Mr. O'Brien announced there were Department of City Planning ULURP applications, the 2017 Capital and Expense Budget Priorities and election of Community Board 2 Executive Officers, each of which are significant.

Mr. Bokser provided the following update:

- November 8, 2015 Sunnyside Artists Craft and Fine Arts Fair at Queen of Angels, from 10am to 5 pm.

Michele Bowles , Variety Boys and Girls Club

Ms. Bowles provided an update on the following:

- The 6th Annual Dancing with the Community Stars will take place on November 7, 2015 at the Variety Boys and Girls Club in 21-12 30th Road, LIC, NY. Ms. Bowles announced there are six participants including Jason Banrey, who would be participating. Tickets are \$65.00 per person and all of the money goes to the Boys and Girls Club.

Barry Druss, Blissville

Mr. Druss spoke about the bike lanes on the Greenpoint Avenue Bridge where four lanes were turned into three. The traffic is horrendous which is creating hazardous conditions and is a dangerous area. Mr. Druss reported that someone was killed on Borden Avenue and the LIE. He also stated that cyclists do not stop at the red lights. Mr. Druss believes express bus lanes are needed.

Christina McKay-Vega

Ms. McKay-Vega reported on the following:

- Thanked Council Member/Majority Leader Jimmy Van Bramer for hosting the Phipps Housing proposal.
- Reported there are very few middle schools in the Sunnyside area.
- Reported that she walks her child to school from Sunnyside into LIC, which is a long distance through dangerous streets.
- Reported chronic illegal dumping issue on 43rd Street toward 42nd Place on the eastern border of the Sunnyside Yards. There are no street sweeping regulations and many homeless individuals live in this area as well as in their cars.
- Ms. McKay-Vega reported she has made numerous calls with regard to this issue to no avail.

Mr. O'Brien stated that CB 2 is aware of the illegal dumping at this location and we continue to report this to DOT, DOS, etc. However, part of this location borders Community Board 1 and we will also notify them and follow up on this issue.

Zoey Waldron, Library Services Center

Ms. Waldron reported that she is a librarian at the Library Services Center on Thomson Avenue and reported the following:

- There is an abandoned property that was recently leased to an automotive company, next to the Library Services Center and they cut down all trees.
- She is a member of the Community Garden on 47th Avenue and spoke about the lack of open space and parks in the area. She urged the Board to add to the Capital Planning Budget support for the proposal for First Responders Memorial Park in this area.

Erica Blonde

Ms. Blonde spoke about speeding and drag racing on the corner of 48th Avenue and 5th Street. She reported this is creating dangerous conditions.

Phillip Robinson

Mr. Robinson spoke about Renewable Energy Initiative and explained the available opportunities about this program.

Jose Pelaez, MD

Dr. Pelaez reported and provided petitions from members of the Woodside community concerning a problem with prostitution activity on 41st Avenue between 68th Street and 69th Street.

Mr. O'Brien reported there was an establishment on 69th Street that we were able to close and keep from reopening. The activity subsided around the eastern portion of Roosevelt and 41st Avenues. In the last several months, they have reopened and there has been an increase in the activity. It is occurring as far down as 52nd Street. The 108th Police Precinct is aware of this and it is high on their radar.

Noah Kaufman, Chair and founding Director Long Island City Roots, Inc.

Mr. Kaufman spoke about the following:

- His organization has been dedicated to the greening of the community in the vicinity of the Dutch Kills Canal on 47th Avenue.
- They maintain a memorial to late Firefighter Michael Brennan of Sunnyside, who served with honor and died on September 11, 2001.
- He is also dedicated to the proposition that there be more clean and safe parks in Western Queens.
- Attended the Land Use Committee meeting and since early 2015 has proposed that state owned property known as 29th Street should be turned into a public park for the community which would provide open space and water front access to Dutch Kills.
- Have been waiting for their proposal to be acknowledged and are requesting this be placed as a capital request.

Harvey Simon

Mr. Simon spoke about the following:

- Public water fountain at John Vincent Daniels Park continues to be out of service.
- Attended the Phipps Town Hall Meeting and recommended suggestions for the parking lot, such as a skateboard park, sitting park and a dog run.

Mr. O'Brien reported that CB2 has reported the complaints concerning the water fountain to the Parks Department.

