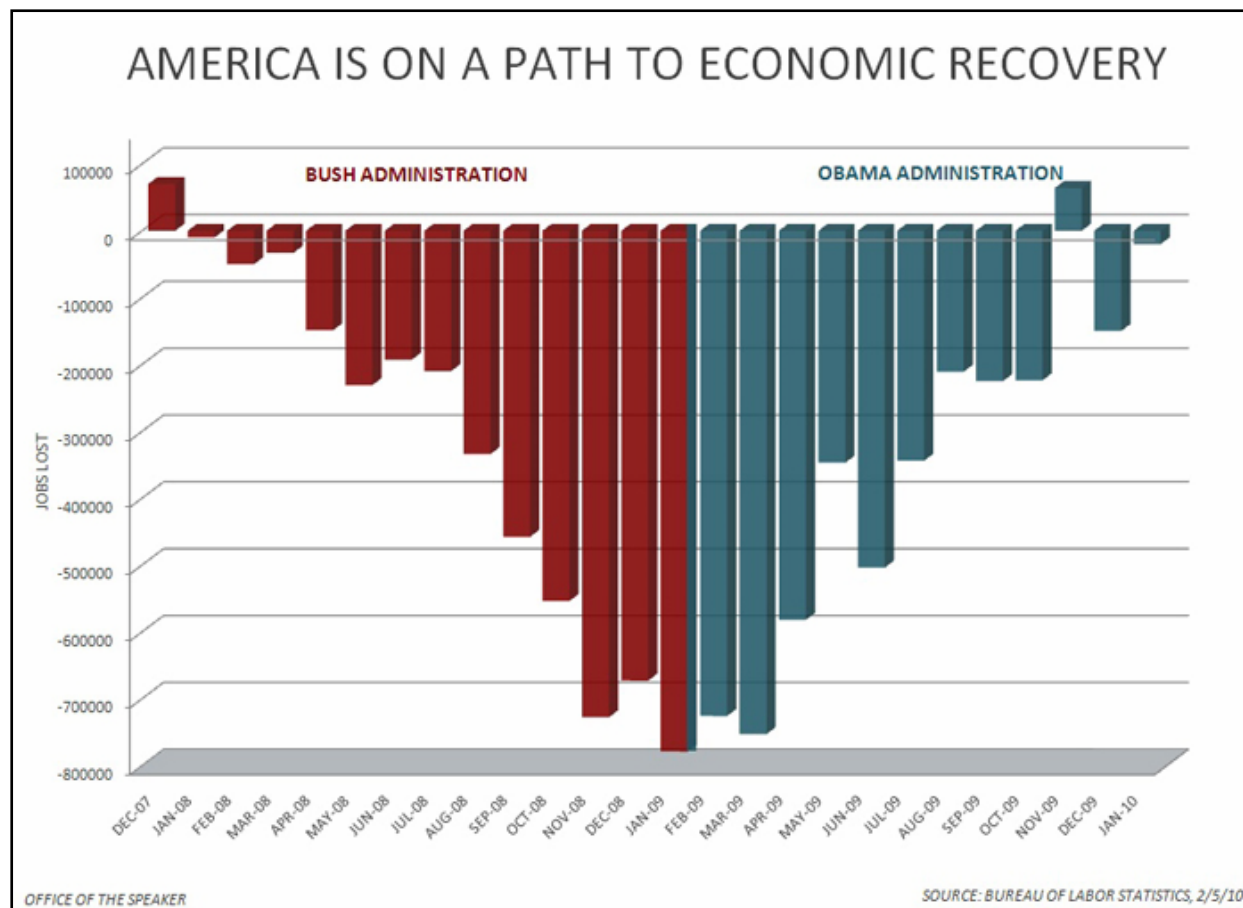

ARRA Objectives

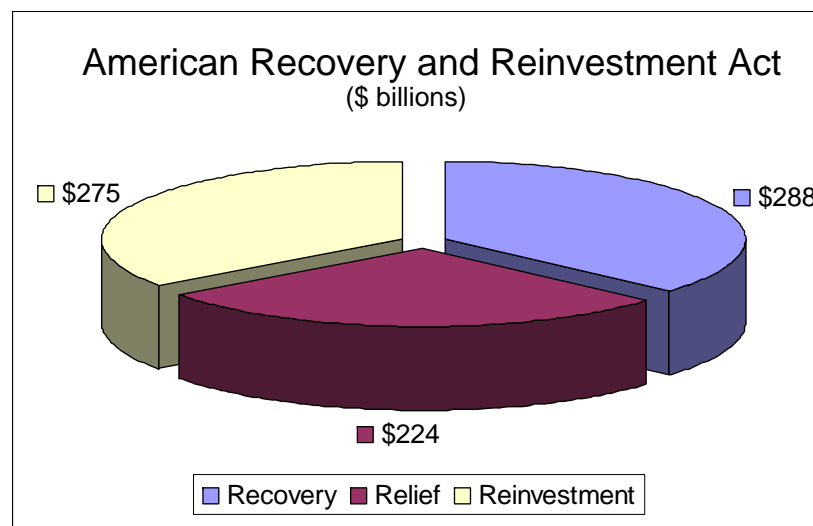
- Recovery
 - Create or retain millions of jobs across the nation
- Relief
 - Assist those most struggling in the recession
 - Stabilize state and local budgets, minimize cuts to essential services, and avoid increases in taxes
- Reinvestment
 - Fund science and health technology, transportation and infrastructure, education and environmental protection
- Responsibility
 - Report on quarterly basis
 - Provide full transparency



