Reports

26 Precinct: Capt. Flood

The Overall crime stats are really good, down 30%, off in almost all categories.

See attached Stat sheet for all data.

Noted that Starbucks at 114th Street is a concern bec property being stolen – mostly through carelessness

Otherwise there is no pattern

For year down 15%

Park crime down significantly

Traffic: 125 and Amsterdam and 125 and Bway are the two worst in our precinct. Belief is that it is due to higher volume

Third worst is the Fairway exit on to 12th AV and 131 street

M Norrick suggested that we ask Fairway to put up a sign warning of bicyclists

Josh Orzeck [DOT] Noted that they will do a sign study; wants only a right turn from the exit. Also a way to daylight the exit.

Capt Flood wants to close the small parking lot on 133 just before the northbound entrance to the Westside [Miller] Hiway.

Noted that Convent AV had been returned to the community from CCNY

J Orzeck reported that there will be turn restrictions at Amsterdam and 122 and 123. [Left turns southbound from Amsterdam and Right turns northbound will be **prohibited.**]

J Morris – Harlem Hist Soc.

Returned to ask for more streets to be added to the naming and wants the fountain at 155 and Edgecombe to be named Houston Plaza. We reminded him that this was on the boundary of CB12 and CB10. We also reminded him that CB9 had a longstanding practice of only naming one block to honor a person, no matter how meritorious the person might have been.

TK then asked whether he wanted Houston to be included with the other two namings that we had passed on the previous meeting. He decided to wait til he ascertained the reactions of the other Boards.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:40

Street Co-Naming Resolution

Whereas: *Thurgood Marshall, (July 2, 1908 – January 24, 1993) was an American jurist and the first African American to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court.*

Whereas: *When Marshall wanted to apply to his hometown law school at the University of Maryland School of Law, the dean told him that he shouldn't bother because he would not be accepted due to the school's segregation policy. Later, as a civil rights litigator, he successfully sued the school in the case of Murray v. Pearson. Instead he sought admission and was accepted at Howard University. He was influenced by its dynamic new Dean, Charles Hamilton Houston, who instilled in his students the desire to apply the tenets of the Constitution to all Americans.*

Whereas: *As the second Chief Counsel for the NAACP, Marshall won his first Supreme Court case, Chambers v. Florida, at the age of 32, in 1940. He argued many other cases before the Supreme Court, most of them successfully, including Smith v. Allwright; Shelley v. Kraemer; Sweatt v. Painter; and McLaurin v. Oklahoma State Regents. His most famous case as a lawyer was Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, the case in which the Supreme Court ruled that "Separate but Equal" Public Education was Unconstitutional because it could never be truly equal. In total, Marshall won 29 out of the 32 cases he argued before the Supreme Court.*

Whereas: *In 1967 President Johnson appointed Marshall to the Supreme Court, saying that this was "The right thing to do, The right time to do it, The right man and The right place." He was the first African-American on the Court. He served for twenty-four years, compiling a liberal record that included strong support for Constitutional protection of individual rights, especially the rights of criminal suspects against the government. Marshall concluded in Furman v. Georgia that the death penalty was, in all circumstances, unconstitutional.*

Whereas: *Even though he is best remembered for his jurisprudence in the fields of Civil Rights and Criminal Procedure, Marshall made significant contributions to other areas of the law as well. In TSC Industries, Inc. v. Northway, Inc. he articulated a formulation for the standard of materiality in United States securities law that is still applied & used today. He also extended the principle of "Fair Representation" on behalf of working people.*

Resolved: *Although he was a great man who made this world a better place, and received many awards while he was alive, it is past time for our Community and our City to recognize, remember, and suitably honor our neighbor (409 Edgecombe Ave) and a Great Harlemitte by Co-Naming -*

Street Co-Naming Resolution

Whereas: *Asa Philip Randolph - writer, journalist, publisher, labor leader, and civil right activist, Born 4/15/1889 - Died 5/16/1979, is universally considered as the greatest Black Labor Leader of the Twentieth Century.*

Whereas: *As a leader and a fighter as well as a deep thinker he first published "The Messenger" magazine during the Harlem Renaissance. In 1925 he established the first and most successful Black Labor Union in the United States, **THE BROTHERHOOD OF SPEERING CAR PORTERS**. It took twelve years of fierce struggle but ultimately under his leadership the Union prevailed and forced the powerful Pullman Company to give them a contract.*

Whereas: *It was on this foundation that he formed the Coalition that was able to leverage President Roosevelt in 1942 to sign the Executive Order that banned discrimination within the Government and among the Defense Industries that won Government contracts by threatening the first March on Washington.*

Whereas: *It was after World War II that Randolph again took a stand against Jim Crow segregation in the Armed Forces and called on Blacks to refuse to register for the Draft or to not serve if called. Finally President Truman gave in and issued the famous Executive Order barring Discrimination in the Military in 1948.*

Whereas: *That he was successful and effective in these incredibly important groundbreaking initiatives which provided the **Economic Foundation of the Civil Rights Revolution** was because of his credibility and that strategically he knew when to accept "Victory" - the Attainment of the Objective at that point in time.*

Whereas: *His Pre-eminent Leadership place in The Civil Rights Movement was recognized by all the other Civil Rights Leaders as a unifying force prior to, and facilitating the great culminating **March on Washington**. Within a year the **Civil Rights Act of 1964** became law.*

Resolved: *Although he was a great man who made this world a better place, and received many awards while he was alive, it is past time for our Community to remember, and honor our neighbor (Dunbar Apartments) and a Great Harlemite - Asa Philip Randolph, by co-naming 145th Street from the Western Corners of Edgecombe Avenue to ~~the intersection of~~ - A. Philip Randolph Boulevard.*
