FDNY:

Report unsafe conditions in stores to 311; examine holiday lights make sure they have UL label, which means they have been inspected; remove lint from clothes dryer to prevent fire

DOT

Launched A POP-UP Café Pilot Program and is seeking applications from restaurants. Pop-up Cafés provide outdoor public seating in the curb lane during the warm months and promote local businesses. Such cafés are popular in Europe, where narrow sidewalks prevent sidewalk cafés, and have recently been established in California and Canada.

In the summer of 2010, DOT partnered with two Lower Manhattan restaurants to pilot the city's first Pop-up Café. Building on this success, DOT is expanding the Program in 2011 by partnering with restaurants or cafés in up to 12 locations throughout the five boroughs. Applications must be received by Friday, December 3, 2010. DOT will only accept applications for Pop-up Cafés from restaurants in locations where sidewalk cafés, licensed by the New York City Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA), are not permitted. Please see the Technical Criteria section for more information.

The cost of design, construction and maintenance of each Pop-up Café will be paid for by the sponsoring restaurant(s). Each restaurant must select a design and hire its own New York State licensed architect/engineer and construction team. DOT can provide technical assistance and make necessary safety improvements to the roadway, for example applying traffic markings to the street or adding flexible bollards. Pop-up Cafés built in New York and California has cost approximately \$10,000 per restaurant, but applicants may spend as little or as much as they wish, providing they comply with the Pop-up Café Design Guidelines. DOT will not impose any further costs unless a Pop-up Café occupies metered parking spaces.

This program is a two year pilot, spanning 2011-2012. After this point the City will evaluate the program to determine if and how it will be extended.

Stages to Develop a Pop-up Café:

1. Pop-up Café Application submitted to DOT
2. Preliminary review by DOT
3. DOT site visit and traffic engineering review
4. Preliminary approval by DOT of Pop-up Café Application
5. Community Board provides letter of support for Pop-up Café
6. Restaurant submits professionally-certified design plans to DOT
7. DOT signs a maintenance agreement with restaurant



9:41 a.m. – A motion was made for adoption of the October 29, 2010 Borough Service Cabinet agenda and the September 17, 2010 Borough Service Cabinet minutes. Both motions carried.

NYC Department of Homeless Services: Overview of Initiatives

Ms. Lisa Black, Director of Government Relations and Mr. Alex Zablocki, Director of Community Relations gave an overview of NYC Department of Homeless Services initiatives. DHS is experiencing a 10% drop at their family centers and an increase in their single adult population.

The Advantage Program is a rental subsidy that helps clients transition from temporary, emergency shelter to self-sufficiency as quickly as possible. Effective August 1, 2010, this new program was revised from the previous Advantage subsidy to promote employment and foster self-sufficiency. The program requires 20 hours/week of work and 15 hours/week of HRA approved activity. One can qualify if they are in shelter for 60 days or more. The program pays for 30% rent for one year. Clients making \$10,000 or more must save in an interest bearing account.

The Homebase Program is a city-wide program designed to help families and individuals overcome immediate housing problems that could result in becoming homeless, and to develop a plan for long-term housing stability. Program services are crafted to meet the unique needs of each individual or family and to help meet the demands of maintaining a household. Homebase clients are assigned a case manager who will coordinate all their services. Some of these services will be provided directly through Homebase, and others will be provided by community partners. Some of the services that are available to qualified households include: family or tenant/landlord mediation, household budgeting, emergency rental assistance, job training and placement and benefits advocacy.

NYS Division of Housing and Community Renewal: Agency Overview

Deputy Commissioner Woody Pascal provided an overview of DHCR as well historical information about the agency. NYS began regulating housing in the 1950s and 60s. In 1974 the Emergency Tenant Protection Act was passed. DHCR is now an agency of NYS Homes and Community Renewal. It served 27,000 people last year and receives 350 calls daily. The bureaus include: overcharge and luxury decontrol, property management, rent information and inspections. The agency has 299 employees, down from 643. There are less than 40,000 rent regulated units in the city, down from 1.1 million. Legislation must be passed by June 30th, 2011 to keep rent regulation in place.

Agencies Updates

- **Dept. of Finance** – there is a new SCRIE application which requires a copy of the applicant's lease along with paper documentation of the applicant's age and income.
- **Dept. of Probation** – Mr. Brent Cohen, Director of Legislative and Government Affairs at the Department of Probation introduced himself.
- **HRA** – Ms. Denise Hudson, HRA representative for the Bronx, is available to help address any Manhattan issues while the agency is short staffed.

Borough President's Report

On October 8, 2010 MBPO released a report documenting over 1,700 bike lane infractions observed over a three day period at 11 bike lanes. The most common infractions sited were motor vehicle blockage, pedestrian use and cyclists going in the wrong direction.

Community Board outreach for 2011 has begun. Re-applications are due Dec. 31, 2010 and new applications are due Jan. 14, 2011. The new application is online at www.mbpo.org.

On November 15th MBPO will hold a town hall meeting with NY Legal Assistance Group to hear from NYCHA residents about broken elevators and other accessibility issues. The town hall is at Taino Towers, 240 East 123rd Street from 6 – 8:00 pm.

Bob Redmond is retiring from the Parks Department. Thanks to him for his years of service.

