**Adoption of the Agenda**, agenda was adopted

**Roll Call** – Aaron Humphrey

**Presentation: Dr. Flannigan - NYU Langone Institute:** 1) NYU wishes to maintain the Rusk institute's decades of success by rehabilitating the facilities. These changes include a newly opened Center for Musculoskeletal care, and a new Ambulatory Care center.

**Public Hearing: Rick Eggers, Budget Committee Chair** – In September and October the committee held meetings, which of course are open to the public to discuss the districts capital and expense budget priorities. We would like to offer the community one more opportunity to raise concerns on these priorities before the Board votes on it this evening. We do not look at dollar amounts for these projects, but we do rank them in order of what the Board feels most passionately about. If there are any questions please let us know.

**PUBLIC SESSION:**

**Eric Bottcher** representing **Gov. Cuomo reported:** 1) Read a letter from Gov. Cuomo expressing his gratitude to Mark Thompson, Chair for his service to CB6 and the Community.

**Assembly Member Dan Quart: 1)** I would really like to speak on one issue in particular and that is the Midtown rezoning proposal. I've submitted testimony, which is available on my website. There are several things that I would like city planning to look at in revising. First, the Midtown Zoning Study cited a study by Kushman and Wakefield concerning the need for office space and office development, as the basis for this Midtown Zoning proposal, but this does not look at Class A property. Also, the District Improvement Fund (DIF), which is something that I support, which would allow for more funds for transportation infrastructure. One problem is that the DIF does not allow for much flexibility in terms of the need for public spaces. Lastly, I think one of the most important issues is sustainability. This is a golden opportunity for the city to leverage its power. I believe there should be a mandate that all new buildings and buildings that purchase air rights should be sustainable, and should be mandated to build renewable options to reduce their carbon footprint. 2) There will be a health fair on October 25<sup>th</sup>, flu shots will be available. 3) Lastly, I would like to echo the Governor's comments regarding Mark Thompson, and thank you for your service; as one who served eight years on the community board, that pales in comparison to three years as Board Chair.

**Shelby Garner** representing **Congress Member Maloney reported:** 1) Rep. Maloney is working very hard right now to make sure that the Zadroga 9/11 payout funds are not cut. 2) Rep. Maloney has long sought tougher punishment for those who engage in human trafficking, and is supportive of the President's executive order, which enshrines the administration's commitment to the victims of human trafficking. 3) She also held a town hall in Queens with Rep. Gutierrez who is the lead sponsor of the dream act, which was on deferred action on childhood arrivals (undocumented immigrants that arrive at an age of 16 or younger). 4) Also, I would like to thank Mark Thompson for his service to this community board and the job that he has done for the past three years.

**Teresa Boemio** representing **Council Member Dan Garodnick:** 1) C/M Garodnick was very happy to see so many people turn out at the Dept. of Sanitation's presentation on the new proposed garage. The C/M is concerned about any development that would bring additional traffic into the area, and is also concerned about egress for ambulances due to the proximity to the Bellevue hospital site. 2) The Community Education Council (CEC), District 2 proposed some rezoning lines recently that have to do with the new school that will be opening (P.S. 281). ## **BUSINESS SESSION:**

### **Chair's Report** – Mark Thompson

1. I would like to introduce Andrew Martini our new urban Fellow who will be working with us on the public realm improvements plan as a part of the proposed Midtown rezoning. This is a very hot topic and he'll have an exciting time working closely with the Land Use & Waterfront Committee. Andrew is pursuing his Masters of Urban Planning at Hunger College. I want to thank him for switching the initial focus of his project to the rezoning so quickly in response to our request. Please welcome Andrew and introduce yourselves to him.

2. Earlier today the City Council held a hearing on an issue that was first raised by Community Board Six just a few months ago. This is the problem that Special Education students face when riding the school bus. Kids are riding the bus for hours each way, supervisors are untrained to deal with their special needs, and the situation on the buses is physically dangerous. Thanks to Community Board Six the issue is getting the attention it deserves and the children may finally be treated properly.
3. Finally, this is my last meeting as Chair of Community Board Six. I want to thank all of you for allowing me to serve in this role. It has been an amazing experience and together we have done an incredible amount of good work, raising the bar for what Boards can do. It has been gratifying to work with so many smart people, to mentor new members and get them involved and to build an organization that is respected throughout New York City – not just by other boards but city agencies and elected officials. We are known for getting what we want done and doing it in a rational, intelligent way, for fighting the good fight without making it appear to be a battle. I am proud to have led such a great organization. I wanted to do a recap of all of the issues that we have taken up during the past three years, but realized that it would be a mile long. That shows just how much you have accomplished in those few years; you should be proud of all of your work. I know that I have driven you nuts by being a demanding chair, always coming up with something that we should be doing and overloading you. But you always rise to the occasion. So thanks everyone. Community Board Six is the best and I am proud to have served as chair and to remain a member for a while longer.

