## **Health Department**

The US Department of Health and Human Services and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have teamed up with local health authorities in 8 major US cities, including NYC, to launch a new program to boost influenza vaccination rates, particularly among African Americans, Hispanic Americans, and people who are uninsured or under-insured. (See attached for more program details). As you know, flu vaccination is recommended for everyone aged 6 months and older, and particularly for the very young, the elderly, pregnant women, or people with underlying medical conditions.

The program will distribute vouchers for Free Flu Shots that can be redeemed at Walgreens and Duane Reade pharmacies throughout New York City. Vouchers may only be used by adults 18 and older who do not have health insurance. Vouchers can be redeemed through April 15, 2011.

The New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene are looking for community partners who can help us distribute these vouchers to targeted communities. If you would like to participate, please send me the following information: name of CB or organization, contact person, phone, e-mail, mailing address to send vouchers, and the number of vouchers requested Vouchers will be distributed on a first come, first served basis. Please note that since there are a limited number of vouchers, we may not be able to fill your entire request. It is recommended that you start small, for example, with 50 to 100 vouchers, then can order more as you deplete them.

## **DEP**

Environmental Protection Commissioner Cas Holloway launched the Strategy 2011-2014, strategic plan that lays out 100 distinct initiatives to make DEP the safest, most efficient, cost-effective, and transparent water utility in the nation. Each initiative directly advances one of DEP's core functions: serving nine million water customers; supplying and treating more than one billion gallons of water every day; making cost-effective infrastructure investments; and achieving a sustainable quality of life for all New Yorkers. The new plan, the product of nearly one year of analysis and outreach, builds on PlaNYC, Mayor Bloomberg's sustainability blueprint for New York City. From improving harbor water quality to harnessing clean renewable energy, Strategy 2011-2014 includes bold and achievable initiatives that will improve New Yorkers' quality of life — at a price they can afford. The plan will guide DEP's investments and operations over the next four years, and DEP will publish an annual report card on the progress of each initiative.

### **Department of Sanitation**

Reported the Snow Melting Bank at 135<sup>th</sup> Street and 12<sup>th</sup> Ave. will be removed by the end of the month, after several complaints were submitted regarding the mountains of snow dumped at 135<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> Ave. creating dangerous pedestrian conditions inhibiting access to the Harlem Piers Park, extended bike path, Covo, Fairway, Talay, and Hudson River Café, which also created a hardship for those businesses already suffering from a decrease in revenue.

### **DOB**

The Department of Buildings released its' 2010 Annual Report which highlights how they helped build New York City last year by reviewing 457,000 plans, performing 335,000 inspections and issuing more than 136,000 construction permits. Construction-related accidents declined 28% in 2010, which demonstrates a positive sign that all their efforts in making a difference in improving the quality of life for New Yorkers has also become one of their top priorities. DOB is reaching out to communities like never before through safety education, green initiatives and other new program to beautify construction sites.

The New York City Department of Buildings and Department of Cultural Affairs, with support from the Rockefeller Foundation, have partnered to create Urban Canvas The mission of the program is the enhance quality of life for NYC residents and visitors through the incorporation of artwork on structures like sheds, fences and scaffolding. Temporary Protective Structures are erected to safeguard the public. Sidewalk fences, sheds and scaffolds are commonplace throughout the city. These structures also present opportunities to enhance the urban experience for millions of New Yorkers.

The urbancanvas Design Competition was a unique opportunity to challenge professional artists and designers to create printed artwork for temporary protective structures at construction sites to beautify New York City's streetscape and promote maintenance of these structures. The competition selected four complementary designs for different types of temporary protective structures: construction fences, sidewalk sheds, supported scaffolds and cocoon systems.

Designs were selected by a distinguished jury of world-renowned artists, designers and civic decision makers followed by an online public vote. All designs were approved by the Public Design Commission of the City of New York.

The four winning designs are now available through the urbancanvas Pilot Program for property owners and developers to install on temporary protective structures located on City-owned property.






