<sup>1</sup> Prior reports noted "guilty" in this column. In the prior reports, each of the placements referenced resulted in the young adults' continued placement in the unit. In this report and reports going forward the notation for the result of the adjudication will state "continued placement" or "not recommended at this time", based on the adjudication captain's determination.

<sup>2</sup> The Length of Stay calculation (LOS) includes all young adults who were housed in Secure Unit, regardless of the reason for exit from a Phase. This LOS data reflects the period from the opening of the Secure Unit in July 2016 through February 22, 2017. The Department's mechanism for tracking this data was undergoing modifications in January.
