Highlights from the Borough Service Cabinet (BSC) Meeting (6/26)

Presentation: On Rules and Procedures for Street Activity Permits

Presenter: Dawn Tolson, Director, Street Activity Permit Office, New York City Office of Citywide Event Coordination and Management

The Mayor's Street Activity Permit Office (SAPO) issues permits for events that take place on Department of Transportation (DOT) property. This includes City Streets, Sidewalks, Curb Lanes and Pedestrian Plazas.

1). Block Party:

A community sponsored event requiring the closure of a single block of a street, or a portion thereof for a single day in which no sales of goods or services occurs;

2). Clean-up:

An event that is held for the purpose of neighborhood improvement by a not-for-profit organization, Community Sponsor or an individual with an indigenous relationship with the proposed event location. No sales of goods or services to the general public shall occur at a Clean-up;

3). Farmer's market:

An open-air market held on a sidewalk for the sale to the general public of products grown, raised, caught or baked by local farmers and fishers. An Applicant for a Farmer's market shall be a not-for-profit corporation with federal tax exempt status;

4). Mobile Unit:

A Mobile Unit is the staging of a vehicle(s) for religious purposes while serving a benefit to the community;

5). Religious Event:

An act of public worship on streets or sidewalks while serving a benefit to the community;

6). Single Block Festival:

A Single Block Festival is a street activity requiring a single block street closure and contains vendors. The Sponsor shall be a community-based, not-for-profit organization, association, or the like, which has an indigenous relationship to the specific street, community or both;

7). Special Events:

A Special Event shall mean street activities that promote, advertise or introduce a product, corporation, company or other commercial entity or the goods or services of a corporation, company, or other commercial entity to either the general public for a portion of the general public;

Request(s) to park production related materials, venue load-in and load-out, or promotional events on pedestrian plazas are also categorized as special events.

8). Street Festival/Fair:

A Community Sponsored Event requiring a street closure of one block or more in which the general public can purchase goods or services provided by vendors and vendors may pay a fee to participate.

Moratorium: As per Section 1-05 (d) of Chapter 1 of Title 50 of the Rules of the City of New York, "the Director shall deny applications for street activity permits for street fairs not

held in the calendar year preceding the effective date of this amendment to these rules...”
Applicants are urged not to apply for this type of permit if they do not meet these requirements.

✓ **What are the application deadlines?**

- Block Party 90 days prior to event date
- Clean Up 60 days prior to event date
- Farmers Market 90 days prior to event date
- Mobile Unit 60 days prior to event date
- Religious Ceremony 60 days prior to event date
- Single Block Festival December 31 of the year *preceding* the event (applications received 90 days prior may also be reviewed)
- Street Festival December 31 of the year *preceding* the event*
- Special Event 14 days prior to event date

***only applicable to apply are events held in the previous year**

✓ **How do you apply for a permit?**

Online:

To apply for a SAPO permit online, please visit <https://nyceventpermits.nyc.gov>

- Create an account and complete the registration enrollment form;
- Choose the type of event you would like to apply for;
- Fill out the entire questionnaire with as much detail as possible (attach documents if necessary), and pay a non-refundable processing fee (\$25.75) by credit card
- Once the processing fee is paid, the application is transmitted directly to SAPO (and the appropriate community board when applicable)

Manual:

- To obtain a hard copy of the SAPO application, please visit the SAPO office located at 100 Gold Street, 2nd fl. New York N.Y. 10038 for a copy of the application;
- Fill out the entire application with as much detail as possible (provide necessary supplemental documentation).
- All manual applications require a \$25 non-refundable processing fee of either a money order or a certified check (made payable to the: City of New York – Department of Finance).

Manhattan Borough President's Office reported on the participatory process of the Manhattan Community Award Program which provides small discretionary grants to nonprofit organizations and public schools for programmatic and operating expenses. The grant sizes are between \$3,500 to \$5,000 and are contracted through the following five city agencies:

Mayor Bill de Blasio and Human Resources Administration (HRA) Commissioner Steven Banks announced a new citywide outreach campaign to spread the word about the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly Food Stamps) to New Yorkers who qualify for SNAP benefits but aren't receiving them. The campaign includes specific outreach to the two largest unenrolled but eligible groups – seniors and immigrants – with the goal of reaching all New Yorkers who can benefit from SNAP. The centerpiece of the campaign is a state-of-the-art website, FoodHelp.nyc, which includes videos featuring real SNAP clients sharing stories of how the program helped them, links to the newly-redesigned ACCESS NYC site where people can apply, and an interactive map with the locations of food pantries, community kitchens and SNAP application locations.

