The Borough President of Richmond and the Department of Parks announce the award of contracts, in the amount of \$2,479,487, for the second stage of construction of the South Beach improvement in Staten Island.

South Beach is a 2 1/2 mile waterfront strip between Fort Wadsworth on the north and Miller Field on the south. The northerly 1 1/2 miles was acquired by the City in 1935 and a boardwalk was built at that time. Subsequently, additional property was acquired back of boardwalk for adequate recreational facilities.

The first stage of construction which was completed in 1958 included a promenade, a new widened beach, comfort stations, bathhouse. parking field, playgrounds, picnic grounds, landscaped areas and the construction of Seaside Boulevard from Xenia Street to Miller Field.

The contracts for the second stage which extends from Slater Boulevard to Fort Wadsworth will provide for additional parking fields, extension of the promenade to the boardwalk with a connecting ramp, bathhouses for men and women, a bus shelter, playgrounds, comfort stations, new lighting system and rehabilitation of the existing boardwalk, a softball field, a new flagpole, beach and umbrella concession building and a food concession building. Work in connection with these second stage contracts will start this week.

Contracts for the third and final stage are expected to be let next year.

South Beach, along with other great Richmond projects, will become more readily accessible to the entire City of New York upon completion of the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge and the current arterial program for the City.

The Department of Parks makes this further announcement regarding the new outdoor artifical ice skating rink to be constructed in Prospect Park, Brooklyn. The rink will be similar in size and its related facilities to the Wollman Memorial Rink in Central Park, Manhattan, which has been one of the most popular and intensively used features of the City's park system since it was first opened in 1950.

The Prospect Park rink is being made possible by a generous grant of \$300,000 from the William J. Wollman Foundation. The remaining \$500,000 needed to meet the estimated cost of construction amounting to a total of \$800,000 will be contributed by the City as an item in the Park Department's 1960 Capital Budget.

The Board of Estimate's approval of the project was made on Oct. 22, 1959, and the Architect and Engineer's service contract was submitted to the Budget Director on Dec. 1, 1959. The plans and specifications will be completed by July 1, 1960. Bids will be taken after the Board of Estimate approves the contract plans and specifications and appropriates the City's share of the cost. We expect construction to start in the fall of 1960 and the project completed in time for the fall skating season of 1961.

The new Wollman Rink will be located on the north shore of Prospect Park Lake on axis with the formal garden near the Lincoln

Road entrance in the southeast corner of the park. It will be within easy walking distance of the music grove, zoo, boathouse, merry-go-round and other popular recreational facilities, bus lines, and subway stations.

The rink will provide an oval skating surface of 28,000 square feet bordered by a promenade for skaters. On the east side of the rink the skaters' building will house dressing and checking facilities, skate rental counters, boiler room, and refrigeration equipment, comfort station and a food concession. Between the skaters' building and the park's East Drive, a 430 car parking area will be available for patrons of the rink.

The Wollman Rink in Prospect Park will fill Brooklyn's urgent need for easily accessible and dependable facilities for ice skating since the mild winters of recent years have greatly reduced the opportunities for skating on natural ice in New York. The rink will also provide suitable space for roller skating, dancing and outdoor entertainments during the warm weather months and will thus be of recreational value throughout the year.

The Department of Parks is grateful to the William J. Wellman Foundation for the public-spirited action and generous gift which will help so materially to make this long-desired project a reality.

The Department of Parks announces that twenty-six Christmas Trees located throughout the city will be lighted on Tuesday, December 15th at 5:00 p.m. Tree lighting ceremonies will be held at City Hall, Manhattan; Borough Hall, Brooklyn; Joyce Kilmer Park, Bronx; Queens Borough Hall, and Richmond Borough Hall.

The City Hall ceremonies in Manhattan will be broadcast.

Mayor Wagner will deliver his annual Christmas message, and a switch will be thrown lighting the sixty-frot high tree, officially beginning New York's observance of the Yuletide Season. Honorable Hulan E. Jack, Borough President of Manhattan, will also speak at the Manhattan ceremony. Christmas music will be played by the Department of Sanitation Band. The Equitable Life Assurance Society Choral Club will sing Christmas carols and a school choir from Our Lady of Lourdes Roman Catholic Church, Manhattan, in red cassocks and frocks will sing Christmas carols.