Consumer Affairs Application

- This is a renewal application for an **unenclosed** sidewalk café with 5 tables and 20 seats at First Dacia Corporation / DBA Romanian Garden, located at 43-06 43rd Avenue, Sunnyside.

The owner was present and spoke about his establishment and stated he did not have any complaints or problems and has been at the location for five years.

Mr. O'Brien stated there have not been complaints or problems at the establishment and he thanked the applicant for attending.

Mr. O'Brien welcomed Penny Lee and the team from the Department of City Planning. He announced that the presentation on the ULURP Application for Zoning Quality and Affordability Text Amendment ZQA (N160049ZRY).

This application is intended to encourage better buildings and accommodate the affordable housing needs for NY City residents of mixed income levels.

The ULURP Application for Mandatory Inclusionary Housing MIH (N160051ZRY) is intended to encourage better buildings and accommodate the affordable housing needs for NY City residents of mixed income levels.

City Planning

Penny Lee provided the following update:

Ms. Lee thanked everyone for the opportunity for the Department of City Planning to present the two applications. She announced that this matter was presented at the Land Use Committee last month and also at a well-attended Town Hall meeting held at IS 404 on October 28, 2015.

Ms. Lee stated this is a comprehensive plan to build and preserve 200,000 units of affordable housing over the next 10 years.

She provided a condensed presentation on the following ULURP Applications, a copy of which is attached:

Ms. Orlando spoke about the following concerns:

A motion was made and seconded to make the change. The vote was 20 in favor; 4 opposed ; 0 Abstentions . The motion carried to switch number 4 with number 3.

Mr. O'Brien provided information about the process of the Capital and Expense Budget Priorities Process and that these are based on budget committee recommendations. Ms. Deller stated that each year, we solicit recommendations from the community.

Santiago Vargas made a motion and it was seconded to approve the top 10 Capital Budget Priorities.

All were in favor by a show of hands with 0 opposed and 0 abstentions.

Mr. O'Brien announced that #11 and #13 were new requests.

Santiago Vargas made a motion and it was seconded to approve Numbers 11-20 Capital Budget Priorities.

All were in favor by a show of hands with 0 opposed and 0 abstentions.

Board Member Dana Frankel requested the word Ice be added to Number 29.

Lisa Deller made a motion and it was seconded to approve Numbers 21 to 30 Capital Budget Priorities with the amendment to add the word Ice to Number 29.

All were in favor by a show of hands with 0 opposed and 0 abstentions.

Santiago Vargas made a motion and it was seconded by Stephen Cooper to approve Numbers 31 through 40 Capital Budget Priorities.

All were in favor by a show of hands with 0 opposed and 0 abstentions.

Expense Budget Priorities

Santiago Vargas made a motion and it was seconded by Lisa Deller to approve the top 10 Expense Budget Priorities.

All were in favor by a show of hands with 0 opposed and 0 abstentions.

A recommendation was made to change #14 with #11.

Santiago Vargas made a motion and it was seconded to approve 11 through 26 Expense Budget Priorities with the change from #14 to #11.

All were in favor by a show of hands with 0 opposed and 0 abstentions.

A copy of the Fiscal Year 2017 Community Board 2 Capital and Expense Budget Priorities are attached.

- Thanked all the Veterans for their service.
- Former Chairman Joseph Conley is being honored by Sunnyside Community Services on November 10th at M. Wells Steakhouse.
- Fourth annual Taste of Woodside event will take place on November 12th from 6pm—9pm at the Gulshan Terrace located at 59-15 37th Avenue.
- Annual LIC Partnership trade show on November 13th, 2015 at Astoria World Manor.

- Chairman finalized committee assignments.
- Denise Keehan-Smith attended a meeting regarding citywide ferry service.
- Announced that he and Debbie Markell Kleinert attended a FOIL (Freedom of Information) meeting at the Queens Borough President's Office.
- CB2 and Council Member/Majority Leader Jimmy Van Bramer hosted a town hall with Phipps on October 26, 2015 regarding a proposed development on Barnett Avenue.
- Announced that he and Lisa Deller visited the artist's studio to look at the final reiteration of the sunbather sculpture. Installation will be completed in late spring early summer 2016.
- Parks will be doing work on Noonan Playground and the scope of the project includes the reconstruction of the handball and basketball courts, new backboards and sports coating. The work was scheduled to begin at the end of October and is scheduled to be completed within 3 months.

