You will need to bring several documents to your first meeting with your Housing Recovery Specialist, including material about your identity. In order to confirm your identity, you must provide your driver's license, passport, permanent resident card, or military ID.

If you want to replace your passport, you must **fill out two forms**, and bring them to an acceptance facility.

- First, you must fill out form DS-II: Application for a U.S. Passport.
- You must also fill out form DS-6: Statement Regarding a Lost or Stolen Passport (available at http://travel.state.gov/passport/forms/ds64/ds64_845.html).
- In addition to filling out the forms, you must bring the following:
 - **Proof of US citizenship:** this should be a certified birth certificate or an expired US passport.
 - ▶ If you don't have these records, there are other options available. For more information, visit www.travel.state.gov
 - ▶ For information on replacing your birth certificate, see Document #II
 - **Proof of identity** (the original and a photocopy): this should be a document containing your signature and a photograph of you.
 - ▶ Options include expired US passport, driver's license, certificate of naturalization or citizenship, military ID, or government employee ID.

- **A passport photo:** this must be a full front view of the face and be 2x2 inches.
- **Payment:** find out the amount you must pay by visiting http://travel.state.gov/passport/fees/fees_837.html

Bring everything to an acceptance facility, not a passport agency.
