New York City and the Federal Recovery Act

New York City continues to benefit from funds provided by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA). ARRA grants support programs and projects that are strengthening our economy while providing jobs, budget relief and investments in innovative programs. This newsletter provides a snapshot of how New York City is utilizing ARRA dollars. Through March 31, 2011, New York City has put over \$5.89 billion in ARRA funding to work.

New Stimulus at Work Stories

Fire Marshal Brian Krebs

Through the ARRA-funded Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) program, Fire Marshal Krebs was promoted to New York City Fire Marshal from the rank of Firefighter. Together with other members of his promotional class, Fire Marshal Krebs received training on investigating arson and identifying the causes of fires. This ARRA program allowed New York City to increase the number of Fire Marshals available for investigating suspicious fires, keeping New Yorkers safer from the threat posed by suspect fires.



Union Ironworker Ronnie Barlow

Union Ironworker Ronnie Barlow is working with the New York City Department of Transportation (DOT) to rehabilitate the Wards Island Pedestrian Bridge on 103rd Street in Manhattan. The bridge crosses the Harlem River and connects Manhattan Island and Wards Island. ARRA funds allowed Mr. Barlow, who was laid off from his job, to get back to work. When the bridge rehabilitation is complete, scores of New Yorkers will be able to access the bridge, and walk or bike to nearby Randall's and Wards Island Park.

ARRA Projects



Stormwater runoff in NYC has major environmental and monetary costs. Currently, even a small amount of rain can overwhelm our combined sewer system, which results in water pollution. ARRA funded a pilot program for stormwater capture technologies at 26 new Greenstreets sites. Greenstreets catch stormwater runoff, which means less water in the sewage system, lower costs and less pollution. The collective efforts of these 26 new sites will capture a projected 5,660,000 gallons of stormwater – equivalent to over 8.5 Olympic-size swimming pools – each year. In addition, new Greenstreets help improve pedestrian and vehicular safety, clean the air and beautify neighborhoods.