Mr. O'Brien reported there is a lot of construction in the area, violations have been issued. CB 2 has been in touch with the Department of Buildings concerning these complaints.

- 63-14 Queens Blvd /45-06 64th Street

Mr. O'Brien reported the information from the Department of Buildings is as follows:

There was an inspection of the property on October, 28, 2015. The work that is going on is permitted under Alteration Type 2 #420867707 and is in compliance with the plans. As far as Occupancy, Alteration Type 1 #420840870, which would convert the use from an Ambulatory Diagnostic Office to a dormitory, has not been approved. As long as the applicant meets all of the requirements for a Dormitory, the use is "As of Right." At this time, all of the complaints about the use are irrelevant because they are still in the construction phase of the project and there is no one occupying the property. As long as they are not occupying the area altered under job #420867707. Before obtaining a new certificate of Occupancy, DOB cannot issue any violation at this time. Community Board 2 will continue to follow up on this issue.

Penny Lee provided the following report:

- DCP has an application filed for a Chair Certification for a greenhouse on the roof of the Falchi building. This does not get referred to the Community Board as it will be dealt

with internally, however, Ms. Lee will bring it up to the November Land Use Committee Meeting.

Committee Reports

City Services & Public Safety Committee

Mr. O'Brien provided an update about Show Palace on 21st Street. He reported they are back on the SLA's agenda. There is a new applicant who was supposed to be at a hearing on Tuesday; however, SLA postponed the hearing. Captain Travaglia and Mr. O'Brien plan to attend the hearing and testify. Mr. O'Brien stated all of the elected officials and LIC Partnership have written strong letters of opposition.

The next City Services & Public Safety Committee Meeting will be on Tuesday, November 17th, 2015.

Land Use Committee

Ms. Deller reported the Land Use Committee made a recommendation to approve the renewal the application for the unenclosed sidewalk café for First Dacia Corporation.

- This is a Consumer Affairs application for the renewal of an unenclosed sidewalk café with 5 tables and 20 seats at First Dacia Corporation / DBA Romanian Garden, located at 43-06 43rd Avenue, Sunnyside.

Ellen Kang made a motion and it was seconded to not oppose the application. All were in favor by a show of hands with 0 opposed and 0 abstentions with the Chairman of Community Board 2 present and voting.

ULURP Application for the Zoning Quality and Affordability Text Amendment (N160049ZRY).
ULURP Application for the Mandatory Inclusionary Housing (N160051ZRY).

Mr. O'Brien reported on the following:

- This is a review and a vote or some action with respect to what the DCP worked so hard on.
- Introduced Alexis Wheeler, Department of City Planning liaison.
- Everyone is aware of the push from the administration to address the affordable housing crisis in the City of New York and the brave exertion of effort and expedience they are acting on to do it.
- This proposal has come down as a result of this at speeds that not a lot of City actions do.

- Mr. O'Brien thanked Penny Lee, John Young and the team at the Department of City Planning who worked very long and very hard to put together the text amendment on this citywide situation.
- There have been discussions among the executive board.
- This was presented at the Land Use Committee Meeting.
- Mr. O'Brien reported that the senior housing component is something that we favor and the elimination of the parking component is something that is problematic.
- Ms. Deller spoke about the lack of transportation which is a matter of concern for our Community Board as it relates to transportation for seniors.
- Mr. O'Brien stated the addition of up to 20 feet above was a problem.
- The provision that deals with the ability to develop irregularly shaped lots was also an issue.
- Mr. O'Brien also spoke about the hardship exemption.
- Mr. O'Brien spoke about the need for infrastructure, schools, transportation, medical facilities and open space.
- While there are components that are good, the overall was problematic unless we can get these things addressed.
- The MIH is a great tool to develop affordable housing but we found problems.
- Overburdened infrastructures with no plan to address this.
- How much more can we bear, unless we get certain things addressed?

