

District Manager's Report
July/August 2006

For the month of July staff had approximately 500 plus contacts (see attached a-1)

District Services Cabinet Meeting – Highlights August 9th;

D.A.'s Office – No Report

DEP – Discussed the Open Hydrant Initiative, which led to the discussion about work crews being harassed the week of July 31st when they tried to close open hydrants up north. The 30 Precinct advised them to call for car when going in again.

30th Precinct – Provided statistics (attached)

There was a discussion with Paul Evans (Administrator Parks) about the event on July 29th a Carmensville Playground at West 151 Street & Amsterdam Avenue. The initial application indicated 150 persons (see attached) with no sound. It grew to hundreds with a Rap performer with a sound request that was denied. The final count ranged in the thousands too large for that park, they attempted sound, use hot 97 radio to broadcast and according to Inspector Winski tried to bring in alcohol. A motorcycle club attended and persons were still at/around the Park until 3:00 A.M. in the morning. The trash in the area was not cleaned up per the agreement. Both the 30th Precinct and Mr. Evans said it would be of assistance for a letter to be sent to Parks requesting no new permits be issued to this applicant.

26th - Precinct – While crime is down 7.7 % year to date that has been an increase in Burglary's especially at Barnard College, and theft of unattended property in locations such as Starbuck's.

D.O.T. – The Agency is targeting 135 schools citywide for a traffic pattern study as to where improvements can be made, and might include anything from No Standing signs in front instead of Teacher Parking to merging lanes or directing traffic flow. There was a discussion from Assemblyman Wright's Town Hall about Morningside Park with reference to the closed area by Manhattan Ave. & Morningside. That is under DDC.

Parks – (see 30th Pct.) The 26th Precinct in response to the Town Hall will manpower available have a fixed post between West 110th –West 118th Streets.

Human Rights Commission – Ms.Sanders who was representing Mr. Berry gave out updated literature, and discussed a Trans Gender Bias case on west 145th Street near Jackie Robinson Park.

Borough Services Cabinet – No Meetings until September

Meetings/Events;

July 19th – Attended the Harlem Week Event with several Board members at Gracie Mansion.

August 1st – Attended the National Night Out Against Crime Programs at the 30th Precinct, District 3 Transit Police, and PSA 6 Housing Police. I was too late for the 26th Precinct Event.

August 7th – Tenant Meeting at 287/291 Edgecombe Avenue to review the results of their election of Officers, and address concerns. Martin Smith of Councilman Robert Jackson's Office was also in attendance. This had to do in part with a disputed result from an alledged second vote. Both these buildings are owned by Pinnacle, and we advised they would do better to fight with them instead of each other.

August 8th – Harmony Picnic hosted by Manhattan North (NYPD) at Central Park.

Summary of Park Rules & Regulations for Special Events

- Permittees must have the special event permit in their possession at the time and site of the special event, as well as any other permits for the event required by the Department of any other government agency. Parks may alter, add terms and conditions or revoke a permit at any time.
- Special event permits are not transferable.
- Permittee is limited to specific locations, dates, times, and activities indicated on permit.
- Permittee is solely responsible for obtaining any necessary clearances or permissions for use of intellectual property, including but not limited to musical or other performance rights for the event.
- Unreasonable noise which would disturb other park patrons or create a hazardous or unsafe condition in the park is not allowed. Electrically amplified sound requires an additional permit from NYPD precinct which covers the event location.
- No vehicles may enter the park without additional vehicle permits. Any vehicles entering the park must stay on paved surfaces, drive no more than 5mph and operate with their hazard lights on.
- Access to electrical and water service is not available unless prior arrangements have been made with Park supervision.
- Dogs and other animals (except service animals) are not allowed in playgrounds, gardens or athletic facilities at any time.
- Any sales or cash solicitation on parkland requires a Temporary Use Authorization vending permit from Parks' concessions office.
- Alcoholic beverages and glass bottles are prohibited in parks, except by special permit.
- Digging or staking into ground, or attaching signs, awnings or other items to plants or trees is strictly prohibited.
- Open flame and barbecuing are allowed only in specifically designated areas.
- Events may not be advertised or otherwise publicized without approval of Parks.
- Permittee is responsible for all cleanup and restoration of event site after event, returning site original condition.
- Permittee is responsible for behavior of all event participants.
- Damage due to an event may be cause for revocation and denial of future permits.
- Permittees is responsible for behavior of all event participants.
- Damage due to an event may be cause for revocation and denial of future permits.
- Permittees shall be held liable for any and all damages or injuries to persons or property that may occur or be caused by the use of the permit. By accepting a permit, permittees agree to indemnify and hold harmless the City and the Department from any and all claims whatsoever that may result from such use.

As you may be aware, MTA New York City Transit, the New York City Department of Transportation and the New York State Department of Transportation, conducted public meetings in early June for the **New York City Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Study** in each borough. These public meetings were held to present the concept plans for the 15 potential citywide BRT corridors and to solicit input from the public.

Based on comments received and other evaluation tools, 5 BRT demonstration corridors will be selected from the 15 corridors by late Summer 2006. Once the five corridors are selected, we will embark on a detailed planning process which will take about a year. During this time, meetings will be conducted with affected community boards to discuss specific corridor treatments and community impacts. Public input is critical in the selection and design of these demonstration corridors.

Enclosed is a complete set of outreach materials detailing the proposals for each corridor. These materials were distributed at the recent public workshops.