The switch, lighting the tree, will also light a green wreath, eighteen feet in diameter decorated with white ruscus and holly, over the main entrance of the Park Department Headquarters at the Arsenal, 64th Street and Fifth Avenue, Central Park, Manhattan. In the center of the wreath is a six foot illuminated cross on a field of sky blue with twinkling stars.

The course consists of practical and theoretical instruction in lifeguard procedure and practice. Staff members of the Park Department will act as instructors.

Applicants must be male citizens of the United States who are residents of New York City for three years and who will have reached their 17th birthday on the day of appointment and can pass a non-competitive swimming test of 50 yds. in 35 seconds, free style. The minimum height and weight requirements are 5' 7" and 135 lbs. at time of registration. Applicants must furnish a medical certificate stating that they are in good health. Candidates will not be considered eligible for appointment if they have reached their 35th birthday.

Applications will be \*\*ailable at all public, private, and parochial and Hebrew high schools, university and college placement offices; all YMCA, YMHA, and Red Cross Chapter offices; also at all borough offices of the Department of Parks. Applications will be accepted by register clerk at the East 54th Street Pool at 342 East 54th Street, Manhattan.

Sessions will begin on January 2, 1960, and enrollees will be required to attend 14 sessions (2 hours weekly) which will be held afternoons and evenings each weekday, and mornings and afternoons on Saturdays. Applicants will be given their choice of class periods.

#### PLAYING RULES

#### THREE-WALL HANDBALL

Court has a front, back and one side wall (Jai-Alai type)

All of the unified (1959) four-wall rules adopted by the A.A.U., Y.M.C.A., U.S.H.A., and J.W.B. will apply, with the following exceptions:

A served ball, or a ball in play, striking outside of the side line(s) on the first bounce from the wall, is a point or handout as the case may be.

A legally served ball, or a ball in play, striking on the side line(s) is a good ball and is in play.

In playing a ball which has struck within the playing area, a player may go outside the side line in returning the ball.

The "hinder" rules of four-wall handball will apply. Players are entitled to a fair and unobstructed chance to play the ball. It is the duty of the player or side having last played the ball to get out of the way of the opponents.

In all matches, the player first winning the serve may choose the "front" wall for the first game. The next game the opposite wall will be the "front" wall. If a third game is necessary, the front wall will be the same as in the first game. Changing the "front" wall for each game will balance any advantage a player might have in possessing a strong right or left hand.

A ball hitting the wire mesh on top of any wall, or going over the mesh, is a point or handout, as the case may be.

A ball striking the top edge of any wall is a handout or point.

REFEREE shall take a position outside the side line, about halfway between the front and back walls where he shall have a full view of the game at all times. He will call all shorts, foot faults, hinders, etc. He will be assisted by a line sman who shall take a position in back of and outside the side line, and who shall call all balls that strike outside the side line.

IN DOUBLES: The server's partner may stand in the Service Box, as required in four-wall rules, or he may stand outside the side line in the area between the service and short lines. He may not enter the court until the served ball passes the short line, A violation of this rule is a fault.

Any player standing outside of the court who is struck by, catches, or stops any fly ball rebounding from the wall is penalized a point or handout, as the case may be.

The Department of Parks announces that Mayor Wagner has signed a local law which was passed by the City Council giving the name "Damrosch Park" to a 2.34-acre park area in the Lincoln Square project in Manhattan. A map laying out the park was approved by the Board of Estimate on May 14, 1959.

Damrosch Park will be bounded by the new Metropolitan Opera House, the new Theatre of the Dance. Amsterdam Avenue and West 62nd Street across which a new Fordham University campus will be developed. The park is being designed by the firm of Eggers & Higgins, Architects, as a landscaped setting for outdoor concerts, theatricals and other performances. It will include the Daniel and Florence Guggenheim Memorial Bandshell in front of which a paved area will provide seating space for approximately 4,500 persons.

