

September 2012 Workforce Development and Education Providers' Jobs Report

OVERVIEW

- New York City's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate decreased from 9.9 percent in August to 9.5 percent in September. Although improved since last month, unemployment rate is still higher than it was one year ago (9.1%). (9.1%).
- New York City's unemployment rate is higher than the state's (8.9%) and the nation's (7.8%).


1-YEAR CHANGES


- New York City's private sector employment increased 92,600 or by 2.9 percent since a year ago.
- Over the past year, the sectors with the most job growth were administrative and support and waste management services (+21,700), professional, scientific, and technical services (+21,000), and accommodation and food service (+16,200). Within administrative services, gains were concentrated in employment services (+17,000). The data don't provide enough detail to indicate whether the gains were in temporary or permanent placement agencies.
- The largest job losses were in transportation and warehousing (-2,400), finance and insurance (-1,100) and construction (-800).
- The City's over-the-year private sector growth rate (2.9%) was stronger than the state's (1.9%) or the nation's (1.7%).

THIS MONTH'S MAJOR TRENDS

- The City gained 9,900 private sector jobs this month, less than half of the 10-year average of 23,900 jobs typically added this time of year.
- The largest *job gains* were in educational services (+5,200, not including public schools), accommodation and food services (+2,900), and administrative and support servies (+2,700). Gains in private education were lower than average for this time of year.
- This month's largest job losses were in finance and insurance (-3,300), arts, entertainment and recreation (-2,700), and government (-2,300). Arts and entertainment job losses were concentrated in seasonal recreation activities. Government job losses were concentrated in local government, not including public schools.
