



New York City Commission on Human Rights Resources

The New York City Commission on Human Rights is charged with the enforcement of the [Human Rights Law](#), *Title 8 of the Administrative Code of the City of New York*, and with educating the public and encouraging positive community relations.

The law prohibits discrimination and harassment in employment, housing, and public places based on a number of protected categories including race, gender, age, disability, religion, national origin, and many more. The law also prohibits discriminatory harassment and bias-based profiling by law enforcement.

Through robust [community relations](#), [public policy](#), [educational campaigns](#), and [civil law enforcement](#), we ensure that New Yorkers can live, work and thrive in NYC without fear of bias and discrimination.

To prevent bias, hate, and discrimination, communities across the City have access to free resources offered by the Commission, like [cultural competency trainings](#), multi-lingual [Bystander Intervention Training](#), and using [Restorative Justice](#) practices like Talking Circles to build community response to incidents of bias discrimination or hate in communities.