An outstanding feature of Damrosch Park will be a memorial flagpole set in a granite base which will bear a bronze tablet executed by Paul Manship. The tablet will form a tribute to five outstanding members of the Damrosch family in whose memory the park is to be named and will be the gift of many friends of music.

Since 1871, the Damrosch family has exerted an

influence on the musical life of New York City and of the nation in general, which is probably unequaled by any other family of musicians in the history of this country. The tablet will memorialize Leopold Damrosch, his sons Frank Damrosch and Walter Damrosch, his daughter, Clara Damrosch Mannes and her husband, David Mannes who died on April 24, 1959, at the age of ninety-three.

Their biographies in brief are as follows:

LEOPOID DAMROSCH (1832-1885). Conductor of the

Breslau (Germany) Philharmonic Orchestra for 13 years, he brought
his family in 1871 to New York where he became conductor of the
Arion Society, organized the New York Oratorio Society in 1873,
and the New York Symphony Society in 1878, and conducted the
principal Wagnerian operas at the Metropolitan Opera House from
1884 until his death in 1885. His daughter Elizabeth, Mrs. Henry
T. Seymour, is still living in New York.

FRANK HEINO DAMROSCH (1859-1937). Chorus master of the Metropolitan Opera House from 1885 to 1891, he later became a conductor of the People's Choral Union and Singing Classes, the Musical Art Society of New York, the Orpheus Club of Philadelphia, the Mendelssohn Glee Club of New York and the Symphony Concerts for Young People. Frank Damrosch married Hetty Mosenthal. Their son is the Rev. Frank Damrosch and their daughter Helen is Mrs. John Tee-Van.

WALTER JOHANNES DAMROSCH (1862-1950). As assistant director of German opera at the Metropolitan Opera House, he

presented the first American performance of Parsifal in 1896. He served as assistant director of the New York Oratorio and Symphony Societies, director for 24 years of the New York Symphony Orchestra, musical counsel to the National Broadcasting Company, and founder and conductor of orchestral radio concerts for schools and colleges. His own musical compositions included two operas and a number of orchestral and choral pieces. Walter Damrosch married Margaret Blaine, a daughter of James G. Blaine. Their daughters are: Alice, Mrs. Herman S. Kiaer; Gretchen, Mrs. Thomas K. Finletter; Leopoldina, Mrs. Sidney Howard; and Anita, Mrs. Robert Littell.

CLARA DAMROSCH MANNES (1869-1948). A talented concert planist, she married David Mannes, the violinist, in 1898. Together they appeared in recitals and taught music to promising but impoverished pupils on the lower East Side. In 1916 they founded David Mannes School of Music, later called the Mannes Music College, of which their son Leopold Damrosch Mannes is now president. Their daughter Marya is Mrs. Christopher Clarkson.

DAVID MANNES (1866-1959). A native New Yorker, his talent as a violinist was noticed by Walter Damrosch who in 1891 secured him as first violinist of the New York Symphony Orchestra where he later served as concertmaster until 1912. Like Walter Damrosch he was an intense believer in musical education for the public and conducted free concerts in the great hall of the Metropolitan Museum from 1918 to 1947. In addition to founding the Mannes College of Music he organized the Music School Settlement for Colored People in 1912 and became a trustee of Fisk University with a special concern for its music department.

#### GEORGE M. COHAN MEMORIAL

Located at the south end of Duffy Square, between West 46 and West 47 Streets, and immediately south of the Father Duffy statue, the memorial is a gift to the City of New York from the friends and associates of George M. Cohan and consists of a bronze statue eight feet high set on a Quincy granite base bearing the titles of songs he wrote and made famous. It was designed and executed by Georg Lober, noted American sculptor whose other works include the Hans Christian Andersen Memorial in Central Park.

In June of 1956, the George M. Cohan Memorial Committee was formed with Irving Berlin, Father George B. Ford, Robert Moses, the late Herbert Bayard Swope and Oscar Hammerstein II, acting as the executive committee.

George M. Cohan, actor, dramatic author, composer and manager, was born in Providence, Rhode Island, on July 4, 1878, the son of Jeremiah John and Helen Costigan Cohan.

