

May, 2014 District Manager's Report

Highlights from the DSC Meeting (5/14/14):

Agency Updates:

DOT - Reported as part of the Vision Zero Initiative, NYCDOT and NYPD and other agencies are working together to develop a comprehensive pedestrian safety plan. The Arterial Slow Zone program announced by NYDCOT is one of 63 proposals included in the Vision Zero report released in February. The Arterial Slow Zone objective is to lower posted speed limits from 30 to 25 mph. on streets that have seen some of highest numbers of fatalities and serious injuries. On these arterials, DOT will make comprehensive improvements to signal timing along the corridor, maintaining crucial vehicular capacity and providing more efficient, predictable traffic flows along these heavily used corridors. The locations identified will also benefit from increased enforcement by the NYPD. The program will feature comprehensive signal timing enhancements paired with distinctive blue-and-white speed limit signage with the name of the corridor, complementing the agency's existing Neighborhood Slow Zone program as well as the administration's efforts to reduce the citywide speed limit in partnership with the state legislature.

It was recently announced the first two Arterial Slow Zones in Manhattan: Canal Street from East Broadway to West Street and **Upper Broadway (Columbus Circle to W. 220th Street.)** If you are interested in obtaining additional information about Arterial Slow Zone programs please visit our websites at www.nyc.gov/dot and www.nyc.gov/visionzero.

26th Pct. – Reported a slight rise in robberies mostly due to personal property theft -cell phones (see Stats)

30th Pct. – Reported Captain Michael Baker has recently been assigned to the 30th (see Stats)

Patrol Borough Manhattan North – Reported overall crime is down (see Stats); the President Obama is in town, and a 2nd Congressional Debate is scheduled in the district; therefore increase patrol will be assigned throughout the district and entire city over the next few days.

Upcoming Events: Aids Walk and the Veteran's Day Parade is scheduled for Sunday, May 18th. The Youth **Police Academy is currently accepting applications for young people 10-16yrs**; application process starts 5/18/14 – 6/27/14 – program is scheduled to start on July 7th. New York City resident, attending school, between the ages of 10 and 16 are eligible to attend.

The Youth Police Academy will provide those participating in the program with lunch and uniform shirts. Goals for the academy are: to enhance responsible citizenship; to provide positive interaction with police officers and to educate young people about the challenges and responsibility of police work; to encourage young people to take part in other youth programs offered by the Police Department such as: the Law Enforcement Explorers, Police Cadet Corps and the Police Athletic League.

The 2014 Youth Police Academy is a six (6) week program that will hold sessions five (5) days a week. The Academy will open at 8:30 a.m. in the morning and dismiss at 2p.m. Students will attend classroom sessions with lectures, role-plays and topical demonstrations by police officers in the areas of law, behavioral science, drug prevention and gang resistance. Field trip are so part of the curriculum. (See attached application)

FDNY – Reported 45 Structural fires (see Stats) it was also reported that there has been a 50% increase in call since the gas explosion in East Harlem.

Morningside Heights Branch- Reported new computer for library will be delivered on May 27th for events throughout the month (see attached Calendar of Events)

Department of Buildings – Reported Buildings Commissioner Robert LiMandri and Chief Service Officer Diahann Billings-Burford launched the third season of NYC “CoolRoofs”, a citywide initiative to encourage property owners to cool their rooftops with a white, reflective coating that repels the sun's rays. Program was originally launched in 2009; the innovative program will help the City reach its PlaNYC goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 30 percent by 2030. By reflecting sunlight instead of absorbing it, white roofs lower a building's temperature and reduce the amount of energy needed to cool the building. Cool roofs reduce the City's overall carbon emissions and work against the urban heat island effect, which raises temperatures in metropolitan areas by up to five degrees. The program utilizes the power of

volunteers, organized by *NYC Service*, to help make the coatings possible and affordable. Since the initiative's inaugural season, 2.6 million square feet of rooftop has been cooled throughout the City with the help of more than 3,000 volunteers.

HRA – Reported Commissioner Steven Banks was assigned to the agency on April 1, 2014, and on his first day visited HRA locations in all five boroughs to meet with frontline staff, answer questions and hear their ideas for the Agency.

