## Highlights from the Borough Service Cabinet Meeting held 10/23/09:

### Health First

Health First reported that its Mission is to provide access to affordable and high quality healthcare for the residents of New York City and Long Island. ### New Regulations for Livery Cabs

NYC Taxi and Limousine Commission introduced new rules for Livery Cabs that were enacted September 1, 2009. In the past, Livery Cabs have not had a signage system like yellow cabs. Livery Cabs must now display a TLC sticker on their rear quarter windows, have an identifying sticker for the companies on their cars, and must display the driver's TLC License inside the car. In addition, a Livery passenger bill of rights has been created and must be displayed inside the Cab. There are approximately 40,000 Livery Cabs on 13,000 yellow Cabs in NYC. For further info. **DOT**

Announced the Inspection/Removal of ATM machines from sidewalks within Community District No. 9. Community District 9 had 6 ATM's removed; 2 in the process of removal by order of abatement, and 1 not under the jurisdiction of DOT (ATM is built into the wall of storefront).

DOT scheduled to present Safe Streets for Seniors at the next Uniform Services Committee Meeting; Safe Streets is a pilot program being tested in Hamilton Heights, targeting reported high accident areas. Signal Lights will be adjusted to allow more crossing time for Seniors, as well as pedestrian isle for Seniors to rest before crossing large streets.


**New York City Penalty Relief Program for Home and Business Owners**

For a limited time (9/21/09 – 12/21/09) get relief on outstanding tickets for dirty sidewalks, illegal posting of hand bills and other Environmental Control Board violations. Mayor Bloomberg and the City Council authorized a program that allows businesses and homeowners the opportunity to resolve Environmental Control Board (ECB) violations that are "in default". Applicants can resolve their default violations by paying the base fine (see attached FAQ sheet)

Time Warner Cable of New York City will be performing necessary repairs on West 147<sup>th</sup> Street (N/W corner) on the back wall of 3185 Broadway. The purpose of the work is to pick up existing pipe and extend to back of building for CATV services. ### **Envisioning Community Boards in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Task Force (CB21!) FACT SHEET**

**What is this Task Force?** The Envisioning Community Boards in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Task Force (CB21!) was born out of a convergence of energies and interests all designed to support and strengthen the voice of citizens in municipal government through their local community board.

**What is the mission of the Task Force?** The Community Boards of New York City are non-Mayoral City agencies defined by the City Charter. Their roles were last modified a generation ago by the 1989 Charter Revision. CB21! will take a hard look at how community boards currently function in City government – what’s working, and where further changes should be considered – to support efficient, effective, constructive, fair, balanced and meaningful citizen participation in local government within their communities.

**What will the Task Force do?** CB21! will develop specific conceptual recommendations with our collective vision of Community Boards in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. We anticipate doing this by surveying key stakeholders throughout the City including the general public, all community board members and district office staff, the individual Borough Presidents’ Offices, City Council Members, and other organizations and groups who regularly interact with community boards. Survey results will be tabulated and synthesized into a position paper that will summarize the diverse ranging views across our City. The position paper will be made available and widely distributed as a starting point for further discussion and consideration by a Charter Revision Commission, if one is appointed.

**What is expected of Task Force members?** We anticipate monthly meetings running from September through early 2010 with other activities occurring between meetings. Over this period we will tap into the collective talent pool of our Task Force members, and beyond, to help design the survey instrument, interview experts knowledgeable in community boards, interpret survey results, propose specific recommendations, and assemble, review and discuss the final position paper. Task Force members would be expected to attend the monthly meetings and contribute toward the overall effort.

**Who is on this Task Force?** CB21! is a co-active initiative involving borough representatives of the community boards and district offices, the five Borough President's Offices and the Mayor's Community Affairs Unit. It is Co-Chaired by Helen Rosenthal, Chairperson of Manhattan Community Board 7, and Craig Hammerman, District Manager of Brooklyn Community Board 6. All Community Boards Citywide – their members and staff -- and the public will be encouraged to energetically participate by sharing their individual thoughts, ideas and concerns with the Task Force.