His first New York appearance was on February 25, 1901, at the Savoy Theatre as Algy Wheelock in "The Governor's Son." In the first three decades of this century, George M. Cohan created many unforgettable stage characters.

In addition to his own singing, dancing and acting. George M. Cohan wrote the lyrics and music for many well-known songs and was the author of such memorable plays as

Get-Rich-Quick-Wallingford 45 Minutes From Broadway Seven Keys to Baldpate The Miracle Man Broadway Jones The Song and Dance Man

In all of these, Mr. Cohan took leading roles. With Sam H. Harris, he produced over fifty plays. On June 29, 1936, by Act of Congress, he was awarded a gold medal for his World War I songs, which contributed so much to the morale of our armed forces and civilian population. When he died in 1942, George M. Cohan left a legacy of popular sentimental and patriotic songs many of which will long be favorites of the people of America.

The Department of Parks and the George M. Cohan Memorial Committee announce the dedication on September 11, 1959, at 11:30 P.M., of the George M. Cohan Memorial in the Times Square section of Manhattan.

Located at the south end of Duffy Square, between West 46 and West 47 Streets, and immediately south of the Father Duffy statue, the memorial is a gift to the City of New York from the friends and associates of George M. Cohan and consists of a bronze statue eight feet high set on a Quincy granite base bearing the titles of songs he wrote and made famous. It was designed and executed by Georg Lober, noted American sculptor whose other works include the Hans Christian Andersen Memorial in Central Park.

In June of 1956, the George M. Cohan Memorial Committee was formed with Irving Berlin. Father George B. Ford, Robert Moses, the late Herbert Bayard Swope and Oscar Hammerstein II, acting as the executive committee.

George M. Cohan, actor, dramatic author, composer and manager, was born in Providence, Rhode Island, on July 4, 1878, the son of Jeremiah John and Helen Costigan Cohan.

His first New York appearance was on February 25, 1901,

at the Savoy Theatre as Algy Wheelock in "The Governor's Son." In the first three decades of this century, George M. Cohan created many unforgettable stage characters some of which are

Mr. Wallingford in "Get-Rich-Quick-Wallingford" 1911

Kid Burns in "Forty-five Minutes from Broadway" 1912

Jackson Jones in "Broadway Jones" 1912

Magee in "Seven Keys to Baldpate" 1913

Patriarch in "The Miracle Man" 1914

Nat Miller in "Ah Wilderness" 1933

In addition to his own singing, dancing and acting, George M. Cohan wrote the lyrics and music for many well-known songs and was the author of such memorable plays as the following:

The Governor's Son
Running for Office
Little Johnny Jones
George Washington, Jr.
The Yankee Prince
Get-Rich-Quick-Wallingford
The Little Millionaire
45 Minutes from Broadway
Seven Keys to Baldpate
The Miracle Man
Broadway Jones
The Song and Dance Man

In all of these, Mr. Cohan took leading roles. With Sam H. Harris, he produced over fifty plays. On June 29, 1936, by Act of Congress,

he was awarded a gold medal for his World War I songs, which contributed so much to the morale of our armed forces and civilian population. When he died in 1942, George M. Cohan left a legacy of popular sentimental and patriotic songs many of which will long be favorites of the people of America.

The dedication ceremony will be held just after the theatre break.



Jazz compositions from over 25 countries will be presented by an all star 18 piece band conducted by Clarinetist Owen Engel, founder of the Festival. The Festival Orchestra will include Gigi Gryce, Sal Salvador, and Don Elliot, and the following foreign jazzmen will participate: Putte Wickman of Sweden, Mat Mathews of Holland, Alphonse Simon of Haiti, Francis Nyarce Cann of Ghana, Babatunde Olatunji of Nigeria, B. Koshe of India, Frits Willem Kapojos of Indonesia, Bobby Jaspar of Belgium and Brenden Ward of Ireland.

Made possible by Local 802 and the Music Performance Trust Funds of the Recording Industries, the Festival is presented in the interest of promoting intercultural understanding. An introductory address will be delivered by Hon. Emile Jossis Lapian, Minister of Indonesia to the United Nations.





