COUNCIL MEMBER STEVENS & ADMINISTRATION FOR CHILDREN'S SERVICES HOST FOSTER PARENT RECRUITMENT 'DAY OF ACTION' ACROSS THE CITY

Council Members Across New York City Will Be Handing Out Information on How to Become a Foster Parent

(Bronx, NY) Today, New York City Council Member Althea Stevens partnered with the NYC Administration for Children's Services (ACS) to host a Foster Parent Recruitment "Day of Action" across the city. Council Member Stevens is Chair of the Committee on Children and Youth Services. Participating Council Members include Diana Ayala, Erik Bottcher, Gale Brewer, Jennifer Gutiérrez, Sandy Nurse, Lincoln Restler, Kevin Riley, Lynn Schulman and Dr. Nantasha Williams. ACS Commissioner Dannhauser, ACS Deputy Commissioner Ina Mendez, and foster care agencies from throughout the City also engaged New Yorkers about becoming a foster parent.

Currently, there are approximately 6,500 children in foster care. Foster parents provide a safe, nurturing and loving home environment for children and youth in need. Foster parents are provided with ongoing support from highly trained staff in addition to specialized training to meet the needs of children and adolescents, to partner successfully with families.

Foster families who are able to care for sibling groups, teenagers and children with special needs are most in need today. "Foster parents are everyday heroes as they play the central role in caring for children and youth who have experienced trauma, partnering with parents to help preserve bonds and promote healing and becoming permanent family when children are not able to return to their parents. "When I first opened my home as a foster parent, I thought I was doing something good for a child who needed love and stability, and I was. But I never expected how much it would change me. It made me stronger, more compassionate, and gave me a sense of chosen family. Foster parents give young people the chance to thrive, but they also discover something powerful in themselves. If sharing my story inspires even one person to take that step, I'll keep telling it. We say it takes a village but sometimes, it starts with one brave person, one brave family. My hope is that events like this help us find more of them," said Council Member Diana Ayala.

"Foster parents provide a home for the children who need it most," **said Council Member Gale A. Brewer**. "As a former foster parent, I'm especially grateful to be a part of the 2025 Foster Parent Recruitment Day of Action."
