

District Manager's Report May/June 2005

For the month of May the staff had approximately 1,100 contacts (a-1 attached), with the majority after Board Business were those seeking information or Employment data. Mayor Bloomberg extended the deadline for Summer Youth Employment applications from May 16th until June 1st.

District Services Cabinet – Highlights from June 8th.

Police – In the 26 Precinct crime stats which had been on the rise are finally beginning to come down. In the 30th Precinct crime is down 16% Year to Date. PSA 6 (Housing Bureau) has executed 234 Vertical Patrols in Grant & Manhattanville Houses, which is more than all of 2004. Transit District 3 which has a new commander, Captain Rodrigiez has been trying to get a handle on the theft of cell phones, which as with the Precincts is one of the main reasons for the increase in Grand Larceny in Board 9M. At this point NEXTEL phones are still the number one target for thieves.

Fire Department – Most stats in Community Board 9 M are down for the Year, and they submitted their items for the FY'07 Budget (a-2, a-3 attached)

Manhattan D.A.'s Office – Arrests were up in the Police Commands in May (a-4 attached)

Libraries – The Hamilton Grange Library Librarian Jean Pamphile, and his staff received the Maher-Stern award for excellence on June 8th (a-5 attached). Mr. Pamphile was also highlighted in New York Newsday for his efforts (a-6 attached).

Borough Services Cabinet – Next scheduled meeting June 24th (Minutes from May attached for General Board if available).

FIREHOUSE RENOVATIONS

Many of our 221 firehouses are turn of the century buildings that need upgrades such as new roofs, apparatus floor replacements, waterproofing, pointing, electrical upgrades as well as new kitchens and bathrooms. Costs to upgrade these facility components include the following:

FIRE SAFETY EDUCATION OUTREACH

Funding is requested to purchase smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors for distribution to the public throughout the year in all five boroughs. This budget allocation would cover the cost of 10,000 smoke detectors and 10,000 carbon monoxide detectors.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

The Fire Department has developed a CPR training course for the public. This life-saving program will be free of charge. The FDNY is seeking funding to purchase 10,000 "CPR KITS" which will be given to each individual taking the course. Use of the kits will enable the FDNY to "train the trainer" as the kits can be used by the public to teach CPR as well.






