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

They ask,


“What is the play about?”

Sometimes her husband hits her.




**One day,

“Is everything okay?”**




At first, she doesn't want to talk about it.

Billy's mother talks to her sister-in-law.


Her sister-in-law helps her.

The call is free.




311 can help you find a safe place to live.
