Beacon Community Centers	The Beacon program supports 80 community centers located in public schools. These centers operate in the afternoons and evenings, on weekends, during school holidays and vacation periods, and during the summer. Beacons provide a range of activities for young people including tutoring, college prep, photography, basketball, and martial arts. Services for adults and families include General Education Diploma (GED) training, English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) programs, parenting skills workshops, and tenant education and advocacy.	80	\$39,500,000	December/2012
Fatherhood Initiative	DYCD's Fatherhood Initiative helps fathers reconnect with their children and develop essential parenting skills. WIA Out of School Youth	DYCD's Out-of-School Youth (OSY) program is for 16-21 year-old young adults who are not connected to school or work, or who need assistance upgrading their occupational skills. Funded through the Workforce Investment Act, these programs offer occupational skills training, assistance with job and college placement, GED preparation, and a wide range of supportive services designed to increase young adults' success in the workplace and in their personal lives.