#### A History of the Fire Department

Organized firefighting began in New York in 1648 when the first fire ordinance was adopted by the Dutch settlement of New Amsterdam. Fines levied for dirty chimneys provided funds for the maintenance of buckets, hooks and ladders. It was not until 1731 that fire brigades were put into service. Two hand-drawn pumpers brought from London were the first fire engines to be used on the colony. They were designated as Engine Company 1 and 2. In 1865, a paid Metropolitan Fire Department was established in Manhattan and Brooklyn and consisted of 13 Chief Officers, and 552 Company Officers and firefighters. New Year's Day 1898 was heralded by the consolidation of the Fire Department under the direction of a Fire Commissioner of the Fire Department.

#### A HISTORY OF FIRE PREVENTION

*March 25, 2007 marks the 96th anniversary of the TRIANGLE SHIRT-WAIST FIRE which started in a fireproof building used as a factory and showroom located on the corner of Greene Street and Washington Place in lower Manhattan. The clothiers on the lower floors had closed up shop at noon that day, but over 275 employees were working on the 8th, 9th, and 10th floors of the building. The workers, mostly young women,*

earning \$6 a week were eager for the overtime. At 4:45 that day, tragedy was in the making as someone yelled "Fire".


Engine Company 72 and Engine 33 responded, but the water only reached to the 7th floor and the aerial ladders only reached to between the 6th and 7th floors. Hundreds evacuated down the stairs or via the 2 small elevators. Three male cutters formed a human bridge to an adjacent building, saving several women, until the 3 men fell to their deaths. About 150 employees trapped in the 10th floor showroom climbed to the roof and were rescued by ladder to the adjacent building. Hundreds died by jumping to their deaths or were burned, huddled against locked doors. 146 lost their lives that day, but the fireproof building still stands - now part of the New York University.

As a result of the tragedy, a commission, headed by Senator Robert F. Wagner, was established to investigate conditions in the city's sweatshops. This resulted in the present labor laws protecting factory workers in health, disability and fire prevention. To enact the fire prevention code, New York City established the division of Fire Prevention. The original function was to rid factories of fire hazards. Among other restrictions, all doors must now open outwards, no doors are to be locked during working hours, sprinkler systems must be installed if a company employs more than 25 people above the ground floor, and fire drills are mandatory for buildings lacking sprinkler systems.

Since that time Fire Prevention's role has evolved and expanded as new hazards to life and property have been identified. Today the mission is evolving once more to include not only the identification of hazards, inspection and enforcement of the fire code, but the dissemination of information to first responders.

## Bureau of Fire Prevention

Fire Prevention identifies and monitors locations, conditions, or equipment that pose a hazard to life and/or property within New York City and providing timely, accurate, and reliable information to first responders. Locations are "Permitted" to operate and monitored through periodic inspections or are required to have "Certified" personnel to install, service or work on-site.

### *TECHNICAL SUPPORT*

**Code Revision:** Participate, and/or appoint members, to code review or special committees to ensure fire and life safety issues are adequately addressed. Develop and/or reviews proposed legislative or rule changes.

**Plan Review:** Review Fire Protection, Fire Safety, and Emergency Action Plans developed by building owners and/or representatives to ensure that the contingency plans are comprehensive, properly deployed and meet all requirements

**Engineering:** Perform technical reviews of systems to ensure they meet fire code requirements. Variance applications are reviewed for proposed alternative safety measures and to evaluate proposed hardship. Applications for new materials or equipment proposed for use in NYC are researched and reviewed.

**Board of Standards and Appeals:** Monitor and report on cases docketed for Board of Standard and Appeals review; research and represent the FDNY's position and evaluate the impact of decisions made by the Board of Standards and Appeals.

**Certification and Testing Services:** Assess and certify candidates, companies and schools to ensure they have the knowledge and skills to perform, or provide services, regulated by the Fire Prevention Code, such as Fire Safety Director

**Field and Public Communication Unit:** Coordinate the information flow between field units and Fire Prevention; handle general requests for technical assistance or complaints.

