APA works collaboratively with both provider agencies and ACS stakeholders to improve performance. Through Collaborative Quality Improvement (CoQI) APA analyzes practice and outcome data collected to identify areas of strength and areas in need of improvement with each provider agency. APA works collaboratively with provider agencies throughout the CoQI cycle to develop priorities and Improvement plans. ACS has established a new case consultation function within the Family Permanency Services Division to provide consultation, technical assistance and support to foster care agency staff on individual cases. This is a pilot program that will be implemented with 5 provider agencies. Currently 3 agencies (MercyFirst, Catholic Guardian Services, and Forestdale Inc.) have been engaged and 2 others will be selected. ACS Senior Practice Consultants (SPCs) will work directly and collaboratively with ACS' contracted foster care provider agencies to deepen and strengthen agency practice resulting in improved well-being, safety and permanency outcomes for children in foster care, reduced lengths of stay and rates of re-entry into foster care. Initially, the SPCs will focus on helping to find permanency for youth in care over 2 years.

This unit is responsible for promoting mental health best practice through technical assistance, training, case review, facilitation and support. The unit is also responsible for assessing mental health needs within the child welfare system and developing operational mechanisms, protocols and programs to address these needs, both within Children's Services and in collaboration with other governmental agencies. The unit also participates in the Office of Mental Health Pre-Admission Certification Committee (PACC) review meetings and provides technical assistance for this process. In addition, the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children's (NYSPCC's) Crisis Debrief Program is facilitated by and processed through this unit. Staff Mindfulness sessions are offered on a regular basis.

ACS funds CPPs in 11 neighborhoods: Staten Island, Elmhurst, Jamaica, East New York, Bushwick, Bedford-Stuyvesant, East Flatbush, Hunts Point, Mott Haven, Highbridge and East Harlem. Membership ranges between 30 and 60 individuals. CPP members support each other by inviting speakers and making referrals across organizations. Their primary goal is to build a strong primary prevention network and strategy that increases overall child and family well-being. The work of the CPP is led by a small core staff who are supported by Community Ambassadors. All CPPs have regular, open meetings where the community is invited to learn about resources and work collaboratively on a primary prevention priority selected by the community. For more information regarding the CPPs or to attend a local CPP meeting, contact Director Nigel Nathaniel or email OCEP office. OCEP also oversees three Family Enrichment Centers (FEC)s, which are warm, strength-based, home-like spaces where neighbors are able to connect, contribute to their community, find resources, support one another and build protective factors that help children and their families thrive. FECs are located in Highbridge, Hunts Point and East New York, are accessible and open to the community, free of change. Referrals and appointments are not needed and there is no case management. A Parent Advisory Group works closely with the staff to help develop offerings for children and families such as movie night, computer classes, clothing drives, read-alouds, fathers'/men's' groups, family trips and a wide range of other community-designed activities that occur based on the community's preferences. Corrective Action Monitoring Unit (CAMU): At the conclusion of an investigation of a report made to the Statewide Central Register of Child Abuse and Maltreatment (SCR) involving a foster home or a child who is in foster care, the Office of Special Investigation (OSI) may create a corrective action plan (CAP) with recommendations for a foster care provider to enhance the safety and well-being of the child(ren) involved in the report. The Corrective Action Monitoring Unit (CAMU) monitors the progress the provider agencies are making in completing the CAP. The provider agencies are required to submit the CAP to the unit within 20 business days after receiving the CAP. CAMU will review and approve the submissions for compliance with the recommendations and work to resolve any outstanding issues. Our tracking is provided to PPM for use in the scorecard results of each agency.

The New York State Regulations state the primary concern of the Independent Review is to determine if the removal of the child/(ren) was justified. The decision to remove or return a foster child/(ren) should be supported with considerations as to what is in the child/(ren)'s best interest. In some cases, decisions are made to support the agency, despite clear indications that removal was not warranted. In attempting to determine the justification for the removal and what is in the best interest of the child/(ren), the Independent Review Specialist considers many factors, including Safety & Risk Factors that exists.

The unit focuses on youth age 21 and under with a goal of Return to Parent (RTP) in residential care as a result of a child welfare placement. **IPAS-CW** is charged with:

- Supporting efforts to link youth/family to community-based wraparound supports to include Preventive Evidencebased referral and appropriate school setting.

The **Office of Shared Response (OSR)** is within the Division of Family Permanency Services (FPS); under the Provider Agency Collaboration and Engagement (PACE) unit. **OSR** is responsible for assessing and responding to critical incidents, fatalities, high-profile and media cases involving children and youth in foster care. **OSR** provides technical support, guidance and resources to foster care agencies to ensure all children and youth in foster care receive the best child welfare outcomes and quality of care. **OSR** provides technical assistance to Foster Care Provider Agencies to ensure that systems, problems, and inquiries receive helpful and effective responses. In addition, **OSR** maintains the Business Process Guide, which summarizes policies and procedures and outlines the roles and responsibilities of Foster Care Provider Agencies and NYC Children's Services.

Supervision Until 21 - Monitors all APPLA youth final discharged from foster care until age 21. The supervision until 21 monitors maintain monthly contacts with the discharged youth, assisting them if necessary, to ensure that all services procured (Housing, Income, Permanent Adult Connections etc.) pre-discharged are maintained. As a pre-condition all APPLA youth discharging from foster are automatically eligible to participate though Supervision Until 21 remains a voluntary service. All APPLA youth can opt in or out at any time while remaining eligible for this supportive monitoring until their 21st birthday. Supervision until 21 monitors (ACS) complete a six-month supervision until 21 checklist which documents general well-being (every 6 months) until the participating youth reaches 21. Monthly contacts / outreach is conducted via telephone and/or face to face. Youth final discharged from foster care eligible for **SUP21** include those who are in the military, married and residing outside of New York state.

Vital Records/Foster Care Child Care Referrals – The Unit assists the provider agencies in obtaining birth certificates, death certificates and social security cards for children in foster care. If the child is born outside of the city, the provider agency can send an e-mail to the birth certificate e-mail address detailing child's DOB and place of birth and the unit will provide information on specific documents and costs for the birth certificate and assist in obtaining the birth certificate from the other jurisdiction. Additionally, Foundling, Corrections and Delayed birth certificates are processed by this unit. To request a social security card for a youth in foster care, provider agency should send an e-mail to the social security e-mail address. Unit also processes child care referral forms for working foster parents who need child care for a child placed in their home. Both foster parents must be working if it is a 2-parent foster home. Exceptions to policy can be requested if medical documentation is submitted to support why the foster parent is not working, but still needs child care.
