Neighborhood Development Area (NDA)	DYCD administers the federal Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) program to combat poverty and provide emergency services to low-income people. In order to maximize the impact of federal CSBG funding, DYCD targets funds to low-income communities, which it designates as Neighborhood Development Areas (NDAs).	350	\$16,000,000	Summer 2008
Family/Adolescent Literacy	DYCD Family Literacy programs serve the educational needs of parents and their school-age children. All programs include an integrated set of activities that address adult basic education, enhanced youth education, parent and child interaction, and instruction in child development/parenting strategies. Adolescent literacy programs use a range of educational approaches to help struggling 6th and 7th graders develop their reading, writing, and oral communication skills in an afterschool setting.	27	\$3,300,000	Fall 2008
Runaway Homeless Youth (RHY)	DYCD funds programs designed to protect runaway and homeless youth and, whenever possible, reunite them with their families. Out of School Time (OST) High School Program	The Out of School Time (OST) Program is the largest after-school initiative in the nation. These free programs offer a balanced mix of academic support, sports, recreational activities, and cultural experiences for elementary, middle school, and high school youth. Service Learning	Service Learning programs allow youth between the ages of 13 and 21 to design and implement a meaningful service project that meets a need in their community.	62	\$3,000,000	
Young Adult Internship Program (YAIP)	The Young Adult Internship Program (YAIP) is a 14-week internship program for low-income New York City young adults aged 16-24 who are not working and not in school.	15	\$5,100,000	
Youth Workforce Development	The In-School Youth (ISY) program provides year-round services to at-risk high school juniors and seniors who meet certain eligibility requirements. The Out-of-School Youth (OSY) program is for 16-21 year-old young adults who are not connected to school or work, or who need assistance upgrading their occupational skills. Funded through the Workforce Investment Act, these programs offer occupational skills training, assistance with job and college placement, GED preparation, and a wide range of supportive services designed to increase young adults' success in the workplace and in their personal lives.	68	\$19,854,761
