccurate. The Transportation committee has exacted that this board has a position, which it passed 4 years ago in support of CBTC when we approved a computer room in the northeast corner of 14th Street & 3rd Ave. The committee has stayed on top of and involved with this issue ever since.

Ellen Imbimbo stated that we should keep in mind that we are not voting against the CBTC, we are voting for improvements to it. That is really the key element here.

Marty Barrett stated that since Executive Committee can pass resolutions on an emergency basis; holding this item for a week would not hurt anybody, the two committee chairs and no other committee could meet on an ad-hoc basis between now and then and come up with a resolution that makes more sense and is better structured. He stated that this resolution doesn't refer to any prior resolution, which the board obviously passed a few years back.

A motion to table the resolution until Executive Committee meeting was brought before the body; A hand count vote was taken; It was defeated 18-17, a discussion on the resolution continued and the resolution was amended and voted on.

4. Human Services – Lyle Frank, Chair

a. Report

Lyle reported that there would be a ribbon cutting ceremony for the opening of the new Bellevue Ambulatory Care Building on Thursday, February 10th and that he would be in attendance.

He then reported Cg/M Carolyn Maloney attended last months committee meeting. She spoke at length about the 23rd Street V.A Hospital issue.

He announced that the Annenberg Foundation issue has been held over for the March committee meeting. See committee minutes.

5. Business & Governmental Affairs – Tim McGinn, Chair

- a. **Renewal, Unenclosed Sidewalk Café for 4 tables and 8 seats for Grouben Food Corp., d/b/a Bar 515, 515 3rd Avenue (bet East 34th & East 35th Streets) (DCA appl. #1103038)**

WHEREAS, the applicant appeared to address any community concerns; and

WHEREAS, no one from the community appeared to voice any opposition to the renewal; and

WHEREAS, there was no history of complaints regarding the establishment;

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board Six supports the application by Grouben Food Corp., d/b/a Bar 515 for renewal of its unenclosed sidewalk cafe.

VOTE: 35 in Favor 0 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

- b. **On-Premises Liquor License, Ohmsayin, Inc., d/b/a/ Embassy, 862 2nd Avenue @ East 46th Street**

WHEREAS, the applicant appeared before the committee and proposed an outdoor rooftop café for this establishment, with a capacity of 100 diners, in addition to a capacity of 100 diners in the downstairs portion of the restaurant; and

WHEREAS, the applicant informed us that the windows of the downstairs portion of the restaurant will be open during the warmer months; and

WHEREAS, the outdoor rooftop terrace will by its very nature be a source of undue noise and disturbance to the community, which will be further aggravated by the open windows; and

WHEREAS, the Community Board received petitions in opposition to the establishment signed by several hundred residents of the community, and also received numerous telephone calls in opposition, citing the undue noise and disturbance; and

WHEREAS, the establishment is located within 500 feet of other establishments having liquor licenses; now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board Six opposes, in the strongest terms possible, this application for an on-premises liquor license.

VOTE: 34 in Favor 1 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

c. Alteration of On-Premises Wine License, Pure Food & Wine, 54 Irving Place

WHEREAS, the applicant seeks to amend its on premises wine license so as to expand the size of the premises; and

WHEREAS, the extension would enlarge the capacity from 74 persons to 100; and

WHEREAS, the applicant came before our committee to address any community concerns, of which there were none; and

WHEREAS, there has been no history of community complaints regarding this establishment; now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board Six supports the application to amend the on-premises liquor license to permit these alterations to the establishment.

VOTE: 35 in Favor 0 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

d. On-Premises Liquor License, Crea LLC, d/b/a/ Ribot, 780 3rd Avenue bet. East 48th and East 49th Streets

WHEREAS, the applicant appeared before the committee to address any community concerns, of which there were none; and

WHEREAS, the applicant informed us that the establishment would be an upscale restaurant serving a European menu; and

WHEREAS, the establishment will have a total capacity of 70 people, 57 of which would be seated on the ground floor, and a bar with 7 stools; and

WHEREAS, the establishment will be open no later than 2:00 am; now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board Six supports this application for an on-premises liquor license.

VOTE: 33 in Favor 1 Opposed 1 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

e. **On-Premises Liquor License, Tony's Sushi & Grill, Inc., 720 2nd Avenue @ East 39th Street**

WHEREAS, the applicant came before our committee to address any community concerns, of which there were none, concerning this new establishment; and

WHEREAS, the applicant informed us that the establishment will close at 11:00 p.m. nightly and will play only background music; now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board Six supports the application for an on-premises liquor license at this time.

VOTE: 35 in Favor 0 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

f. **On-Premises Liquor License for Isshin Inc., d/b/a Tsushima, 141 E. 47th St., b/w Lex. & 3rd Aves.**

WHEREAS, the applicant failed to appear before the committee to answer any community concerns, despite being timely notified of the committee hearing; and

WHEREAS, it is the policy of Community Board Six to generate an automatic negative resolution for non-attendance; now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board Six opposes the application by Tsushima, 141 E. 47th St. for an on-premises liquor license.

g. On-Premises Beer & Wine License, First Taste Asian Grill, Inc., d/b/a Asian Grill Restaurant, 677-C Lexington Avenue @ East 56th Street

WHEREAS, the applicant came before our committee to address any community concerns, of which there were none, concerning this new establishment; and

WHEREAS, the applicant informed us that the establishment will close at 11:00 p.m. on weeknights and midnight on weekends and will not play music; now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board Six supports the application for an on-premises beer & wine license at this time.

VOTE: 35 in Favor 0 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

h. Transfer of On-Premises Beer & Wine License, Sushi of 59 Corp, 1075 1st Avenue bet East 58th and East 59th Streets

WHEREAS, the applicant came before our committee to address any community concerns; and

WHEREAS, the applicant informed us that the establishment will have the same owner, but a different corporate name, and will not alter the business in any significant manner; and

WHEREAS, the establishment will close at 11:00 pm nightly, and will not have music;

WHEREAS, there has been no history of community complaints regarding this establishment; now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board Six supports the application for the transfer of an on-premises beer and wine license at this time.

VOTE: 35 in Favor 0 Opposed 0 Abstention 0 Not Entitled

i. **Transfer of On-Premises Liquor License, TJ's NYC, Inc, 140 East 27th Street (bet. 3rd & Lexington Avenues)**

WHEREAS, the applicants came before our committee to address any community concerns; and

WHEREAS, the applicants recognized that the former establishment at this location (Mark Café/Concepts II) caused problems for the community, and indicated that they had already made plans to prevent such problems from being repeated; and

WHEREAS, the applicants indicated that the new establishment will be a neighborhood restaurant and bar; and

WHEREAS, the applicants signed a change agreement that they will install a new better sound system and smaller speakers, have a bouncer to insure security, and allow no promotions with outside sponsors; now

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that Community Board Six supports the application for the transfer of an on-premises liquor license at this time.

j. **On-Premises Liquor License for 384 3rd Avenue (bet. East 27th & 28th Streets)**

WHEREAS, the applicant failed to appear before the committee to answer any community concerns, despite being timely notified of the committee hearing; and

WHEREAS, the applicant failed to fill out the questionnaire required of all applicants; and
