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NYC Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence, Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications, and NYC Digital Partners with Latino Technology Groups, Hosts Hackathon to Prevent Cyberstalking

(New York, NY) The NYC Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence (OCDV), Department of Information Technology and Telecommunications (DoITT), NYC Digital, NY Latino Tech Meetup, and NYC Tech Latinas will host an anti-cyberstalking "Hackathon" on January 30-31, 2015, to develop and design a training model to increase online safety and privacy for domestic violence victims. The two-day event, which is free and open to the public, is a part of the City's ongoing effort to prevent and reduce intimate partner stalking cases. The New York City Family Justice Centers will offer the user-friendly, interactive training model to clients once fully developed.

"Developing tools to help empower and protect domestic violence survivors remains a top priority for the Mayor's Office to Combat Domestic Violence," said Commissioner Rosemonde Pierre-Louis, OCDV. "New York City continues to attract some of the leading software developers and engineers, and we are encouraging them to apply their talent to helping to increase the safety of vulnerable New Yorkers."

The Hackathon is the latest anti-stalking measure OCDV has implemented. Last year, OCDV expanded its Staten Island Coordinated Approach to Preventing Stalking (CAPS) initiative to all precincts within the borough. The CAPS program aims to increase the identification and reporting of intimate partner stalking incidents, and enhance stalking arrests and prosecution.

"Digital tools have changed the way we communicate, organize, and access resources," said Jessica Singleton, Digital Director, City of New York. "As we act on our mission of making New York the most digitally engaged city government in the world, NYC Digital supports efforts – like this Hackathon – that leverage the power of our civic technology community to develop resources that empower New Yorkers with tools to improve their own health, safety, and lives."

"Technology holds great power to improve lives – and to help heal them," said **Department of** Information Technology and Telecommunications Commissioner Anne Roest. "Successfully combating cyber-stalking requires dedicated partners within and beyond government, and I commend Commissioner Pierre-Louis and her team for pursuing the type of inclusive approach hackathons can offer in identifying collaborative, workable solutions."

In an increasingly growing cyber community, domestic violence abusers have been found to use technology to stalk victims. According to national statistics, fifty-four percent of homicide victims reported stalking to the police before they were killed by their intimate partner.

"We're excited to bring together a group of multidisciplinary designers, engineers, and web/mobile developers to help protect victims of domestic violence," said **Nic Santana**, **Organizer for NY Latino Tech Meetup**. "Through the course of 12 hours we are hoping this event will create solutions and suggestions that can help aid the Family Justice Center clients."

"Hack-a-thons can be fast-paced fun events but they also provide the space to come up with innovative solutions to important issues," said **Yvonne De La Peña, Organizer, NYC Tech Latinas**. "In organizing this event we are hoping this will be the case regarding such a critical social issue currently affecting our city."

Cyberstalking is wide ranging, from monitoring social media and email activity through spyware to tracking the movement of victims using navigation systems and cellular phone data.