**District Manager's Report** – Toni Carlina

1. It's has been a pleasure working with Mark as Chair for the past 3-years, and I'm happy to say PHEW he made it through some of the Board's most challenging projects, e.g. the UN building in Robert Moses Playground & the MOU, the switch by DEP on the water main path , which created a community uproar, 34<sup>th</sup> St Transit-way, Bike Share, the 1SP Park and most recently DCP's East Midtown Rezoning, and the new 25<sup>th</sup> Street DSNY garage, to mention just a few. Let's not forget his biggest challenge, working with me. I also want you to know on Dec 13<sup>th</sup>; Mark will be honored by Baruch; details to follow.
2. Dep. Insp. Berntsen informed me that the 13<sup>th</sup> Pct. is putting together a list of bar/rest to place on an upcoming M.A.R.C.H. **Treasurer's Report** - Bea Disman

1. We are facing budget cuts for this year and next. We have been asking that the budget of community boards be increased to 250k. This year our budget is 206k, and we have been informed that we need to put aside funds for a 5.4% decrease. We have also been informed that next year we can expect an additional decrease of 8%. We would like the help of the Borough President with the upcoming budget issues.
2. As far as our regular expenditures we are really ok as we continue to be cautious in our spending.

**Borough President's Report – Kristen Ellis**

1. Thank you Bea for bringing that up, as you know in the past the BP has been supportive of community boards so I will make sure to bring the proposed cuts to his attention.
2. There will be an East Side Town Hall on October 23<sup>rd</sup> to share neighborhood concerns and speak to neighbors.
3. The BP did submit testimony for the scoping of midtown rezoning. We need to value the district improvement bonus as well as conduct an EIS.
4. The BP released a report about the prevalence of economic abuse that is a lesser known type of domestic violence, which does affect families and creates situations where the victims cannot provide for themselves.

**Land Use/Waterfront** – Terrence O’Neal, Chair

**Report:** 1) The Committee would like to have a joint meeting with Public Safety on the proposed midtown re-zoning. 2) Several individuals from the CB6 Community testified at the EIS Scoping session for Midtown Zoning, and the testimony that we have will be posted on the CB6 website.

**A) Re: Initial Requests by Community Board 6 for Information/Clarification On East Midtown Rezoning Proposal by Department of City Planning.**

**Whereas**, the Department of City Planning Department (DCP) has proposed a major rezoning plan for East Midtown comprising 78 blocks of the East Midtown office area centered around Grand Central Terminal and generally located between Fifth and Second/Third avenues, and East 57th and East 39th streets with Park Avenue as its central spine and

**Whereas**, a proposal of such scope and complexity in an already densely developed area poses a number of complex issues and requires additional information from DCP, and requests for such information have been submitted at several meetings of CB6’s Land Use and Waterfront Committee at which DCP made presentations, and

**Whereas**, DCP plans to have the plan certified for ULURP review by the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of 2013, and sent to the City Council for a vote in the fall of 2013 an unusually swift timeline for such a major rezoning, and

**Whereas**, it is only after this information has been gathered, and fully reviewed by Community Board 6 that it will issue a resolution regarding the proposal itself, and

**Whereas**, DCP held a public comment meeting on September 27, 2012 on the environmental impact scoping document (EIS) at which several Community Board 6 members testified, essentially requesting additional information to be included in the final scoping document, scheduled to be published in the first quarter of 2013, now

**Therefore, be it**

**RESOLVED**, that Community Board 6 reiterates its requests for information previously requested on June 27, 2012 on behalf of CB6 by the Chair of the Land Use and Waterfront Committee, on August 21, 2012 by the Chair of CB6 in a joint letter with CB4 and 5 (see [www.cbsix.org](http://www.cbsix.org)) and in testimony given on behalf of CB6 at the EIS scoping meeting on 9/27/12 (testimony to be posted shortly on the CB6 website), in order for CB6 to fulfill its Charter-mandated function pursuant to the ULURP process to thoroughly review the DCP proposal, and looks forward to the opportunity to fully comment at that time on its position regarding the East Midtown Zoning proposal.

**7. Housing, Homeless & Human Rights Committee** – Claude L. Winfield, Chair

**Report:** 1) There was a presentation from HPD, DCP at the last HHHR meeting. There will be a lottery for the micro unit housing complex being built in the Kips Bay area.

**RE: In support of NYS Assembly Bill A02453-2011 – The Homeless Protection Act**

**WHEREAS** there has been a documented rise in violence against the homeless in the past ten years, including approximately 860 attacks, of which 244 resulted in the victim's death; and

**WHEREAS** the perpetrators, mostly young men with no relationship to the victim, attack them precisely because they see the victims as vulnerable; and

**WHEREAS** attacks have been as extreme as setting a victim on fire, as well as videotaping attacks to post on the Internet, only further encouraging the maltreatment of the homeless; and

**WHEREAS** designating these attacks as hate crimes emphasizes the humanity of the homeless and challenges the misconception that these are people who have been forgotten; and

**WHEREAS** A02453 would amend subdivisions 1 and 2 of section 485.05 of the penal law as added by chapter 107 of the laws of 2000 to include "homelessness" as a defining category in groups legally recognized as protected under hate crimes law; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 2 would also defines the "homelessness" as a set of circumstances in which an undomiciled persons with no address, regular residence, or resides in a place not designed for regular sleeping accommodation, a shelter, a residential program for victims of domestic violence or in a hotel/motel on a temporary basis; and

**WHEREAS** Bill A02453 would protect the homeless from the abuse and attacks often levied against them by designating such attacks as hate crimes, now

**Therefore be it**



**RESOLVED** that Community Board 6 strongly supports and urges passage of A02453 by the Assembly and Senate to adopt a comparable bill and that the Governor sign the bill into law.
