Important information: Selling items in the subway, on public streets, and on sidewalks is <u>prohibited</u>, without permission from the Metropolitan Transportation Authority or the City of New York, and can result in fines. It is unsafe for children to sell goods, especially if they are unsupervised or without an adult.

Know how to access school, childcare, and family services By law, ALL children in New York City, ages 6 to 17 (or turning 6 before July 1), <u>must be</u> enrolled in school until the end of the school year in which they turn 17.

- Children who turn 6 between July and December must enroll for the upcoming school year. Children may enroll and stay in school until the end of the school year they turn 21. The City can connect you to resources for your children regardless of immigration status. Young children should be supervised at all times for their safety.

Know Your Rights

- You have rights as a worker in New York City regardless of immigration status. No one should force, pressure, or trick you to provide work or services, including selling items without a permit.