### *SYSTEM INSTALLATION AND TESTING*

**Fire Alarm Inspection Unit:** Review plans and witness system tests of fire alarm, fire detection and emergency voice communication systems. Responsible for approving and monitoring central station connections.

**Suppression:** Coordinate and witness tests of sprinkler and standpipe systems, including water based and non-water chemical fire suppression systems (FM 200 or Inergen); research and process sprinkler requests made by field fire suppression units.

**Rangehood Suppression:** Review plans and witness the initial system test of rangehood suppression systems protecting commercial type cooking equipment in building occupancies.

### ***HIGH HAZARD MONITORING***

**Bulk Fuel Safety Unit:** Oversee and monitor the original installation of fuel storage facilities and the related suppression systems, and monitor the safe use of such systems with periodic testing and inspection. These installations include motor fuel stations, power plants, turbines, bulk oil terminals and Liquid Natural Gas Facilities. In addition to compliance inspections, the unit tests distribution piping and conducts emergency shut-down (ESD) performance tests at above facilities to test performance of gas detectors, UV detectors, temperature detectors, electric power shut-off and pressure tests.

**Explosives / Special Events:** Monitor the transportation, storage and use of explosives and pyrotechnic materials in the city of New York.

**Hazardous Cargo:** Perform annual permit renewal inspections of tank/cargo vehicles that are transporting regulated hazardous materials for compliance with Fire Department and D.O.T. regulations and respond to vehicle spill incidents

**Laboratories:** Monitor locations where hazardous chemicals, compressed and cryogenic gases, are used or stored for use at that location.

### ***INSPECTION SERVICES***

**Hazardous Storage/Operations Permits:** Monitor locations permitted to sell, store or use flammable and combustible liquids or mixtures, compressed gases. Monitor high hazard operations such as paint spraying, commercial cooking and large capacity refrigeration systems.

**High Rise:** Monitor compliance in Office buildings, Hotel/Motel, Dormitories, Single room occupancies, Welfare Hotels and Hospitals to ensure compliance with life /safety codes and to ensure that the location are prepared and can implement the provisions of their fire safety or emergency action plans.

**Public Assembly Inspections:** Conduct life safety inspections at places of assembly (e.g., restaurants, cabarets, movie theatres, catering establishments and schools).

**Public Buildings Inspections:** Maintain inspection records regarding fire and life safety conditions in facilities such as hospitals, nursing homes, schools, colleges, day care centers, day camps, group homes, group residence shelters, prisons and foster care sites.

**Night Team Inspections/ Special Inspections:** Coordinate interagency and special inspections programs on a regular basis to meet emerging or anticipated safety concerns.

### ***MANAGEMENT SERVICES***

**Fire Prevention Information Management System (FPIMS):** Support Department operations by maintaining data on locations that have been determined to be high hazard or high occupancy (over 236,000 premises).

**Quality Assurance/Compliance:** Document, monitor and report on the bureau's compliance program, efforts and progress, particularly as it relates to the requirements of the Inspector General's double check program.

**Account Analysis:** Expand the account base and improve data integrity through data reconciliation, analysis and automation.

**Admin Services:** Develop data sharing initiatives, compile and report on bureau indicators, process and report on procurement, transportation and reimbursement; coordinate the fleet maintenance and maintain the bureau's asset inventory.

### ***ENFORCEMENT SERVICES***

**Administrative Enforcement/ Plan Intake Window:** Compile court calendars for criminal court and the Environmental Control Board; liaison with legal/court representatives; provide feedback on court performance, and manage the Plan Intake Window.

**Compliance Review Unit:** Responsible for reviewing compliance documents against the inspector's requirements and FDNY policy and processing "cures".

ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT

**NYC PENALTY RELIEF PROGRAM  
FOR HOMEOWNERS AND BUSINESS OWNERS**

**Filing Period: September 21, 2009 through December 21, 2009**

**1. What is the NYC Penalty Relief Program?**

It's a three-month program authorized by Mayor Bloomberg and the City Council that allows businesses and homeowners to resolve Environmental Control Board ("ECB") violations that are "in default." Applicants can resolve their default violations by paying the base fine and will NOT have to pay additional penalties, late fees or interest. If a violation is associated with a correctible condition, known as a compliance violation, you must correct the condition before you may participate in the program.