Breakdown of ARRA Funds

- The Act originally included \$787 billion in funding, split into the following three categories:

1. Recovery: \$288B
 - Tax cuts and tax incentives
2. Relief: \$224B
 - Direct aid and Fiscal relief
3. Reinvestment: \$275B
 - Investments to spur economic activity and long-term growth





ARRA Compliance and Reporting



ARRA Funding Mechanisms

- Three main ways New York City receives ARRA funds:
 1. Federal formula allocations
 2. Competitive grants
 3. State discretionary awards



ARRA Reporting Obligation

- Recipients of ARRA funds must file quarterly reports for each award
 - Obligations spelled out in the Act
 - Guidance memos provide instruction on how to implement the law



ARRA Recipients

- City reports on ARRA funds in two ways:
 1. Prime recipients
 2. Sub-recipients



ARRA Reporting Deadlines

- Reports are due ten days after the close of each calendar quarter
 - Prime recipients submit reports directly to the federal government
 - Sub-recipients submit reports to the state agency overseeing their award, which then submits reports to the federal government

Required Data Elements

- Key data points include:
 - Total funds spent
 - Number and description of jobs created/retained
 - ARRA funds received/invoiced
 - Vendor information



Mayor's Office of Operations

- Mayor's Office of Operations manages oversight of quality control
- Agencies reporting on awards must submit documentation
 - Supporting job calculations
 - Data breakdown of all projects and programs