Ms. Deller reported that the MIH had the following issues:

- Discussed the BSA Hardship exemption.
- 11- 25 units, you can deposit into a fund which was an insufficient description
- Affordable housing within the building off site and in a separate building, people wanted to see affordable housing dispersed evenly and equitably.
- MIH were researched to have certain return to all of the developers. Minimum return guaranteed to them.
- The proposal is to help developers to build more housing. Projection is 600,000 more people by 2040. It does not address the affordability issue and the level of affordability in our community that is needed.
- Did not see anything about preferences. Want preferences for people in our community board.
- Zoning will trigger this activation.
- The City set aside a billion dollar fund for infrastructure fund which is not enough to address all of the infrastructure needs.
- This Community Board has been huge advocate for affordable housing.

Mr. O'Brien stated our job is to advocate for Community Board 2 and the recommendation that came out of the discussions was to oppose unless each of these items could be modified in the text and that we have the assurances that these things could be addressed.

A discussion followed.

A motion made and seconded, at the regularly held monthly meeting of CB2 held on November 5, 2015, at which a quorum was present. The vote on the motion to oppose ZQA was 28 in favor of the motion, 2 opposed to the motion, and 3 abstaining. The vote on the motion to oppose MIH was 28 in favor of the motion, 1 opposed to the motion, and 4 abstaining.

Transportation Committee Report

Denise Keehan-Smith provided the following update:

- **Queens Boulevard Project**
CB 2 concerns to DOT about the challenges facing local residents as a result of the project. There is continued frustration over congestion on the Boulevard, particularly eastbound on 63rd and 64th Streets as well as westbound near 65th Place and the BQE exit ramp. Ms. Keehan-Smith met with Samantha Dolgoff and with the Deputy Commissioner and the Engineering team to highlight the issues and asked for recommendations on how to improve the traffic flow.
- **LaGuardia Community College**
CB 2 is working with the DOT and the College to identify safety concerns and discuss possible solutions. Another meeting is scheduled for next week and will provide updates on the progress.
- **Ferry Advocates Meeting**
The Waterfront Alliance hosted a Ferry Advocates meeting on October 28, 2015 in lower Manhattan. Topics included an overview of city wide ferry service, creating an advisory committee to represent communities and how best to promote ridership.
- **NY Community Aviation Roundtable**
Creation of a roundtable for LGA and JFK is underway to consider community concerns about aviation related public health and environmental issues. It is sponsored by the NYPA and will provide a forum for residents to voice their concerns and work with the appropriate agencies to make improvements.
- **Kosciuszko Bridge Project**
The next meeting is November 12, 2015
- **MTA Bus Company**
The MTA be adding two temporary stops in each direction along the detoured Q47 travel path in Maspeth to better serve customers who have been inconvenienced by this bus routes necessary and unavoidable rerouting.
The new temporary Q47 bus stops will be added at the following locations:
to Jackson Heights:
Northbound Q47 to Jackson Heights
Grand Avenue to 723rd Street
69th Street to 52nd Drive
Southbound Q47 to Glendale:
69th Street at 53rd Avenue
Grand Avenue at 73rd Street

- DOT installed safety markings on 68th Street between Garfield Avenue and Maurice Avenue.
- The next meeting of the Transportation Committee Meeting was scheduled for November 10th, but will be rescheduled due to conflicts.

Environment Committee

Dorothy Morehead provided the following update:

Ms. Morehead reported that Mitch Waxman, historian for Newtown Creek Alliance provided a presentation on the Montauk Cutoff. The location is a rail line that goes from Skillman Avenue between Pearson to Borden Avenue. It does not have waterfront access and the rail is above grade.

Smiling Hogs Head Ranch does a community garden on a portion of the area. There will be a visioning session and anyone who is interested in doing something there should attend the meeting. The area is very narrow and long, there are two railroad tracks. The MTA will keep their property on Newtown Creek but do not intend to use those tracks again.

Ms. Morehead announced that the Environment Committee voted to keep the area as open space. There will be a vote on this matter in January.

Health and Human Services Committee

Dr. Moitre Savard announced the following:

- The next Health and Human Services Committee meeting will take place on November 16, 2015 at 5:30 pm. ACQC, Needle Exchange Program representative will be attending the meeting to provide an update on services.
- Dr. Savard invited anyone with any ideas to contact her. She reported that some ideas are as follows:
 - Medical Facilities
 - Rodent Abatement
 - Veterans Affairs.

Mr. O'Brien thanked Stephen Cooper for his service of over 30 years on the Executive Board. He also thanked everyone for their patience and announced the next Community Board meeting will be Thursday, December 3, 2015.
