Investigations are conducted in an impartial fashion by the board’s investigative staff, which is composed entirely of civilian employees. The CCRB holds a monthly public meeting on the second Wednesday of each month. The next scheduled meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 11, 2011 10-11a.m. at 40 Rector Street, 2nd floor. Urban Design Week 2011- From now through April 30, the Institute for Urban Design (IfUD) will turn to New Yorkers to reframe the debate about the future of the city’s public spaces. ***By the City / For the City*** is an innovative two-part open call for ideas that begins by asking New Yorkers where they see potential for improvement in the city’s physical fabric, and then asks the international design community to respond to the challenges set forth by the public. Together, ideas from citizens and designers alike will represent an atlas of possibility for the city’s future.

New Yorkers are being asked to identify sites in their neighborhoods they'd like to see receive some fresh design attention: from parks and streetscapes all the way up to the city's transportation system. Then, from May 16-June 17, IfUD will hold a competition to enlist designers around the world to create proposals that address the ideas New Yorkers are most interested in.

In September, IfUD will publish all proposals in an *Atlas of Possibility for the Future of New York*, which will serve as the foundation for our first-ever **Urban Design Week** festival, scheduled for September 15-20, 2011.

Creative Arts Workshops (CAW) – CAW's Summer ArtWorks program, in conjunction with New York City's Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP). Is a seven-week program designed to employ 50 teenagers that work in teams of 10-15, toward the completion and presentation of a large-scale public arts project? 

Youth Police Academy 2011

The New York City Police Department seeks to provide innovative and effective programs for the City's young people. The Community Affairs Bureau's, Youth Police Academy, is such a program. It is designed to establish a positive relationship between the Police Department and the City's youth.

New York City residents, attending school, between the ages of 10 and 16 are eligible to attend. The Youth Police Academy will provide those participating in the program with lunch and uniform shirts.

The goals of the academy are:

- To enhance responsible citizenship.
- To provide positive interaction with police officers and to educate young people about the challenges and responsibility of police work.
- To encourage young people to take part in other youth programs offered by the Police Department such as: the Law Enforcement Explorers, Police Cadet Corps and the Police Athletic League.

The 2011 Youth Police Academy is a six (6) week program that will hold sessions four (4) days a week. The Academy will open at 8:30 am in the morning and dismissal will be 2:00 pm in the afternoon. Students will attend classroom sessions with lectures, role-plays and topical demonstrations by police officers in the areas of law, behavioral science, drug prevention and gang resistance. Field trips to a Police Department facility or a City park are also part of the curriculum. Transportation to and from the field trips will be provided. Each site is accessible by public transportation.

**COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY DRUG RING DISMANTLED: FIVE STUDENTS AND THREE
OFF-CAMPUS SUPPLIERS ARRESTED**

BRIDGET G. BRENNAN, New York City's Special Narcotics Prosecutor, and **RAYMOND W. KELLY**, New York City Police Department Commissioner, announced today the indictment and arrests of five Columbia University students, who together sold drugs at three fraternity houses and other on-campus residences. "Operation Ivy League" also led to the arrests and indictment of three of the students' drug suppliers, including one defendant from Manhattan's East Village who is charged with plotting to kidnap a pair of rival cocaine traffickers.

During a five-month investigation that began in July, undercover officers with the NYPD's Narcotics Borough Manhattan North made 31 purchases from five students, who sold a variety of drugs, including cocaine, marijuana, powdered MDMA (ecstasy), Adderall and LSD. In some cases, LSD, a liquid hallucinogen, was applied to Altoids mints and SweetTARTS candy.

The majority of the sales took place in common areas and bedrooms at three fraternities: Alpha Epsilon Pi, Pi Kappa Alpha and Psi Upsilon. Two students also sold drugs from their rooms at the Intercultural House and East Campus Housing. Each specialized in selling specific drugs and referred customers to one another. The undercover officers made nearly \$11,000 in purchases from the students during the investigation.

All five students are charged in indictments and were arrested on the Columbia University campus early this morning. Police searched the students' rooms in their fraternities and other campus housing pursuant to warrants. The searches yielded a bottle of LSD, 50 MDMA capsules, 15 Adderall pills, more than half a pound of marijuana, and approximately \$2,000 cash.

The investigation also led police to three narcotics traffickers who supplied the Columbia University students. One Brooklyn-based cocaine dealer, Roberto Lagares, was arrested on Sunday afternoon at Kingsborough Houses, a New York City Housing Authority Development located in Bedford

Stuyvesant.

Another two drug suppliers were apprehended on October 27th in Manhattan's East Village. One of these defendants, Miron Sarzynski, sold cocaine, LSD and DMT (dimethyltryptamine) to undercover officers on seven occasions in the East Village and in Ridgewood, Queens. Sarzynski also manufactured drugs for distribution at his apartment at 430 E. 6th St. in Manhattan, with the help of his girlfriend, Megan Asper, who specialized in growing marijuana.

Additionally, Sarzynski faces charges for attempting to kidnap a pair of rival cocaine traffickers, whom he believed had stolen money from him. During the investigation, Sarzynski tried to hire an undercover officer to help him with the kidnapping. His plan was to kidnap the victims at gunpoint, hold them for ransom, and torture them by forcibly administering a heavy dose of LSD. Sarzynski instructed the undercover officer that the victims would be killed if no ransom money was provided.

A criminal complaint charges that Sarzynski told the undercover officer he would shock the victims with a stun gun, hit them in the head and rob them. Sarzynski said, "Then I would have done something nasty like put a few drops of acid (LSD) in his mouth and then leave him there." Just prior to Sarzynski's arrest, he handed the undercover a vial of LSD to be used in the kidnapping.

Special Narcotics Prosecutor **BRIDGET G. BRENNAN** said, "An ominous aspect of this investigation was the involvement of college students in the violent drug dealing business. The recent shootings on September 29th and November 1st of young people involved in selling marijuana highlight the all too familiar link between drugs and violence. The students arrested today supplied dangerous substances to their friends and other students to turn a quick profit, but subjected themselves to risks, of which they were either ignorant or in denial. These students were playing with fire."

Police Commissioner **RAYMOND W. KELLY** said, "The fact that a supplier to the Columbia students was willing to kill his rivals should demolish any argument that drugs on campus is a victimless crime. This is no way to work your way through college.

At the time of Sarzynski's and Asper's arrests, police searched the apartment pursuant to a warrant and seized approximately two-dozen marijuana plants and all the equipment needed for growing hydroponic marijuana. The apartment also contained equipment for manufacturing DMT, a hallucinogenic substance, and several jars of the drug. DMT is made from the root of a South American plant, which is treated with solvents to form a crystalline substance. Additionally, police seized a bottle of LSD, \$1,200 in cash and two air pistols.

The five Columbia University students are expected to be arraigned in Manhattan Criminal Court later today.


The charges and allegations contained in the indictments are merely accusations and the defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty.

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
