

District Manager's Report – May, 2013

The NYC Rent Guideline Board is preparing to issue the new rent increases which will go in effect October 1, 2013. On April 30th the Board adopted a proposed range of renewal lease guidelines (increases) for rent stabilized apartments, lofts and hotels. A summary of the proposed guidelines is attached. Note that last year's increases were 2% and 4%.



New York City Rent Guidelines Board

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SUMMARY OF PROPOSED GUIDELINES ADOPTED ON APRIL 30, 2013

This summary of the Rent Guidelines Board proposed guidelines is solely for the informal use of the public and should not be substituted for the full text of the proposed Apartment and Loft Order 45 and the proposed Hotel Order 43. The full text of these proposed orders will be made available to the public after they have been published in the City Record. Copies of the proposed orders will be available on or around May 10, 2013 and can be obtained from the Board's offices at 51 Chambers Street, Suite 202, New York, NY 10007 or from our website nycrgb.org.

The following **proposed** range of renewal lease guidelines for rent stabilized apartments, lofts and hotels were adopted by the Rent Guidelines Board on April 30, 2013.

Proposed Rent Stabilized Apartment Renewal Guidelines

Together with such further adjustments as may be authorized by law, the annual adjustment for renewal leases for apartments shall be:

For a **one-year** renewal lease commencing on or after October 1, 2013 and on or before September 30, 2014: **3.25% - 6.25%**

For a **two-year** renewal lease commencing on or after October 1, 2013 and on or before September 30, 2014: **5.0% - 9.5%**

Proposed Sublet Allowance

In the event of a sublease governed by subdivision (e) of section 2525.6 of the Rent Stabilization Code, the allowance authorized by such subdivision shall be **10%**.

Proposed Special Guideline

For dwelling units subject to the Rent and Rehabilitation Law on September 30, 2013, which become vacant after September 30, 2013, the special guideline shall be the greater of the following:

- (1) **30%** above the maximum base rent or

(2) The Fair Market Rent for existing housing as established by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the New York City Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area pursuant to Section 8(c) (1) of the United States Housing Act of 1937 (42 U.S.C. section 1437f [c] [1]) and 24 C.F.R. Part 888, with such Fair Market Rents to be adjusted based upon whether the tenant pays his or her own gas and/or electric charges as part of his or her rent as such gas and/or electric charges are accounted for by the New York City Housing Authority.

Such HUD-determined Fair Market Rents will be published in the Federal Register, to take effect on **October 1, 2013**.

Proposed Rent Stabilized Loft Renewal Guidelines

Proposed Lease Renewals:

For **one-year** increase periods commencing on or after October 1, 2013 and on or before September 30, 2014: **3.25% - 6.25%**

For **two-year** increase periods commencing on or after October 1, 2013 and on or before September 30, 2014: **5.0% - 9.5%**

Proposed Rent Stabilized Hotel Renewal Guidelines

The allowable level of rent adjustment over the lawful rent actually charged and paid on September 30, 2013 shall be:

1) Residential Class A (apartment) hotels -	0% - 3.0%
2) Lodging houses -	0% - 3.0%
3) Rooming houses (Class B buildings containing less than 30 units) -	0% - 3.0%
4) Class B hotels -	0% - 3.0%
5) Single Room Occupancy buildings (MDL section 248 SRO's) -	0% - 3.0%

Except that the allowable level of rent adjustment over the lawful rent actually charged and paid on **September 30, 2013** shall be **0%** if permanent rent stabilized or rent controlled tenants paying no more than the legal regulated rent, at the time that any rent increase in this Order would otherwise be authorized, constitute fewer than **85%** of all units in a building that are used or occupied, or intended, arranged or designed to be used or occupied in whole or in part as the home, residence or sleeping place of one or more human beings.