The Department of Parks announces that through the cooperation of the State Department of Public Works, it will soon be able to complete the filling and grading in Kissena Corridor and Kissena Park in Queens with surplus excavated material from the Clearview Expressway. A section of Alley Park, Queens, will also be filled and graded with this material.

Prior to the start of the filling operation in Kissena Park, it will be necessary to install storm water drains. Bids for the drainage work were taken on May 18, 1959 by the Department of Parks. The low bid is \$31,650 and work is expected to get under way by next month. The present Public Works contract will provide sufficient earth fill to bring Kissena Corridor and Park to final planned grades. This will eliminate the existing drainage ditch through Kissena Park and Corridor which has long been of concern to the people in the community.

By careful planning, the placing of the fill without cost will result in a saving to the City of New York of approximately \$1,000,000 and provide a basis for the further development of the park. Since 1953, five playgrounds have been completed along the perimeter of the undeveloped sections of Kissena Corridor and Park at a cost of \$909,700. One additional playground and ballfield at Elder Avenue and Colden Street, and two

softball fields added to the development of the area at Underhill Avenue east of 188th Street, are scheduled for construction this year at an estimated cost of \$493,000. Funds are being included in our 1960 Capital Budget Request to complete the development of the park area between Utopia Parkway and Long Island Expressway.

This new .88 acre playground and .57 acre running track provide facilities for all age groups. The play area provides game tables, basketball and shuffleboard courts, sand pit, swings, seesaws, slides, an outdoor shower for children, and a comfort station.

The area encompassed by the running track also contains areas for shot put, high jump and pole vault, on the inner rim, and a football and soccer field in the center.

With the addition of this facility there are now 757 playgrounds in the park system.

From May 30 to June 28, the pools will be opened for weekends and holidays only, and from June 29, until the end of the season, they will be open daily with the following operating schedule: On Weekdays, Monday through Friday from 10:00 A.M. to 12:30 P.M., there will be a free period for children 14 years of age and under, during which hours no adults will be admitted to the pool area. participate. Instruction in life-saving and first-aid will also be included in the aquatic program.

Orchard Beach located in Pelham Bay Park, Bronx; Jacob Riis Park Beach and Rockaway Beach on the Rockaway Peninsula, Queens; Coney Island Beach and Manhattan Beach in Brooklyn; South Beach, Great Kills Park and Wolfe's Pond Park on Staten Island will open for bathers on May 23.

The Department of Parks announces that four bronze plaques bearing the translations of the Egyptian hieroglyphics on the Obelisk in Central Park have been installed around the base of the shaft and now will be freely accessible to the public.

The plaques are the generous and spontaneous gift of the late Cecil B. DeMille, the distinguished motion picture producer, who died before the plaques could be completed and installed. Inspired by a newspaper article discussing the Obelisk, Mr. DeMille offered to contribute this helpful addition to the facilities of Central Park as a token of his affection for the park and its many pleasant associations with his parents, his boyhood and his adult years.

The Obelisk is located to the west of the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the East Drive in Central Park, opposite

East 81 Street. The 3500 year old shaft with the inscriptions of three Pharachs was the gift of the Khedive of Egypt and was erected in 1881 through the generosity of the late William H. Vanderbilt.

One of the earliest of many contributions to the features and facilities in this section of the park, it has been followed by

such gifts as the Loeb and Kerbs Boat Houses, the Levy Playground, the Osborne Gates, the Hans Christian Andersen statue, and the Delacorte Memorial of Alice in Wonderland. The latest in the series, the DeMille plaques, will enable the thousands of adults and children who annually visit the Obelisk at last to know the meaning of its inscriptions.

Located at the north end of the Conservatory Pond in Central Park, opposite 75th Street and Fifth Avenue, the sculpture and its setting is a gift to the City of New York from the George and Margarita Delacorte Foundation, in memory of the late Margarita Delacorte.

