For the month of August Staff had approximately 600 contacts (see attached), the majority after meetings were persons seeking information.

UPCOMING EVENTS

September 9, 2005 – Group Budget Consultations ACS, HRA, DHS, at OMB 75 Park Place beginning at 10:00 A.M. (see attached). Highlights;

Agency For Children's Services (ACS) – Indicated that they need funding help for inspectors and removal of Lead at Head Start Programs which they are discovering under the rules of Local Law One.

Human Resources Administration (HRA) – They are seeking to expand Housing Stability Plus to supplant Section 8. This funding will assist families in Shelters to secure permanent housing. In FY'07 (beginning July 1, 2006) \$ 33 million is being budgeted for temporary housing, and \$5.06 million for Immigrant assistance the two specific centers. "One City, One Client" concept is being used in a pilot project to coordinate services within different agencies to save funds on duplication and maximize performance. No plans yet for Katrina Victims.

Dept. of Homeless Services (DHS) – The only projected increase in funding is for cost of living for Service provider's staff. One program receiving outreach money is the Bridge (on West 125th Street)

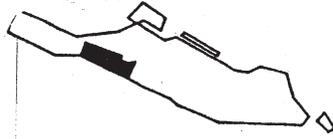

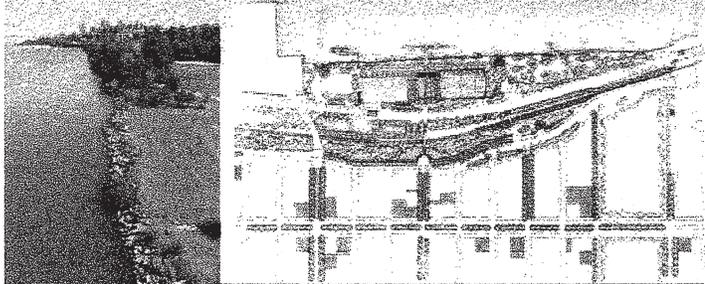

Dear Mr. Mc Clean

This is to inform you of a NYC Transit service plan which will affect our customers and your constituents for the next two weekends, two weekends in October 2005 and an additional three weekends in January 2006.

Due to major construction work necessary to construct the new Fulton Street Transit Center in Downtown Manhattan, NYC Transit needs to reroute or replace the 2 3 4 5 lines, temporarily affecting weekend service in Manhattan and Brooklyn. Attached, please find a copy of a Take-One which will be available in all affected stations. This Take-One informs our customers how to proceed during the weekends when normal service is affected. The weekends in 2005 where service will be affected are September 10-12, September 17-19, October 15-17 and October 22-24. We will be informing you of the January 2006 dates as soon as they are confirmed.

As you can see by reading the Take-One, the Hoyt Street and Clark Street 2 3 stations in Brooklyn and the Wall Street, Fulton Street and Park Place 2 3 stations in Manhattan will be closed during the above-mentioned weekends. Our customers will be fully-provided with travel alternatives, as depicted on the Take-One and posters which will be displayed throughout all affected stations and posted on our website at www.mta.info.

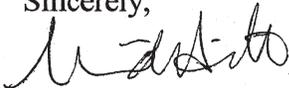

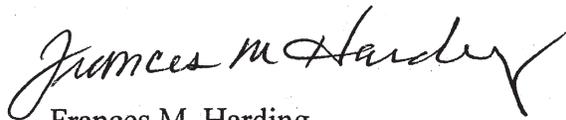