**2. Who Can Apply for Penalty Relief?**

Any business or individual with Environmental Control Board violations in default may participate.

**3. What is an Environmental Control Board Violation?**

It is a violation issued by certain City agencies, including Sanitation, Buildings, Consumer Affairs, Transportation and others. Below are some of the most common violations:

- Dirty Sidewalk
- Failure to Properly Post Permits
- Failure to Properly Separate Recyclable Materials
- Failure to Restore Street Cut
- Illegal Posting of Handbill/Notice
- Sidewalk Obstruction
- Street Closing Without Permit
- Vending Merchandise Without a License/Permit
- Vending Food Without a License/Permit
- Vending in a Restricted Area such as a Bus Stop or Within 10 Feet of a Driveway, Subway, Crosswalk, etc.

**4. What Does It Mean for an Environmental Control Board Violation to Be "In Default"?**

A violation is in default if the individual or business that received the violation failed to pay the fine or challenge the violation in a hearing within the required time frame. This causes the violation to be "in default" and results in penalties, late fees and interest.

**5. How Will the Program Work?**

During the Penalty Relief Program, the City will waive the additional "default" penalties, late fees and interest if the individual or business that received the violation pays the original fine amount and corrects the violating condition (if applicable).

**6. How Long Will the Program Last?**

The program starts on September 21, 2009 and continues through December 21, 2009. In order to receive penalty relief, you must apply on or before December 21, 2009.

**7. How Do I Apply for the Program?**

- a) If you don't know what violation you have, if you are not sure how much you owe, or if you have more than five violations, you can apply for the program online, by phone or by mail. It takes less than five

minutes to apply because all we need is your name and address:

- **Online** at [www.nyc.gov/finance](http://www.nyc.gov/finance). This is the quickest way, and we will process your application even faster if you provide an email address.
- **By Phone** by calling 311. From outside New York City, dial 212-639-9675.
- **By Mail** by filling out an application (available for print-out at [www.nyc.gov/finance](http://www.nyc.gov/finance) or by calling 311) and mailing it to: **NYC Department of Finance, 66 John Street, Room 104, New York NY 10038, Attention: NYC Penalty Relief Program.**

- b) If you have five or fewer violations and know how much you were originally charged, you can bring the information to one of the Department of Finance's Business Centers in the five boroughs to resolve them on the spot.

### 8. What Happens After I Apply?

Once we receive your application, we will send you a Resolution Packet that consists of

- A list(s) of violations associated with the names and/or addresses submitted and the resolution amount;
- A Resolution Agreement; and
- Instructions for how to pay and resolve.

### 9. How Can I Pay?

- Sign the Resolution Agreement and include a check or money order for the resolution amount indicated in the packet and mail to: **NYC Department of Finance, 66 John Street, Room 104, New York, NY 10038. Attention: NYC Penalty Relief Program. *Please don't forget to write the case number on the check or money order.***
- Pay by cash, check, money order or credit card in person at one of Finance's five borough Business Centers.

### 10. What If a Violation Requires Corrective Action?

We will let you know if you have one or more violations that require corrective action. You must correct the violating condition and obtain proof from the issuing agency before you can resolve these violations as part of the program.

### 11. What If I Don't Agree with the List of Violations the City's Record Shows I Have Outstanding?

If you disagree with the list of violations and the amount owed, contact the Department of Finance to have the violations in dispute removed from the Resolution Packet. You are still responsible for paying these violations unless you resolve them by contacting ECB or the issuing agency directly. If you do not apply to resolve disputed violations by December 21, you will owe the base fine PLUS associated penalties, late fees and interest.

### 12. What If I Don't Pay What the City's Record Shows I Have Outstanding?

Unless you apply for the program and contact the issuing agencies to resolve the disputed violations by December 21, 2009, you will owe the full amount, including default penalties, late fees and interest. In addition, the City could take enforcement action and deny your business a license or permit.