Recreating the Mad Tea Party scene from Lewis Carroll's "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland", the bronze monument features the figures of Alice, the Mad Hatter, the March Hare and the Cheshire Cat. Approximately eleven feet high and sixteen feet in diameter, the sculpture is set on a circular granite platform, approached by a wide, stepped ramp designed to make it easily accessible to children.

The project was designed by Fernando Texidor, noted art director and prize-winning designer and artist. The figures of characters from "Alice in Wonderland" are the work of the distinguished sculptor, Jose de Creeft, who is represented in the permanent collections of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, and the Museum of Modern Art. The setting for the

memorial is the work of Hideo Sasaki, internationally known for his achievements in community planning and landscape architecture.

Situated on the hillside overlooking Conservatory Pond between the Hans Christian Andersen and Kerbs Memorials, the Margarita Delacorte Memorial is designed to be played on and around by children. STATEMENT BY THE PARK COMMISSIONER

The facts about Mr. Papp's enterprise are:

- l. Mr. Papp is an enthusiastic, I might amost say fanatical, very temperamental, Shakespeare producer with real talent but no conception of Park administration. He believes that because he encourages youthful talent and has had considerable public attendance and approval, it is up to the Park Commissioner and the Executive Officer of the Department to raise money for him, let him give free shows where and how he pleases at landscaped places which lack sanitary facilities, police and other protection and involve serious park damage. The area in question is not to be confused with play fields used in the day time or lawns used part time. The night police problem in Central Park is serious enough at best without inviting trouble.
- 2. We have tried patiently to explain these matters to Mr. Papp for the last three years but have made no impression on him. He simply says he is going to the press and public and beat hell out of us.
- 3. I personally tried hard to raise money for Mr. Papp but the wealthy enthusiasts simply didn't come across. Mr. Papp never

knows whether and when he can perform. He doesn't have enough to pay his performers even a pittance.

- 4. It will cost over \$100,000 to put the area presently used in safe, protected, sanitary and controllable condition. The only basis on which I can ask the City for such a sum in the present state of the budget is that we are collecting some revenue to pay back part of it and pay for upkeep. This necessitates a moderate charge for tickets. Mr. Papp offered to charge, then changed his mind and blamed it on the unions.
- 5. Mr. Papp has been offered other locations such as the Corlears theatre but has refused to consider them.
- 6. There is no reason in law why any other ambitious producer who wants to give free shows at park locations selected by him can not force us to grant a permit if Mr. Papp can get away with his demands. We can't make distinctions which the Courts don't recognize.

In Mr. Papp's philosophy the sole and overriding duty of the Park Commissioner is to brush up his Shakespeare, and all other responsibilities and considerations must yield to this categorical imperative. I have considerable respect for Mr. Papp's singleness of purpose, but can't adopt it as a principle and shall certainly not direct Mr. Constable to do so.

While the present Park administration is in charge, Mr. Papp will have to put his enterprise on a workable basis or go elsewhere.

I believe I have the Mayor's confidence. Mr. Constable has mine and must keep the system going with an inadequate budget and ever increasing attendance and control problems.

The Department of Parks announces that the Jamaica Bay Wildlife Refuge in Queens has been host for the past week to a bird which has never been known to visit continental North America.

On February 21, 1959, a member of the Linnaean Society observed and identified a European Red Wing Thrush in the West Fresh Water Impoundment of the sanctuary, feeding on the berries of rosa Multiflora plantings.

The European Red Wing Thrush is approximately 8 inches in length, with an olive green back and streaked breast, flanks of chestnut brown, pink chestnut underneath the wings, and white to cream lines above the eyes and cheeks. Native to Norway, Sweden, Finland, Russia and the northern tree line of Siberia, it breeds in these countries and winters in Southern Europe and Asia Minor.

Since the sighting of this bird many ornithologists from Boston, Pittsburgh, Buffalo and Fairfield County in Connecticut have arrived to observe this rare species.

More and more the plans and hard work for the preservation and restoration of wildlife among the islands of Jamaica Bay are bringing about the desired results.

During 1958, 10,000 visits were made to this facility and 203 different species were observed and recorded.

There is no charge for admission to the wildlife refuge, however, a permit is required.