MTA – Select Bus Service (SBS) for the M-60 will begin on May 25th, 2014 this new service will drastically cut travel time to and from LaGuardia Airport.

DEP – Reported Commissioner Emily Lloyd proposed a 3.35% increase in the Fiscal Year 2015 (FY15) water rate to the New York City Water Board. The proposal for FY15 represents the lowest increase in nine years and is less than half the published projection of 7.8% anticipated for this spring. The significant reduction was achieved through internal cost-cutting measures and by redirecting part of the excess rental payment that had been adding to ratepayers' bills.

Human Rights Commission – Reported ALL NYC Intern's are covered under the Human Right's Law and all incidents should be reported directly to their agency.

City Councilmember Mark Levine's Office – Reported after numerous constituent complaints extra lighting has been approved for the corridor of Broadway (bet. 153rd – 155th streets).

Highlights from the Borough Service Cabinet Meeting (4/25/14):

Under New York City's Earned Sick Time Act (Paid Sick Leave Law), certain employers must give their employees sick leave, which they can use for the care and treatment of themselves or a family member.

Employers with five or more employees who are hired to work more than 80 hours a calendar year in New York City must provide paid sick leave. Employers with less than five employees must provide unpaid sick leave.

Employers who have one or more domestic workers who have been employed at least one year and who work more than 80 hours a calendar year must provide paid sick leave.

Employers must comply with the law starting April 1, 2014.

Employers Whose Employees are Not Covered by the Law

The law does not cover employees who work 80 hours or less a calendar year; students in federal work study programs; employees whose work is compensated by qualified scholarship programs; employees of government agencies; physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech language pathologists, audiologists who are licensed by the New York State Department of Education if they call in for work assignments at will, determine their own work schedule, have the ability to reject or accept any assignment referred to them, and are paid an average hourly wage, which is at least four times the federal minimum wage; independent contractors who do not meet the

definition of an employee under New York State Labor Law; participants in Work Experience Programs; certain employees subject to a collective bargaining agreement. In the case of collective bargaining agreements, employees are not covered by the law if the agreement expressly waives the law's provisions and provides comparable benefits. However, for employees in the construction or grocery industry covered by a collective bargaining agreement, the law does not apply if the agreement expressly waives the law's provisions. Agency Announcements/Updates:

Department of Homeless Services- Recently approved a new addendum to their Open-Ended Request for Proposal (RFP) for shelter development. Addendum 10 incorporates enhancements developed as a result of discussions with community members, elected officials and stakeholders across the City.

Addendum 10 requires all shelter proposers to now submit written notification of their intent to operate a facility to each applicable elected official as well as the Chairperson and District Manager of the appropriate Community Board. Proposers are also further required to submit proof of such notification to DHS. The notification letter will provide vital information relevant to the proposer's submission to the RFP including the population the organization intends to serve (e.g. families with children, single adults or adult families); the proposed capacity of the shelter; the timeframe for occupancy and address of the facility; and pertinent background information about the organization's qualifications. Additionally, DHS is also requiring the provider to offer to meet with the community board within 30 days of receipt of the letter to discuss the proposed program. *(See Addendum #10 attached)*

Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer & Public Advocate Tish James are sponsoring Town Halls in every borough to explain the rights and responsibilities of employers and

employees under the new expansion of the Paid Sick Leave law. The City's Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA), the body which enforces the new law, will make a presentation at each Town Hall and answer questions. Manhattan's event was held April 30, but other borough events are: Brooklyn, May 12th; Queens, May 13th; Staten Island, May 28.



- All Proposers shall submit prior written notification to both the Chairperson and District Manager of the appropriate Community Board (CB) with copies to each applicable City Council Member, State Senator, Assembly Member, Congressional representative and Borough President of their intent to submit a proposal to DHS in response to this RFP to operate a homeless shelter site. A signed copy of that letter on official organization letterhead and proof that the letter was received by all local elected officials shall accompany the proposal submitted to DHS. The notification letter shall include the following:
 - An introductory paragraph stating that the organization intends to submit a proposal to DHS for review in response to the Open Ended RFP.