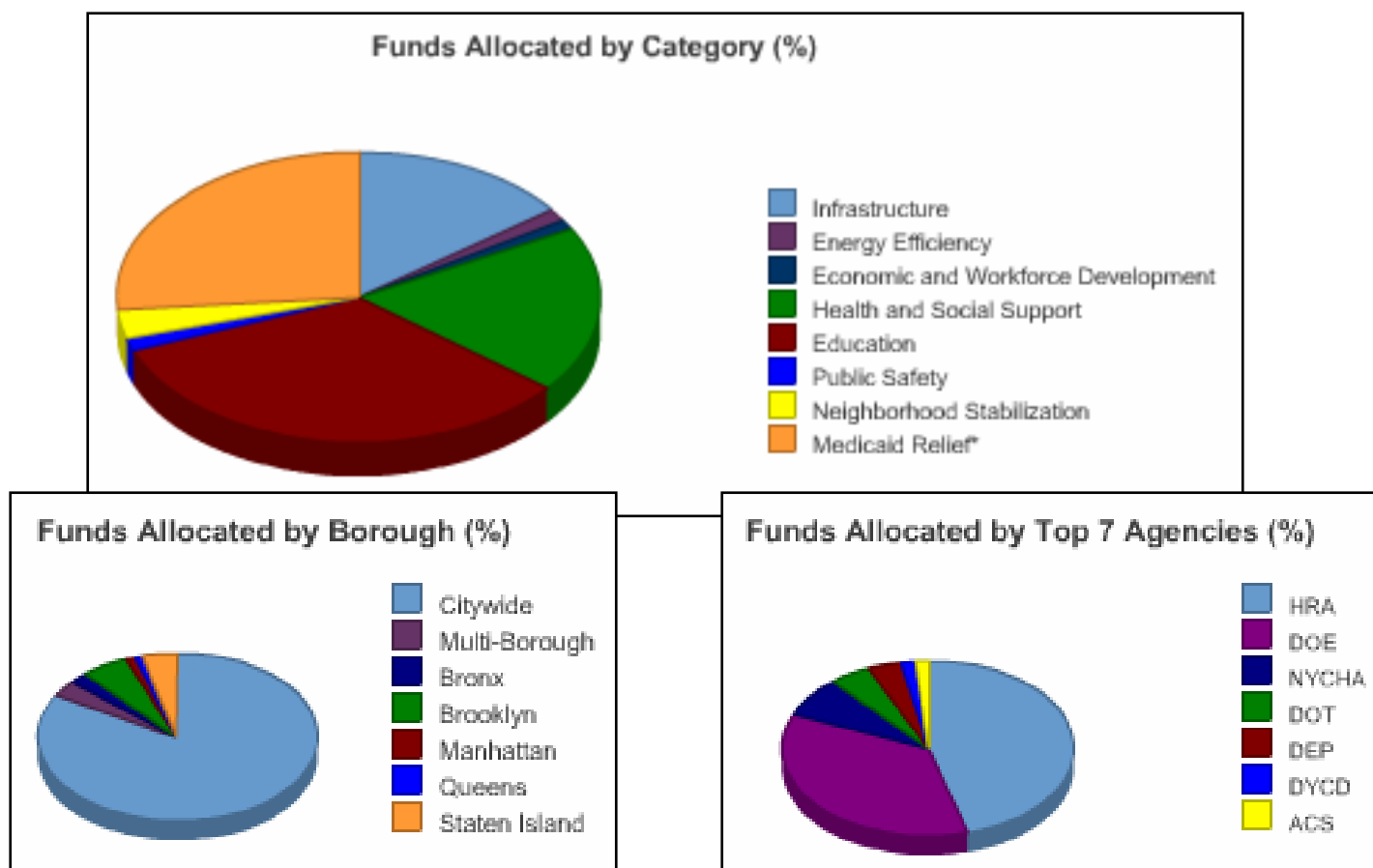

 - Total number of jobs that have been created or retained with ARRA funds per quarter
- Funding Summary Page - Category Table
 - Number of jobs by funding category, subcategory, and even projects and programs within subcategories



Project Dashboards

- Dashboard pages for each project and program highlight the following:
 - Project and program status
 - Percent of funds spent
 - Start date and spending deadlines
 - Jobs created or retained
 - Payment information
 - Contracting information





Other Stimulus Tracker Features

- ARRA project map
- Current news, events and announcements
- Pending funding requests
- Reports on projects, contracts and competitive grant applications
- “Sign up for News” feature to enable users to receive regular e-mail updates



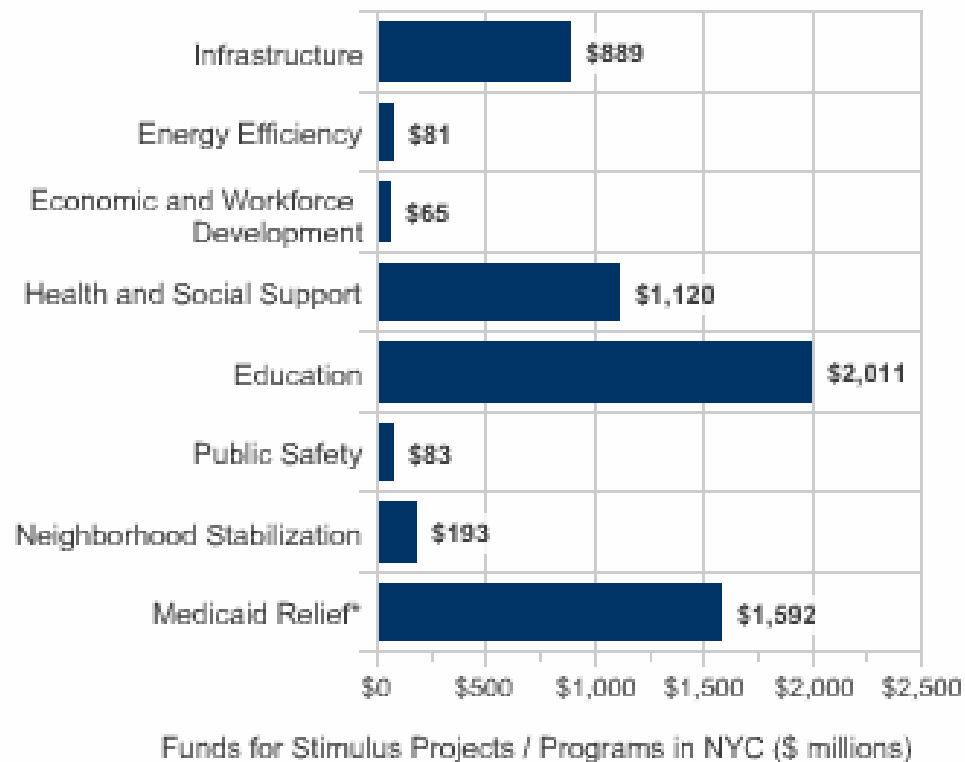
ARRA Awards as of December 31, 2009
