THE BUSINESS INTEGRITY COMMISSION ANNOUNCES A NEW PILOT PROGRAM TO ALLOW COMMUNITY COMPOSTING ORGANIZATIONS TO COLLECT ORGANIC WASTE FROM COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENTS

NEW YORK CITY — The New York City Business Integrity Commission ("BIC") announces a new pilot program to allow qualifying community composting organizations to collect and transport organic waste from commercial establishments. The goals of the program are twofold: to assist community composting organizations to secure essential organic materials such as carbon-rich materials and to increase the City's diversion rate by processing organic waste locally.

In order to participate in the pilot program, a community composting organization must be a non-profit organization or an unincorporated entity with an agreement with a New York City agency to utilize property owned by the City for the purposes of composting. Each organization must enter into an individual agreement with BIC by completing a simple online form (http://www.nyc.gov/html/bic/html/current-programs/current-programs.shtml), in order to be allowed to collect and transport commercial organic waste. The pilot program will run for one year, with an option to renew for an additional year. BIC has worked closely with many interested parties including the Department of Sanitation, Council Member Antonio Reynoso, and members from the NYC Community Composting Council to develop this pilot program.

"BIC is proud to support the contributions of community composters in diverting organic waste collected from commercial establishments away from landfills. BIC understands the important role everyone can play with managing this waste stream, from private carters to grassroots efforts like community composters.