District Manager Reports

Community Board 1

CB 1 adopted North Tribeca zoning changes after four years of work. The zoning will affect 24 blocks south of Canal Street. The process was collaborative with DCP and the Council voted two weeks ago. The Historic Districts Council has created an online archive which documents applications to the NYC Landmarks Preservation Commission and HDC's testimony on each proposal. Community Board 2

CB 2 announced two Halloween parades – the city’s major parade and the NYU & CB 2 children’s parade. There will be a bicycle strategy sub-committee meeting on November 30th.

Community Board 3

There has been an increase of homelessness in the district. A meeting with EMT will take place on November 17th to discuss forcible removal protocol due to the cold. CB 3 continues to struggle with rats and is working with DOHMH on the issue.

Community Board 4

CB 4 and DCP are planning for the 11th Avenue Rezoning. The Landmarks committee is surveying Chelsea. Thanks to DOT for new speed bumps near a school in the district.

Community Board 5

CB 5 is having liquor license issues, particular in Korea Town where nightlight establishments are stacked horizontally in tall buildings rather than vertically on ground floors. The SLA chair met with the CB to discuss the wording of their recommendations. CB 5 may create a Facebook presence.

Community Board 6

CB 6 is working with DEP on water main issues in the district.

Community Board 7

The Riverside Center ULURP for 8 acres of mixed use development is going to the city council. At the CPC, Ana Levin voted against the proposed density. Businesses along Columbus Avenue have expressed concerns about the installation of the bike lanes and lost of parking and loading zones. The CB is working with DOT on this.

Community Board 8

CB 8 passed a resolution in support of banning hydraulic fracturing in the NYC watershed. The CB also passed a resolution expressing concern about Tavern on the Green.

Community Board 9

A West Harlem Rezoning meeting will take place on Thursday Dec. 2, 2010 at Manhattanville Houses. CB 9 voted to support an RFP for Phoenix House which provides drug counseling services for youth and adults. A letter was sent to requesting an extension of the PS 186 deed restriction which expires in Jan 2011. The NYC Water Taxi is coming to West Harlem Piers.

Community Board 10

The African American Day Parade was a success. Landmarks Committee held several informational sessions.

Community Board 11

CB 11 passed a resolution regarding EDC’s proposal for the Julio de Burgos Cultural Center. The resolution calls on EDC to rescind the RFEI and discuss space management with the original tenant. CB 11 is working with DOT on proposed changes for 135th Street.

Community Board 12

DOHMH released a rat progress report for CB 12 and found 2,619 failures, which is 40% of all inspections. The problem is caused in part by topography in the area. CB 12 will hold a summit on the issue on December 6th. The board is working with DOT and DSNY on parking regulations for snow removal on Dyckman Ave.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS



With the holiday season upon us, most people are preoccupied with the details of holiday plans and shopping. Unfortunately, the safety precautions which we normally take are sometimes forgotten or the excitement of the season causes us to let down our guard. The Police Department wants this to be a **SAFE** holiday season for all, so we remind you to follow these safety tips and enjoy the City and the season.

- *Be alert and aware of your surroundings at all times. Criminals often confront people who are distracted.
- *Whether driving, walking or taking public transportation, plan the trip in advance. Know how to get to your destination by the most direct and safest route.
- *Travel on populated, well lit streets. If possible, travel with a friend.
- *When driving, keep your doors locked and the windows closed. Make sure the gas tank is full and maintain your car in good working order to avoid breakdowns.
- *If you are taking the subway, look for the red or green lights outside the entrance. A red light means that you cannot enter the subway system at the location. Look for an entrance with a green light before going down the stairs.
- *If possible, stay in the view of the token booth while awaiting your train. Never walk near the edge of the platform.
- *Plan your purchases in advance and carry only the amount of cash necessary to make the purchase. If you must carry a large sum of money, divide the cash between your purse, pockets and wallet.
- *Record the numbers for each of the credit cards you own. This will facilitate reporting the theft or loss of the card.



*Carry your purse close to your body. Place one end of the purse in the palm of your hand and the other in the bend of the elbow. Never carry a purse by the handle or wrap the strap around your body.

*Always lock your car. Before getting into your car check the back seat to make sure no one is hiding.

*If you are carrying a wallet, carry it in the breast pocket of your jacket or in your side pants pocket. The rear pants pocket is one of the easiest to pick.

*When in a restaurant, don't leave your handbag or packages unattended.

*If you must place packages in your car, put them into the trunk and make sure the trunk is locked. The trunk lock should be protected by a cylinder guard plate. Never leave packages in the passenger compartment unattended.

*Don't wait until you have reached your front door to look for your keys. Have them ready in your hand. If a stranger is standing near your door, it may be a good idea not to go in until the situation is safer.

*Lock your front door immediately upon entering your home.

*If you live in apartment building, don't buzz in someone who rings your bell until you have verified who they are. This will help protect both yourself and your neighbors.

*Be wary of con artists. Con artists use a number of ploys to scam you and steal your property. Some divert your attention while another picks your pocket, some pose as utility workers or a tradesperson to gain access to your home, while others conduct scams that are more elaborate involving several con artists. As a consumer you should also be wary of illegal vendors selling goods on the street. Purchase merchandise from only licensed vendors or reputable stores. Follow your instincts and remember, " If it seems too good to be true, it probably is".