The campaign also includes targeted ads on subways, buses, and bus shelters, and in neighborhood locations such as check cashing stores, bodegas, hair and nail salons, barber shops and laundromats. HRA is partnering with dozens of community organizations, food pantries and advocates to generate a strong social media outreach effort and gain support for the campaign by leveraging the digital presence of community partners and with specially designed posters and brochures. Outreach materials will be available in English and the six Local Law languages (Spanish, Russian, Chinese, Korean, Arabic, and Haitian Creole.).

ACCESS NYC was re-launched (at www.nyc.gov/accessnyc) with a streamlined SNAP application and a new online SNAP recertification. Visitors must now create a new account in order to use website, the change in user accounts will not affect current benefits. Both the SNAP application and the new SNAP recertification provide users with a confirmation number once documents are successfully submitted.

Medicaid Renewal is no longer available online: With the ACCESS NYC upgrade, Medicaid renewals can no longer be submitted online. To renew coverage, Medicaid clients must complete and return their renewal form in the postage-paid envelope enclosed in the package mailed to client. IDNYC is the new, FREE identification card for all New York City residents, which gives individuals the opportunity to show who we are (New Yorkers). As a government-issued photo identification card, IDNYC secures access to City services to the most vulnerable communities—the homeless, youth, the elderly, undocumented immigrants, the formerly incarcerated and others who may have difficulty obtaining other government-issued ID.

IDNYC cardholders can access services and programs offered by the City as well as by businesses. IDNYC helps enhance public safety, by serving as a recognized ID for interacting with NYPD. It also helps New Yorkers gain access to all City buildings that provide services to the public and is accepted as a form of identification for accessing numerous City programs and services. IDNYC also provides a dynamic series of benefits to cardholders, including a free one-year membership at many of the City's leading museums, zoos, concert halls, and botanical gardens.

Citizens Committee for New York City – Neighborhood Leadership Institute – Fall 2015 is offering a series of free participatory workshops to build community organizing skills. All Workshop Participants (including Basics of Community Organizing) will receive a

Manhattan DA's Office reported on: A New Electronic Monitoring Pilot Program set to begin September 2015, the program is being offered to defendant's ages 16 to 18 who are accused of certain felonies. A series of psychological surveys and tests will be used to determine which defendants are good candidates, the targeted teens selected in this program have been charged with crimes like grand larceny, drug dealing and robberies committed without a weapon. The program will involve up to 20 defendants at one time and would last for one year, at a cost of \$15/day per bracelet.

The program is being designed individually to meet the needs of each defendant, along with a strict schedule that might include school, work, therapy, drug treatment, and curfew and other activities. The monitoring system enables remote supervision of a defendant by case managers. If the defendant does not make the appointed rounds as agreed, he/she will receive telephone calls from case managers demanding an explanation and urging compliance.



About the Program

Get FREE Wi-Fi at home with The New York Public Library's new Library HotSpot program designed for patrons who do not have Internet access at home.

This Library program enables eligible patrons to "check out" Internet service from the Library for six months—absolutely free. Both the device and monthly service fees are fully paid by NYPL. The program is intended to help NYPL patrons access online resources at home.

1. Who is eligible to participate?

The program is open to patrons:

- a) with no household Internet access at the time of sign-up
- b) who have a valid adult library card with no outstanding fines

2. How long can I check out the device?

The device and service can be borrowed for six months and renewed for up to six more months.

3. How much will it cost?

It is absolutely free. There are no fees for the device or service.

4. What if I lose it or return it late?

If the device is lost or not returned, a fine of \$100 will be assessed and your library card privileges will be blocked until the device is returned or the fine is paid.

5. How do I renew the device?

You can renew online or at any NYPL location.

1. SIGN UP

Eligible patrons can RSVP online for lending events at participating branches.



2. CHECK OUT

Check out a Library HotSpot device from your branch during a lending event. You can keep it for six months.


- Dedicated lane for buses between Lenox and Morningside Avenues
