

June, 2013 District Manager's Report

Agency Update/Announcements:

The NYC Department of Youth & Community Development (DYCD) Commissioner Jeanne B. Mullgrav announced a series of public hearings in all five boroughs on the allocation of federal Community Services Block grant (CSBG) funding to support community-based human services programs.

Low-income neighborhoods designated as eligible for CSBG funding are called Neighborhood Development Areas (NDAs) and are represented by Neighborhood advisory Boards (NABs) comprised of residents who are appointed by DYCD and elected officials. NABs identify the service needs of their local communities, and process which guides the City in its allocation of CSBG funding. DYCD oversees a wide range of NDA initiatives including programs for middle school-and high school-aged youth, seniors, housing, immigration, adult literacy, and healthy families.

NAB is holding a Public Hearing on Wednesday, June 26, from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. at the Manhattanville Community Center, 530 West 133rd Street, New York, N.Y. 10031. (see Flyer)

NYCHA-CUNY Resident Scholarship Program & Regina A. Figueroa Memorial Scholarship Program

The NYCHA-CUNY Resident Scholarship Program provides \$1,000 scholarships for qualifying public housing residents who are enrolled in colleges of the City University of New York (CUNY), in a variety of majors with at least a 3.0 grade point average. And the Regina A. Figueroa Memorial Scholarship annually awards \$1,000 scholarships to qualifying NYCHA residents with disabilities who are enrolled in CUNY senior and community colleges.

- Be a sophomore, junior or senior student enrolled full-time in a CUNY Associate or Baccalaureate degree program
- Have a minimum 3.0 GPA
- Demonstrate financial need
- Submit a 500-word autobiographical essay

New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) announced the completion of a \$106 million project that has improved the odor control and air monitoring systems at the North River Wastewater Treatment Plant, located on the Hudson River between 137th and 145th Streets in Manhattan. The Plant treats up to 340 million gallons of wastewater a day, sits just a few hundred feet from where tens of thousands of West Harlem residents live, and its roof is home to the 28-acre Riverbank State Park. The upgrades to the control system will help ensure that the air within the Plant and odor associated with the wastewater treatment process is captured and treated before it is released. In addition, the Plant's air monitoring system, with stations in the Plant, on Riverbank State Park, and in the West Harlem community, was upgraded with advanced technology that will allow for remote, real-time collection of data and will aid in the rapid detection of excess odor and necessary operational adjustments. The upgrades also include work to the Plant's electrical substation and other critical systems that will ensure it remains in a state of good repair for decades to come.

During the wastewater treatment process, air is captured from within the Plant and is directed into a large vessel and scrubbed clean with a mixture of chemicals. The air then passes through activated carbon filters that absorb odors and chemicals and remove the remaining odor-producing particles. The treated air is then discharged through 100-foot ventilation stacks on the plant roof. The upgrades to the odor control system included the installation of a cover over the final settling tanks, an improved air capture system in an overflow area, a new exhaust duct system, and new scrubbers, absorbers, and fans within the two central air treatment areas.

The network of air monitors includes seven units, four within the Plant, one on Riverbank State Park, and two in the neighboring community. The monitors constantly measure air samples and send the data to a central computer network which notifies Plant staff if elevated levels are detected.

The North River wastewater treatment plant is built on a 28-acre reinforced concrete platform over the Hudson River and went into operation in 1986. It rests on 2,300 caissons pinned into bedrock up to 230 feet beneath the river. The roof of the building is the home of Riverbank State Park, a popular recreational facility with three swimming pools, an amphitheater, an athletic center, a skating rink, a restaurant, and sports fields. The plant provides wastewater treatment for the hundreds of thousands of people who live and work in, or visit, the west side of Manhattan, from Bank Street in Greenwich Village to Inwood Hill at the island's northern tip.

DSC Meeting Highlights (6/12/13):

FDNY (see Stats) – reported installation of Caps for fire hydrants, also stated all hydrants without caps should be reported to 311.

26th Pct. (See Stats) – Reported on Saturday, May 25, 2013, at approximately 1100, hours the 26th precinct received a radio transmission of a knifepoint robbery at Chokolat Patisserie located at 3111 Broadway. Details are as follow: The complainant victim states an unknown male perpetrator did enter the coffee shop and displayed a knife. The perpetrator approached the cash register, ordered a tea, and then stated "open the drawer" in a low voice. The victim opened the register drawer and the perpetrator removed \$260.00 USC. The perpetrator exited the location and fled north bound on Broadway.

Also, on Tuesday, June 4, 2013 at approximately 1030 hours the 26th precinct received a radio transmission of a commercial robbery at the same above location (Chokolat). Details are as follow: The victim states that she was working her shift when she was approached by an unknown male white approximately 5'11, 170lbs 30 years of age, wearing a light-blue baseball cap, black sunglasses, blue jeans, a black jacket and tan sneaker. The victim further stated that the suspect grabbed her by the arm but she was able to pull away without injury.

At this time, suspect did reach over the counter and open the cash register manually. Perpetrator escaped the bakery with \$233 USC, running Northbound on Broadway towards 125th Street.

The 27 year old, Caucasian male 6ft tall approximately 200 lbs. was apprehended in connection to the Chokolat Patisserie robberies.

30th Pct. (See Stats) – Reported an increase in Grand Larceny due to increase in the theft of iPhones and other electronics. Officers responded to a call regarding a 4year old choking victim; EMS was unable to revive victim who choked on a grape.

Patrol Borough Manhattan North (See Stats) –

The 2013 Youth Police Academy is a six (6) week program where students will attend classroom sessions with lectures, role-plays and topical demonstrations by police officers in the areas of law, behavioral science, drug prevention and gang resistance. Field trips are also provided as part of the curriculum. The program offers sessions five (5) days a week. The academy will open at 8:30 a.m. in the morning with dismissal at 2p.m. The Academy will begin on Monday, July 8th and end on Friday August 16th (See attached Flyer).

2013 Harmony Day Picnic – Patrol Borough Manhattan North will be hosting its annual “Harmony Day Picnic, all summer youth programs with children ages 6 through 14 are welcome to attend. Manhattan District Attorney’s Office (see Stats) - Reported the guilty plea of Michael Enright, 24 for slashing and stabbing a taxi driver after asking the driver if he is a Muslim. When the driver answered yes, the defendant yelled anti-Muslim comments, slashed the driver’s throat, and stabbed and slashed his face, arms, and hands. The defendant pleaded guilty to a Hate Crime and Assault in the First Degree (see attached Press release).

Annual Report highlighting the DA’s Office for 2012 was issued.

HRA – Reported on a free new online resource to help Public Assistance applicants and recipients apply and prepare for Administrative Fair Hearings. The New York LawHelp Consortium, under the auspices of Legal Services NYC and in collaboration with Legal Assistance of Western New York, Inc., has developed an interactive tool to help unrepresented Appellants understand the fair hearing process.

The Public Benefits Fair Hearing program was designed by a team of Public Benefits experts state-wide. It is written in plain language and is available in both English and Spanish. Users answer short questions in the online program and are given customized information. The Q&A style format leads the user not only through asking for a fair hearing in a timely fashion, but also how to prepare for and participate in the fair hearing itself. (see Flyer)

COMMUNITY AND LEGISLATIVE REPORT May 2013

In the Community

Happy spring! May is an important month -- we honor our mothers, remember our veterans and soldiers, and it is the unofficial start of summer. In addition, this month brought a flurry of activity to the City Council after the Mayor released the **Executive Budget for Fiscal Year 2014 (FY14)**. The budget process consists of hearings held jointly with the Finance Committee, Budget Negotiation Team and Borough Delegation, where we discuss the Mayor's budget and what needs to be agreed upon in order to protect our City from the potential vital services that are being eliminated or reduced. By law, a city budget must be agreed upon before June 30th. Please read my report of the activities and events my office and I attend this month.

Seniors from all over the city came to City Hall on **Senior Advocacy Day** to advocate for the restoration of \$26 million in this year's city budget. Our Northern Manhattan Seniors met with me to discuss with how these cuts could impact senior centers, case management for homebound elderly, elder abuse, transportation, rent funds for senior centers, Naturally Occurring Retirement Committee (NORC), Senior Citizen Rent Increase Exemption (SCRIE) Program and other services citywide. Like these seniors, I hope to see you in City Hall to advocate for vital programs at the Executive Budget hearings to help us all focus on what we must do to serve the people of this great City. This time of year is usually referred to as the "budget dance" and I'm ready to take all the steps necessary to end this dance with a budget that will move New York City in the right direction!



On May 4th, along with the New York Presbyterian Hospital, we hosted the forum: **What's on the Table? An information fair on healthy food options in Northern Manhattan**. It is important that we live healthy lifestyles to stay fit and reap the benefits such as improving our immune systems to live longer lives. In this forum, we enlisted the help of community organizations that taught us about the different farmers' markets in the area, programs for our classrooms and school yards, foods and vitamins that benefit us and we even checked for food stamp eligibility. In addition, GamerFitNation provided games that offer a different exercise technique that engages our children and adults alike. They even me challenged to a dance-off game. What a work out!

This year marked the 10th anniversary of the **Campaign for Fiscal Equity's Walk a Mile for your Child: A NYC to Albany March to Support Fair Funding for Public Schools**. I can't believe that 10 years have passed since my 150 mile walk to Albany to highlight that NYC schools were underfunded and didn't meet the needs of all students. Since I filed my original lawsuit, I have continued advocating for what is right for our children and give them the opportunity for a sound basic education. For this reason, I continue calling on our Department of Education, in both the city and state level, to ensure that our children's education and safety are protected and meet.



For example, after two separate incidents occurred in which light fixtures containing PCBs exploded, I held a press conference and was joined by parents and advocates calling upon the DOE to change the light fixtures as soon as possible because their 10-year plan was absurd and unacceptable. After discussions with different officials and receiving numerous petitions, the DOE agreed to settle and replace the light fixtures in 645 school building and complete it in approximately 3½ years from now. **This new timeline is a significant reduction from their previously announced plan, and the entire project will be completed by the end of 2016.**

In addition, I joined Speaker Quinn in the presentation of her four point plan to reform the NYC's gifted and talented system, so that the G&T demographics pool correctly reflects the talent and high achievement of students across the city. **The proposed four point plan increases the capacity of this program to cater to the needs of eligible, talented students city-wide. The addition of more seats, the use of alternative assessments for entry and streamlining the application for parents will help maximize parents' opportunities to access programs that will ensure the academic success of their children.**



Summary of Legislation

In our last community report, I discussed Intro 434, a bill designed to help street vendors by reducing the amount they pay in fines. Rather than fines as high as \$1000, they will be reduced to as little as \$25 and as high as \$250. The reductions of these fines will promote business while at the same time promote rule abiding vendors. This bill was vetoed by Mayor Bloomberg after the bill passed the council. During the first stated council meeting of the month, held on May 8th, the council overrode the Mayors' veto and passed Intro 434 into law. Another legislative action taken by the council that will enhance the lives of New Yorkers across the five boroughs is the passing of Intro 97, the *Paid Sick Leave act*. This legislation took nearly 3 years to finally pass, and it means the world to hard working laborers who otherwise would not be entitled to paid sick time off. During our most recent stated meeting, held on May 22nd, the Council voted on a package of bills that will improve the delivery of services available to veterans by formalizing and enhancing the veteran coordinator program at all City agencies. In addition, the council voted on Intro 1035-A that requires the Department of Consumer Affairs to revoke the license of any gaming café or arcades operators that illegally offer cash rewards and preys on lower-income individuals. Finally, we passed Intro 981-A that requires the Administration of Child Services to enhance reporting requirements of our youth that are placed in non-secure and limited secure placement facilities.
